FROM THE PRIEST-IN-CHARGE

I think I was all of seven years old when I was forcibly dragged into the Adler Planetarium in Chicago. For the duration of the show, if memory serves, I was somewhat less than my usual gracious self. At that age, I couldn't have cared less about the heavens. Couldn't see how certain clusters of stars were supposed to represent lions or dogs or winged horses or whatever. I had wanted to go to the Field Museum instead and see the stuffed elephant but my brother won the coin toss ... not that I'm still bitter or anything.

I stopped being bored by the heavens when Rick and I married and moved way up north in Michigan (by which I mean well north of the 45th parallel) where night is night and the Aurora Borealis routinely dances its wraithlike ballet in the still dark hours of early winter morning. Strange to know, now when I gaze upon Betelgeuse in the constellation Orion — one of the few constellations visible in our light-polluted suburban sky — how ancient the light truly is, how very long it has taken for the particles of energy to reach my eyes. We never see the nighttime sky as it is, but only as it was. Time loses all immediacy in the vast expanse of interstellar space.

From Christmas through Epiphany, one of the cable channels is bound to offer a show speculating on the Star of Bethlehem that we hear of in Matthew's gospel — the gospel account we hear on Epiphany and which we all remember from the Christmas pageants of our youth. One I recall seeing a year or so ago went into great and serious detail about what the star might actually have been. They reconstructed the sky as it would have appeared in approximately 3 B.C. at the latitude of the Holy Land, compared the very detailed historical astronomical writings from the Chinese (a source, naturally, unavailable to Matthew when he wrote his gospel), and speculated away.

As theologians go, they made great astronomers.

Seriously, it's not that science and faith are mutually exclusive — far from it. It's merely that the two fields should lead us to ask very different questions. An astronomer asks, "could this star have been a comet, or a star gone supernova, or a conjunction of the planets Venus and Jupiter?" Make no mistake, these are questions well worth investigating.

However, if the best astronomical minds in the world decided tomorrow that no such celestial event could possibly, empirically, objectively, ever have

happened, persons of faith can still look to Matthew's gospel as a source of Truth. Because, you see, the question that faith leads us to ask is not, "What was this star?" or "Did it really happen?" but rather, "What is Matthew telling us when he writes that Wise Men from the East sought out an infant king in a far off country?" "What is the Truth about Christ that the Evangelist conveys?" "How do we experience that Truth in 2011 at Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral in Kansas City?"

Which brings me back to star gazing. If astronomers are actually historians (because the light they perceive has travelled millions of light-years to reach their retinas), then persons of faith are both historians and visionaries. We read in the present moment of the Epiphany in an ancient book called the Gospel of Matthew, and through it, are invited to reflect upon a Savior who is both immediate and eternal. Astronomers see the sky only as it was. By contrast, we people of faith are invited to scan the stars and see the world as it shall be.

And "world" in this context means not only the global village in which we all live, but also in a more proximate sense of the Diocese of West Missouri and the Cathedral. New beginnings are dawning. Bishop-elect Field will be consecrated March 5. Sometime later in the year, the Vestry will elect a new dean. New people will formally join the Cathedral through confirmation and reception at the Easter Vigil. Babies will be born and baptized. Beloved members will be laid to eternal rest. Within these historic walls, newness continually dawns, and for this we give God thanks and praise.

I wish you all a stellar Epiphany!



Children's Formation is ready to help fulfill your New Year's resolutions

If one of your goals/resolutions in 2011 is to get more involved, Children's Formation and Chapels have the following needs:

- **Formation Gate Keeper:** This adult would be on hand during the 9:15-10:15 a.m. formation class time. They would assist the teachers as necessary and direct children/parents where to go. After classes start they would get snacks ready for the classrooms and then be our 'hall monitor' and assist with bathroom duties or supply needs.
- **Chapel Assistant:** The Cathedral is blessed to have enough children to warrant a Lambs (non-readers to 1st grade) and a Disciples (readers through 4th grade) chapel. Two chapels means at least two adults in attendance, if possible. While we have some leaders, we certainly don't have enough adults to be the second adult with up to 15 children. This adult would need to be available from 10:10 until the sign of the Peace. An assigned Sunday a month (i.e., the 1st or 3rd Sunday) is how we currently schedule.
- **Craft Setter:** The wonderful *Weaving God's Promises* curriculum we use in Formation class for the 2nd through 6th graders uses crafts as a touch stone for discussion. During the week the craft is selected and the supplies gathered from the resource room. If someone is of crafty intent and would like to gather these items from the resource room during the week and/or early on Sunday morning that would be a wonderful assistance.

2010 has been a hard year for the people of Haiti. There was the earthquake in January, Hurricane Tomas in November and now a deadly cholera outbreak. One bright spot has been the work done by Maison de Naissance for the last six years.

The facility was closed when the hurricane came through, but sustained no damage and was up and running again the next day. There have been deaths from cholera in nearby Les Cayes, but the staff at MN has been hard at work teaching prevention by emphasizing cleanliness (hand washing, waste disposal, etc.).



While income has been tracking fairly closely with the budget, the month of November experienced a significant decline in pledge and plate in comparison to budget. As a result, income was below budget by about \$36,000 for the month. Additionally, total expenses were about \$5,500 above budget. For the year-to-date through November, income is about \$35,000 below budget and total expenses were \$9,000 below budget. Historically, the month of December has been a higher income month and will need to be above historical levels in order for the total year to be break-even or above.

The Cathedral's by-laws allow for nominations from the floor of qualified candidates. This notification is necessary for two reasons: 1) to certify that the nominee is qualified for election according to the canons of the Church, and 2) to allow time for the individual to provide the same written responses as provided by each nominee selected by the committee.

During the difficult transition time between Deans Dennis Schmidt and Dean Terry White, I served on the vestry. Over the years of our membership I have made several presentations to audiences at GHTC on various subjects of artistic and religious interest including four weekly classes at a Lenten Academy on the "Influence of Celtic Hymns" on the Episcopal Hymn book.

My vision for the Cathedral in the next three years is (1) to increase membership; (2) to increase the range of socially relevant activities within the parish, including an expansion of medical knowledge sharing among parishioners, particularly the elderly, to be done in conjunction with the Parish Nurse ministry; and (3) to make the activities of the parish more publicly known, including resuming the advertising of Sunday services and weekday activities. This is largely a "drive in" parish, and people need to have a reason to 'DRIVE IN'.

At the recent "Bishop Walkabout," a young man asked one of the candidates what the church

would look like in ten years' time. I have pondered this question since.

A few of us have had the amazing experience, when younger, of forming such strong friendships with a member of another family, that we were able to cross, freely, the boundaries between the two families. We came to regard the friend's family as "my other family." My goal would be, collectively, to recreate the Cathedral family as "our other family", a family on which we could rely for communal healthy, joint activities, recreation and socially beneficial works; and to make the cathedral a place that people come to because they want to come, not because they feel they ought to come.

As regards confidentiality of decision making within the vestry. Vestry members are representatives of their constituents — the parishioners. I believe that parishioners have every reason to know and understand the financial basis for business decisions made at the vestry level. After they are the primary financial stakeholders in supporting the parish. For confidence in their vestry, there must be transparency in financial operations. So strongly do I believe in this principle that I would not serve on a vestry where there is not absolute freedom of communication between the finance committee and the vestry; and between the vestry and parishioners. However, having said that, there are some decisions regarding personnel, where details of evidence and discussion should remain confidential and undisclosed. I look forward to the election.
