BECOMING GOD'S COURAGEOUS COMMUNITY

This is a time to take risks. It is time to explore new ways to relate to a rapidly changing world. The Church, if it is to survive, needs to be courageous as it seeks to proclaim Christ's gospel in fresh and life-giving ways. This was the guiding theme for the annual conference of the Consortium of Endowed Episcopal parishes in Charlotte, N.C., held the first full week of March 2012.

The conference, titled, *Becoming God's Courageous Community*, was my first ever. I attended with David Stoll, Financial Administrator, and Doyle White, a member of the Finance Committee. The Consortium, made up of congregations covering a wide range of size in terms of membership and assets, offers support in the way of information and resources. It serves as a clearing house for ideas and the exchange of useful information. The Cathedral with its endowments that empower our ministry is served well through this network.

The three of us went to the conference agreeing that we would put our learning to use at the Cathedral. Through both plenary sessions and a wide range of specialized workshops, David, Doyle and I were able to gather useful material and network with people from throughout the Episcopal Church. Here's some of what we learned:

Peter DeVeau

One presenter at the conference suggested that when thinking about Stewardship that we consider 100 percent of it to be for Outreach! All our money, material and human assets as a church, everything we possess and everything we do, exist for the sake of others. Stewardship is communal.

Celebration of Mutual Ministry

Saturday in Easter Week

April 14 • 10:30 a.m.

We gather to celebrate our baptismal ministry and the call of Peter DeVeau as our new Dean. Bishop Marty Field presides at this service which includes renewal of baptismal vows and Confirmation, Reception and Reaffirmation.

Participants in the liturgy will include persons representing each Deanery of the Diocese of West Missouri and the wider community. The Cathedral musicians, the William Baker Festival Singers, trumpeter Keith Benjamin, and voluntary organist Jonathan Gregoire will make joyful music. A festive reception follows the service in Founders' Hall.

Healthy families talk about money. It is a wise practice for churches to offer programs in financial literacy. I was also intrigued and challenged with the thought of regarding the Cathedral as a resource place. As the church moves into the uncertainty of the future and a changing culture places like Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral can become regional centers for learning, the arts, spiritual growth and the exchange of ideas. David Stoll

This was my first time attending the Consortium of Endowed Episcopal Parishes conference. I was fortunate to arrive early so I could attend all Smart-Networking sessions for parish and financial administrators. The experiences shared covered vast amounts of topics which encompassed job duties, volunteers, policies and procedures, information sharing, online giving, property repairs and housekeeping issues, archives, weddings and spirituality in the workplace. It was enlightening to speak with more than twenty lay administrators who share the same common goal in providing the best attention and care to their parish needs.

Doyle White

It had been 5 years since I last attended the Consortium of Endowed Episcopal Parishes conference. The spiritual and everyday nuts and bolts operational information was blended together at the conference sessions. I found Bonnie Anderson's presentment of the House of Deputies call to do our ministries in new ways particularly useful in this blending. She appealed to the Episcopal Church to move beyond what she calls "technological fixes" to "proactive changes."

The planned giving session I attended was partially informative since the Cathedral is in the process of implementing a planned giving program. Most not-for-profits already have planned giving programs in place and the Cathedral needs to let our members know that we have an organized professional program in place to receive their planned gifts. Helping continue the Cathedral's ministry after they are no longer here is, I believe, the wish of many of our members. The Episcopal Church Foundation has many resources we can access.

As we minister among you, the three of us will have much more to share from our learning at the conference. One thought that came up more than once is the importance of celebrating people and achievements in the life of a congregation. Thank you for the part you play in the greater whole. We exist to transform lives through our common life in Christ. We are grateful that our ministry here depends on the resources of all the saints at Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral, past and present.

Both the month of February 2012 and the year-to-date through February 2012 were greater than the same periods of time in 2011. Income for the month of February was in excess of \$165,000 as compared to February 2011 of \$157,478. The year-to-date February 2012 was in excess of \$287,000 as compared to the same period in 2011 of \$258,780.

The net operating income was \$34,350 for the year-to-date 2012 as compared to \$12,038 during the same period in 2011, even though expenses were approximately \$6,500 higher in 2012 than 2011. The improved results were driven by an increase in the Crowell Trust.

At the present time, pledges for 2012 are trailing the pledge activity of 2011. Currently, 171 pledges have been received totaling \$401,466 as compared to 183 pledges totaling \$454,958 at this time in 2011.

As pledges are an important part of the budget, if you have not yet turned in a pledge card or made your 2012 pledge on the church website, please take a moment to do so. We appreciate your contribution to the Cathedral to do the good works that we have been given.

Why I support the AIDS Walk

My involvement with HIV/AIDS began in the early 1990s when I received a phone call from Brian, a close friend, with news that our friend, Steve Tritten, had the HIV/AIDS virus. They lived in New York City and Steve's lover had already died of the disease. Brian and Steve had lived in Kansas City and graduated from the Conservatory. Steve was a talented tenor with hopes of a career in opera or musical theater. We had performed in shows together and worked at Carnegie's as singing waiters. I didn't know how to help Steve with so many miles between

us but I wrote lots of letters and made a visit to New York City to see him. It was frustrating not being able to help so I decided to become involved in HIV/AIDS projects here in Kansas City.

One of the Lenten Academy offerings at the Cathedral was a series of classes about HIV/AIDS non profits in Kansas City. I learned about SAVE Inc., Free Health Clinic and the Good Samaritan Project. A walk team was organized in 1995 from the Cathedral for AIDS Walk-Kansas City.

We have continued to walk every year since then—sometimes in rain, sometimes in sun and even once in snowflakes. Steve died in early 1994 but the good news is that people are now LIVING with HIV/AIDS thanks to the drug therapies that are available today.

AIDS Walk-KC is a benefit for HIV/AIDS agencies (Good Samaritan Project, SAVE Inc., Hope Care Center and Kansas City Free Health Clinic) in Kansas City. The walk is an easy 2+ mile walk near the Plaza. It will be Saturday, April 28 in Theis Park, which is east of the Plaza and south of the Nelson. Registration is at 8 a.m., Walk-Ceremonies at 9 a.m. and We WALK at 10 a.m. Walkers will be done by 12 p.m. Please join the Cathedral in walking and/or pledging for a walker. There are two teams from the Cathedral—Trinity Teens and the adult walk team. 


"In the Next Pew" is a monthly column to help parishioners match names with the faces they see in the pews around them.

Holy Week: Come for the Journey

You are invited to take the journey that takes us home and to new places. As the church gathers each day for worship from Palm Sunday to Easter Day, there is a particular focus that brings to corporate memory the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus. This faith walk reminds us of who we are and challenges us to renew our understanding of what it means to follow Christ. There are both familiar and a few new things that will be part of our gatherings this year.

April 1 • Palm Sunday

8 a.m., 10:15 a.m., 5 p.m.

On Palm Sunday the reading of the Passion according to Mark will be done by one reader, with speaking parts for the congregation. At appropriate points in the narrative there will be pauses for reflection. A verse or two of a familiar hymn will be sung at these times, in addition to keeping the customary silence at the death of Jesus.

The Paschal Triduum: The Great Three Days

April 5 • Maundy Thursday

6 p.m. (no 12:05 p.m. Eucharist)

Maundy Thursday the liturgy begins at 6 p.m. in Founders' Hall with the bishop presiding. This is the day we remember that Jesus washed his disciples' feet, commanded them to love one another, shared a last meal with them, and went out into the night to pray and to be handed over to death. The congregation will gather at long tables for the Liturgy of the Word, followed by footwashing at stations at the sides of the room. There will be opportunity for handwashing for those not desiring footwashing. As always, this rite is optional. Eucharist is then celebrated with communion being distributed to the con-

gregation at tables by Eucharistic Ministers. Immediately after Eucharist, an Agape Meal of light, Mediterranean-style foods will be served. An "Agape" or lovefeast meal was characteristic of early gatherings of the Christian community.

After eating all will stand for a postcommunion prayer and to sing a hymn. All then leave the tables (the dishes will be done later) and go in procession to the Cathedral nave. When the congregation has gathered in the pews, an organ piece will be played followed by the singing of a hymn. Then the lights will be dimmed. The Altar Guild and clergy will strip the altar of all adornment while Psalm 88 is read by two voices. After a period of silence the congregation disperses. The Cathedral will be open until 9 p.m. Those who wish may stay for prayer and meditation. The sacramental rite of reconciliation is available for those desiring it. The healing prayer and votive candle station in the nave cross-aisle will be decorated to suggest the Garden of Gethsemane where Jesus prayed.

This year the Liturgy of Good Friday takes place at both 12:05 p.m. and 7 p.m. The bishop presides at the noon liturgy. The Passion of John will be sung and there will be opportunity to come forward to offer prayer and light candles during the Veneration of the Cross. As at the death of Jesus we enter into a kind of "down time," there will be no communion from the reserved Sacrament. The focus will be on entering into the Passion story through Scripture, music, hymns, prayer and silence.

The Way of the Cross (Stations) takes place at 2:30 p.m. This means of meditating on Jesus's suffering prior to and during the Crucifixion is for persons of all ages.

Labyrinth Available Holy Week

Labyrinth walk for private meditation is available in Founders' Hall Palm Sunday afternoon through Wednesday evening and also Good Friday until 7 p.m. (The labyrinth is not available Maundy Thursday to allow for setup for the evening liturgy.) A printed guide will be available in Founders' Hall to assist you as you walk the labyrinth. The labyrinth is an ancient pattern that has been found in many cultures around the world. A labyrinth is not a maze, with dead ends and other tricks. In fact, the labyrinth is meant to be easy to traverse. Labyrinths have only one path to the center. You walk in by a winding path and exit the same way.



Easter Week: Come for the Journey

The Resurrection

April 7 • Easter Eve

7:30 p.m.

We begin with the Great Vigil of Easter at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday evening. If you have never attended the Vigil, come and see! A member of the Cathedral congregation said that if he were to invite someone to church who had no prior contact with the Christian community it would be to this service. This is the night when we pass from death to life. We baptize at this service which consists of four parts: Light, Lessons, Christian Initiation and the first Eucharist of Easter. This is followed by a festive reception. You are invited to bring a savory or sweet treat to share; drop it off in Founders' Hall before the service.

Unlike prior years, the bishop will not be at the Cathedral to preside. This year Bishop Field will be at Grace Church, Carthage to keep Easter. Confirmations, receptions and reaffirmations that normally take place at the Vigil will be included in the Celebration of New Ministry, Saturday, April 14, 10:30 a.m.

Raising "Alleluia"

Both the 8 a.m. and 10:15 a.m. services Easter Day begin with children being invited to come forward and raise the "Alleluia" which was "buried" under the altar carpet on the Last Sunday

after Epiphany. When the buried letters are lifted up by the children to spell out this word which means, "Praise the Lord," the whole church will proclaim, "Alleluia. Christ is risen!"

[Note: The Easter Egg Hunt will be ON Easter Day, not the Second Sunday of Easter as earlier reported. 


