FROM THE DEAN

More Mission

What would you like for this church? A colleague of mine who works with congregational development asks this question when working with churches. In group meetings the responses are shared and placed on lists. Participants are encouraged to think creatively. In lining out their hopes and dreams they can think outside the box. But, there are three things they cannot put on the wish list: more members, more money, more families with children.

What is this? One would naturally assume that these three pillars of concern would be all-critical to people in declining mainline churches. This trinity of growth tops the goal charts and wish lists across the spectrum of churches of all sorts and sizes. Without more people, more money and more kids there is no future.

The practical wisdom in not stating the obvious is to get churches thinking *missionally*: “What is our ministry as a church?” Back in March our Vestry began some discernment work around the mission of the Cathedral. Four main goals were agreed on for 2014: Church Growth, Membership Retention, Community Outreach and Stewardship. While three of these goals would seem to be excluded in my colleague’s visioning process, these “goals” are categories under which specific actions are named.

Mission and action are in the water this fall. Already we are seeing activity around the Vestry-initiated goals. Here are some (not all!) of these:

Everyone responsible for submitting **budget requests** for 2014 have been charged with approaching their ministries with church growth, membership retention, community outreach, and stewardship in mind.

A ministry among **newcomers** is up and running offering orientations for new persons, nametags for all, and greeters to welcome all to worship.

We are reviving the **Community Blessing of the Animals**, with the idea of including our downtown neighbors and the greater Kansas City community.

Wider participation and hands-on activity in **outreach ministries** is increasing through the work of the Social Outreach Committee.

Formation for families and children includes Children’s Chapel, monthly family lunches and learning events. The hiring of a part-time Coordinator for Children’s and Family Ministry is in process now that funds are available in the budget.

Beginning Oct. 9, **The Way**, a catechumenal program for the intentional formation of Christians begins.

Cathedral spaces continue to be renewed, repaired and readied for increased activity. In particular the Multi-Purpose Room in Founders’ Hall is usable once again, the Youth Room has been refurbished and the upstairs kitchen in Founders’ Hall is better organized.

The Vestry is looking to increase **annual stewardship** in order to grow ministry and decrease our reliance on endowment income for operations and ministry.

Each one of these things are being done for the good of the congregation, as the Cathedral church for a diocese, and in our ministry as a house of prayer for all people. It is amazing what can happen when a community begins to think about its mission. Thank you, all, and thanks be to God.

The Way: You are invited to come along the journey, begins Oct. 9

The Way takes its name from the Acts of the Apostles in the New Testament where the followers of Christ are referred to as people “belonging to the Way.” The Way is a process for faith formation, or catechumenate, at Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral. The word catechumenate comes from Greek and means to be taught orally—to learn by hearing. It has deep roots in church practice going back to the second and third centuries.

Community and sharing is at the center of The Way. Each evening begins with a simple meal and table conversation. This is followed by Bible study, learning, and group discussion. Links are made between daily life and work and the worship and practice of the church. Emphasis is given to understanding what it means to live into one’s baptismal promises. Sessions conclude with quiet reflection and prayer.



Wednesday evenings include

- 6 p.m. Supper and Conversation. Meals are free.
- 7-8 p.m. Small group Bible study, discussion and prayer

The Way takes place over several months, with breaks around Thanksgiving and Christmas. The first months are a time of inquiry. Participants may either attend faithfully or only for a time, coming and going as they choose. From February 19, in the period leading up to the Easter Vigil and baptism, confirmation, and reaffirmation of faith, participants make a commitment to complete the process of The Way.

- October 9-November 13 Asking questions and building community
- December 4 Advent celebration meal
- January 8-February 5 Continuing in the way
- February 19-April 9 Preparing for baptism and affirming faith
- April 23-May 7 Living the risen life

The Way is for you, if . . .

- You would like to understand what it means to follow Christ
- You would like to be part of a community and deepen your faith
- You are new to the Cathedral, desire baptism, or would like to grow in your journey of faith
- You would like to know about being Christian in the Anglican/Episcopal tradition
- You have been around church for a long time and would like to renew your faith journey
- You are ready to ask questions and explore the rich life of God’s grace and love

For the month of August 2013, the Cathedral reported a positive net operating income of \$3,673 as revenues were higher than project-

ed and expenses were well below budget particularly in the area of property expenses.

For the year-to-date through August net operating income of \$72,712 was above budget due to lower expenses. The pledge amount is behind budget by \$7,000 and the plate offering is below budget by nearly \$10,000.

We are experiencing acceptance of online giving (both for pledges and plate) through the website www.kccathedral.org. For the month of August nearly 3 percent of total pledges and plate offerings were made online.

- Pregnant women are also tested for malaria and other major diseases and receive treatment and education on prevention where applicable.

Maison de Naissance will continue to work towards these goals: #4 Reducing Child Mortality, #5 Improve Maternal Health and #6 Combat HIV/AIDS, Malaria and Other Diseases.

Book of Remembrance

We gather names and add them to a book started in 2007. It is a lasting memorial of "those we love but see no longer." The book is displayed in the Cathedral on All Saints' Sunday. The names are also be listed in the worship booklet. During the liturgy there is a time when lectors read aloud the names of those who have died in the past 12 months, followed by a time when all present say aloud names of those they would like remembered.

Forms for submitting names will be available at services beginning Oct. 13. You can place these in the offering plate or in the basket on the ushers' table. Names can also be e-mailed to jtoma@kccacathedral.org. The deadline for submitting names is Tuesday, Oct. 29.



All Saints' Memorial

You are invited to bring photographs of departed loved ones with you to church beginning Sunday, Oct. 13. Individual snap shots work best, though you may submit framed photographs as well. Please limit the size of photos to 8x10 and smaller. Photos will not be harmed and will be returned.

Put photos in the envelopes provided for this purpose at the entrances to the Cathedral then place the envelope in the baskets. Place your name, phone and email on the back of each photo. These will become part of a display near the baptismal font. We pass by this "great cloud of witnesses" — the Communion of Saints — as we go to the altar for Eucharist. Photos will be available to take home the following Sundays in Founders' Hall.


