FROM THE DEAN A Gift that Keeps Giving

A seasonal memory has stuck with me through the years. On December 23 or 24 I would join the ranks of last minute shoppers rushing to buy their presents. It was tradition. I even raised my son to do the same. Back in our Prairie Village days we made our way to the Plaza when the days left before Christmas were reduced to hours, to do our shopping and then to eat some ribs in self-reward for our efforts.

For me the roots are deep for this approach to Christmas shopping. Back where I grew up the couple of days before Christmas functioned as a kind of meeting time. Shopping seemed secondary to the numerous “chance” meetings with neighbors, friends and even sworn enemies and detractors on the main streets in the towns around us (this was before the days of big box shopping, when we even knew all the shop keepers). During high school and college these last minute streets were the place for “social networking” before it was a concept.

My son and I encountered a similar experience on the Plaza when it was still a mix of locally owned and nationally franchised businesses. On our shopping trip we would invariably run into friends and neighbors who were on the same mission as we. To this day, a busy commercial street just before Christmas evokes as many memories in me as do the scent of fresh cut evergreens and holiday baking.

When church is at its best I believe it is a place for us to find our gifts and to meet people on a similar journey. At a time when there are fewer places where we gather in community, especially with folks with whom we do not share the same track or interests, church functions as a kind of main street. The Cathedral is a good place for this very thing. Here we meet folks from the neighborhood and throughout the metropolitan area and beyond. Some we know, others not.

I believe the community we share in Christ at the Cathedral is both a journey and a gift. This is particularly true each December. While we keep regular times of gathering for worship, our life together is dressed up for the season.

December offerings in our spaces include: Advent Lessons and Carols and City Come Again with the William Jewell community; a concert by the Kansas City Chorale*; the Kansas City Community Kitchen plated luncheon for the poor and homeless; the enchantment of Paul Messner’s *Nativity**; the beauty of Candlelight and Carols with the Festival Singers*, the community Messiah Singalong, the newer tradition of the Moravian Lovefeast. Some of these events have an admission charge*, others are purely acts of worship and/or community and are free.

All these gatherings around worship, music and food cater to those who are shopping for a taste of the season and maybe for something more. Each of these events in its own way speaks of that annual journey, that amazing shopping expedition that leads us once again to God’s perfect gift. It’s such a rewarding journey that it makes sense to invite those we love and care about to come along.

While you make your way to all or some of Advent and Christmas at the Cathedral, invite others to join you. Both you and they may find that an expedition downtown leads to that gift that keeps on giving.

Coping with holiday grief

As we approach the holiday season, many people are dealing with loss and are often caught in a dilemma between the need to grieve and the pressure to get into the spirit of the season. Holidays or not, it is important for the bereaved to find ways to take care of themselves. Suppressing the feelings does not work. Allowing yourself to grieve is perhaps the healthiest, most effective way to deal with loss. This can be done in a number of ways, including the following:

- Express your feelings. You can write them down or confide them to a trusted friend.
- Look for caring people—consider a support group or a holiday bereavement group. Spend time with friends or family who understand the situation and will take time to listen.
- Look after your own health—grieving is

stressful and depletes you. Try your best to eat well and get enough rest and see your physician if needed.

- Be patient. It can take a long time to fully process and accept the loss. Grief is experienced very personally on an individual time line.
- Seek out those experienced in assisting you such as your pastor, a social worker, or other health care provider.

At the holidays, consider some of the following:

- Plan ahead for the holidays; scale back on activities if you want to. Redefine your holiday expectations. Consider this year a transition year for change.
- Express your feelings and allow yourself to have those feelings; tears are healing.
- Share memories of your loved one with

friends and family and share photos and stories that will make the moment special.

- Do things that are meaningful to you, such as listening to music or attending a special concert.
- Read a book about grief; specialists can give you suggestions.
- Remember the reality that the anticipation of the holidays without your family member is often harder than the actual holidays themselves.

Take care of you; ask about groups provided by hospice programs in the community during the holiday season. Seek out those who understand the loss and grief that you feel. You will be welcomed.

Moravian Lovefeast Dec. 22, 5 p.m.

This service of carols, lessons, candle lighting and sharing over a "feast" of special buns and coffee provides a peaceful close to the Advent season.

The music includes both familiar Advent and Christmas hymns, as well as Moravian anthems and hymns typically sung at Christmas Lovefeasts. Cathedral Musician, John Schaefer, and parishioner William Baker, who directs the Cathedral Chorale, are gathering musicians for the Love Feast. A brass ensemble and a recorder trio will play.

The Moravian custom of the Lovefeast dates back to the early 1700s when exiled Moravian Christians shared a meal provided by a German count on whose lands they had taken refuge. We keep this tradition as a way to reach out to Moravians in the Kansas City area where there is no organized Moravian congregation. The Episcopal Church and the Moravian Church in North America are in full communion.

We welcome this opportunity to share in this rich tradition received from our ecumenical partners. The Lovefeast is also offered for persons looking for a spiritual home and to enrich our celebrations of Advent and Christmas.

Here's an invitation to make 2014 more interesting and fulfilling. Come take part in The Way. The Way is for you, if ...

- You would like to understand what it means to follow Christ
- You would like to be part of a community and deepen your faith
- You are new to the Cathedral, desire baptism, or would like to grow in your journey of faith
- You would like to know about being Christian in the Anglican/Episcopal tradition
- You have been around church for a long time and would like to renew your faith journey
- You are ready to ask questions and explore the rich life of God's grace and love

The Way takes place on Wednesday evenings:

January 8-February 5 Inquiring about Christian faith & believing
 February 19-April 9 Preparing for baptism & affirmation of faith
 April 23-May 7 Living the risen life

Each session includes:

- 6 p.m. Supper and conversation. Meals are free!
- 6:30 p.m. A brief interactive teaching
- 7-8 p.m. Small group Bible study, discussion & prayer

Community and sharing is at the center of The Way. Each evening begins with a simple meal and table conversation. This is followed by a learning, small group Bible study and discussion. Links are made between daily life and work and the worship and practice of the church. Emphasis is given to understanding what it means to live into one's baptismal promises. Sessions conclude with quiet reflection and prayer.

The Way takes its name from the Acts of the Apostles in the New Testament where the followers of Christ are referred to as people "belonging to the Way." The Way is the process for faith formation, or catechumenate, at Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral. The word catechumenate comes from Greek and means to be taught orally—to learn by hearing. It has deep roots in church practice going back to the second and third centuries.

Treasurer's Report

The month of October 2013 was positive and better than budget with an increase in pledges and a decrease in plate income. Expenses were above budget due primarily to higher property costs.

For the ten months year-to-date income was above budget and greater than last year; however, the increase in pledges was small. The dependence on the endowment funds continues to grow as a total of revenues. Last year the endowment through October was 66.1 percent and this year through October has risen to 66.5 percent of total revenues. This is a trend that must be reversed. Through the generosity of our parishioners hopefully this stewardship will reverse the rising trend of reliance on the endowment to fund the missions of the Cathedral.

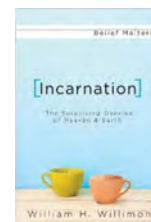

Gifts to Heifer International give hope

In his first Christmas Eve homily at the Cathedral, Bishop Field asked, "What does the Christmas story mean to a starving child in Africa"? That question still confronts me and I think Heifer International may be one way to connect and construct an answer.

G-O-A-T spells "goat" and for a family living in sub-Saharan Africa, it also spells H-O-P-E. Hope for a better healthier life as the goat provides as much as two gallons of milk a day. From the milk, the family can have cheeses, soaps and lotions, excess milk to sell or barter with for other food and items they need in addition to the obvious, milk for their own consumption. The goat also produces fertilizer to enrich the poor soil making gardens more productive. They can eventually with their enlarged resources breed the goat and within a year have more goats (usually twins



are born). They can pass the extra goat to another family and they in turn can gain a better economic foothold. The goat's coat can be spun into a cloth, when there is an excess of goats so that one can be butchered, they will have goat meat which is a most delicious and nutritious meat. Goats are raised for their products and meat use in more parts of the world than any other herd animal. For \$120 Heifer International will provide a goat and ongoing support for how to best utilize it for a third world family. You may give the animal (Heifer has a range of animals at a range of prices for giving.)

in honor of someone this Christmas.

I am giving a beehive and bees (\$30) in honor of my daughter and her family. They live on a small farmstead, Apiary Hill Farm, in Oregon. "Apiary" is a word for bee farming. This makes

a sort of from "my farm to yours" gift. The bee startup will provide honey for use and sales, pollinate the plants in their area giving a benefit to other small farmers in their area, and over time grow to multiple hives that can remain with the farmer or provide barter to acquire other things the family needs. In this case, a bee startup can raise a village. I think that makes a fine Christmas gift.

Will you join me, and the Social Outreach Commission, in giving to Heifer International this holiday season? Episcopal Relief and Development is including Heifer in their gift catalog and Heifer has their own gift catalog both showing a variety of gift possibilities you can even donate a "share" of some animals. 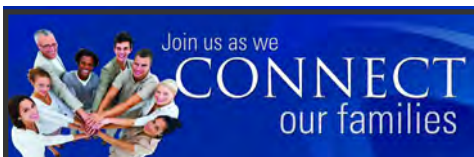
