FROM THE DEAN

Sounding for Justice and Mercy

This past Tuesday evening was interrupted. As Mary and I sat at our dining room table with the key mentor/leaders for *The Way* several cell phones blared out with an amber alert. The alarm announced what would turn out to be a disturbing, senseless and heinous tragedy. As we learned later that night our phones had announced the abduction of eight-year-old Hailey Owens in Springfield. The tragedy unfolded to deep sorrow when we learned that young girl had been murdered.

When our phones began wailing around the table Tuesday night, it came in the context of discussing *The Way*. The group had just shared how this program fosters community, readily accepts and includes people, and empowers the church for its calling to minister in Christ's name. The amber alert sounding in that time and space was a reminder of how immediately we are linked with the world locally and globally. Coming as it did in a church meeting, it sounded out the essential tenet that our practice of faith is not for ourselves alone. It is for the breaking in of God's reign of justice, mercy and peace.

"Blow the trumpet in Zion; sound the alarm on my holy mountain!" We sometimes read these words from the prophet Joel on Ash Wednesday. These words once rallied Israel as it faced a ruinous plague of locusts. For us these words sound a continual appeal. We are called to turn toward God who is "gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing." It is the call we hear in the Lenten season.

This Lent we are honored to welcome the **Reverend Dr. Wallace Hartsfield**, professor of Hebrew Bible at Central Baptist Theological Seminary and pastor of Metropolitan Missionary Baptist Church. He presents **Beyond Justice: A Call to Mercy** as the Scripture offering Wednesday evenings. We are also pleased to welcome members of Dr. Hartsfield's church for this program as well. While Dr. Hartsfield's lectures center on the prophetic framing of Jesus' ministry, his

presence links the white and black communities of Kansas City. We hope this can sound a call to look more closely at the interconnections and challenges of greater Kansas City.

We are also blessed to welcome the **Reverend Paul Turner**, pastor of St. Anthony Roman Catholic Church for a lunch and program Sunday, March 23. Father Turner holds a Doctorate of Sacred Theology from Sant'Anselmo in Rome and is an internationally recognized authority on Liturgy. He is an authority on the keeping of the Triduum, **the Great Three Days** including Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Great Vigil of Easter. His presentation will help us keep these days in ways that sound a new note for the mystery of Christ's victory of justice and mercy.

I invite you to be present at worship as you are able, and to read either or both of the two books chosen for Lenten growth. Two Sunday discussions of the Lenten book selections are scheduled. **The Gift of Life: Death and Dying, Life and Living** study group meets Monday evening and Thursday afternoons. Regular men's, women's and Sunday Bible studies continue through the season. Wednesday evenings include Contemplative Eucharist and community dinner open to all. Offerings for growth include the usual youth group meetings and choir rehearsals. A **Prayer Shawl Knitting** group meets to stitch prayerfully. **The Way** continues as persons are prepared for baptism, reception into the church. Dr. Hartsfield presents his program.

Justice and mercy sounding in our lives is our common theme. In this season in particular it breaks in like a cell phone alert. I invite you to join in the unpacking, examining, and renewing of faith that is Lent.

Yarn-bombing for peace*

Cathedral knitters and crocheters are invited to join others from around the world in a service project this Lent. Through Heidi König Reichert, the foreign exchange student Bud and Candy McDowell hosted in 1998-99, the Social Outreach Committee has become aware of a project sponsored by the Arbeitskreis Eine Welt (The Working Group One World) organization in Schwäbisch Gmünd, Germany.

The purpose of the project is to exploit the one-hundredth anniversary of the beginning of World War I to raise awareness among Schwäbisch Gmünd's citizenry and visitors of the organization's mission that includes promoting peace and human rights throughout the world.

Those interested in participating in the project can make squares at home and deposit them in the Yarn-bombing Project basket in the Tower or come to one or both of the Social Outreach Committee sponsored Yarn-bombing Workshops scheduled for **Saturday, March 8** and **Saturday, April 12**. If you are interested in participating, need yarn and/or need more information, please contact Candy McDowell at 816-741-0992 or candylee@kc.rr.com.

The project itself consists of "yarn-bombing" the Siegessäule (victory column) that is in Schwäbisch Gmünd's central marketplace. In order to accomplish this they need 1,670 11cm by 11cm (4.3" x 4.3") knitted or crocheted squares. The squares can be made of any color

or weight yarn and with any size needle as long as the finished product is the required size. Better yet, the tag ends of yarn can be left on the pieces as they will be used to sew the various squares together into a huge stocking for the column. The deadline for finishing the squares is April 24 so they can be sent on to Germany for assembly in time for the "bombing" of the column August 1, 2014.


Women's Retreat:

As enter this season of preparation, self-reflection and amendment of life we offer several opportunities to mark the day. Children are welcome in all liturgies.

7 a.m. Liturgy

Designed for persons on their way to or from work this is the briefest of the three services. The essential elements of the Ash Wednesday liturgy are included in a contemplative setting.

12:05 p.m. Liturgy

This service is shaped to include both the downtown business community and persons who are free during the day. Two hymns are included in this traditional Ash Wednesday liturgy.

7 p.m. Liturgy

This traditional service features *open space*. Following the invitation to a holy lent, those present visit various "stations" around the nave to be marked with ashes in acknowledgment of mortality, be anointed with water as a reminder of baptism, light candles and offer prayer, pick up information on ways to engage in outreach, and fill out a card with personal Lenten intentions to be presented at the Offertory. Following the open space, the liturgy continues with the Litany of Penitence and Holy Communion.

Labyrinth Walk, All Day and Evening

A labyrinth is available in Founders' Hall beginning at 7 a.m. Walking a labyrinth is a spiritual exercise to quiet, center and allow contemplation and prayer.

Ashes on the Go

Cathedral clergy and others are commissioned at noon and go out into city streets to distribute ashes to anyone who desires to be marked with them.

Beyond Justice: A Call to Mercy

Concert: Choir of St. Thomas Church in New York City

The Choir of St. Thomas Church in New York City will perform here Friday, March 28, beginning at 7:30 p.m. The Choir is conducted by John Scott, who came to St. Thomas from St. Paul's Cathedral in London and who performed at Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral more than twenty years ago on the Cathedral Artists Series. The Choir was established in 1913, when Dr. T. Tertius Noble came from England to be the church's first choir master. After Dr. Noble, T. Frederick H. Candlyn, William Self and Gerre Hancock (who was a dear friend of us all) have led the Choir. Dr. Scott has raised the standard to a level such as is achieved in the finest Cathedrals and College Chapels in England. The repertoire for the concert includes works by composers as old as John Taverner (16th century) to our own time with Herbert Howells and Benjamin Britten.

Liturgical Change

As liturgical trends have changed, we here at the Cathedral have discarded some traditions that probably needed to be discarded and we have given away some aspects of worship that should have stayed. One is the singing of the Doxology following the offertory music. The Dean and I have determined that we should add that back into worship; and so we shall, beginning in Lent.

More than 200 onesies and an overflowing bag of adorable/whimsical hats have been delivered to MN. The Friends of MN extend a heartfelt THANK YOU to all who supported this project.

Taken, in part, from a recent article in *Dekabès* the newsletter of MN I'd like to share the following: The symbolism behind MN's core values.

The common method of cooking in Haiti is over an open fire, a pot balanced on top of the three stones with wood for burning between the rocks that support the pot. MN balances on top of accessibility, quality of care, and education. MN is a completely accessible birthing home, striving to eliminate barriers of cost, transportation, and social stigma. MN provides quality of care by combining efficient technology impeccable facilities and a highly skilled professional staff. We commit ourselves to spreading education throughout impoverished areas in order to create an autonomous community. This well known Haitian symbol of the three stones reflects MN's founding principles in order to provide proper, quality maternal care to women and children that otherwise would not be available to them.

During 2013, recurring monthly donations to MN increased by 83 percent. Let us make 2014 our year to commit to reducing maternal and infant mortality in an impoverished community. Whether a sustaining donor, occasional donor, volunteer or supporter of our projects, thank you for your continuing interest in this wonderful place — Maison de Naissance.


