Collect of the Day

Give us grace, O Lord, to answer readily the call of our Savior Jesus Christ and proclaim to all people the Good News of his salvation, that we and the whole world may perceive the glory of his marvelous works; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen**.

Jonah 3:1-5, 10

The word of the Lord came to Jonah a second time, saying, "Get up, go to Nineveh, that great city, and proclaim to it the message that I tell you." So Jonah set out and went to Nineveh, according to the word of the Lord. Now Nineveh was an exceedingly large city, a three days' walk across. Jonah began to go into the city, going a day's walk. And he cried out, "Forty days more, and Nineveh shall be overthrown!" And the people of Nineveh believed God; they proclaimed a fast, and everyone, great and small, put on sackcloth.

When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed his mind about the calamity that he had said he would bring upon them; and he did not do it.

Presiding Bishop Encourages Episcopal Church to Meet Jesus in the Gospel of John

Presiding Bishop Michael Curry released a video on January 10, 2018 encouraging members of the Episcopal Church to participate in the collaborative Lenten offering by The Society of Saint John the Evangelist [SSJE] and Virginia Theological Seminary [VTS], *Meeting Jesus in the Gospel of John*. The free offering, available at <u>meetingjesusinjohn.org</u>, is a six-week study leading each participant into a deeper intimacy with God by praving with the words of John the Evangelist and journaling in the

praying with the words of John the Evangelist and journaling in the included prayer journal.

"As many of you know, we in the Episcopal Church are seeking to grow more fully as the Jesus Movement. And not simply as the full embodiment of the Jesus Movement, but as the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement. So Virginia Seminary and Society of Saint John the Evangelist have come together and created a study opportunity for us to know this Jesus more closely, more fully, more intimately, more deeply," Curry says in the video.

In the sermon during his installation in Washington National Cathedral, Curry gave his first call to the Episcopal Church, "We have got an incredible opportunity, a remarkable faith, and my hope and dream and prayer is that we in the Episcopal Church will find ourselves deeply in what I like to call the Jesus Movement which has been going on a long time; and we are the 21st Century iteration of that. That's what we're about and that's where we are going." The recently released video cites *Meeting Jesus in the Gospel of John* as a means of engaging in the Jesus Movement.

The Lenten offering is designed to lead individuals, small groups or entire congregations into a deeper relationship with God through Jesus as chronicled in the Gospel of John the Baptist. On the website, <u>meetingjesusinjohn.org</u>, participants can sign up to receive a daily email throughout Lent with a video message from the Brothers at SSJE and also download a free prayer journal or order a printed journal from Amazon. The site also includes facilitation guidance for groups, resources for communicators and a help section to ensure participants and group leaders can have a meaningful and dynamic Lenten experience.
