

Collect of the Day

Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing you have made and forgive the sins of all who are penitent: Create and make in us new and contrite hearts, that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our wretchedness, may obtain of you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

Joel 2:1-2,12-17

Blow the trumpet in Zion; sound the alarm on my holy mountain! Let all the inhabitants of the land tremble, for the day of the LORD is coming, it is near - a day of darkness and gloom, a day of clouds and thick darkness! Like blackness spread upon the mountains a great and powerful army comes; their like has never been from of old, nor will be again after them in ages to come. Yet even now, says the LORD, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the LORD, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing. Who knows whether he will not turn and relent, and leave a blessing behind him, a grain offering and a drink offering for the LORD, your God? Blow the trumpet in Zion; sanctify a fast; call a solemn assembly; gather the people. Sanctify the congregation; assemble the aged; gather the children, even infants at the breast. Let the bridegroom leave his room, and the bride her canopy. Between the vestibule and the altar let the priests, the ministers of the LORD, weep. Let them say, "Spare your people, O LORD, and do not make your heritage a mockery, a byword among the nations. Why should it be said among the peoples, Where is their God?"

We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, beatings, imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, hunger; by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; in honor and dishonor, in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see—we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

Jesus said, "Beware of practicing your piety before others in order to be seen by them; for then you have no reward from your Father in heaven. So whenever you give alms, do not sound a trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, so that they may be praised by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your alms may be done in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you. And whenever you pray, do not be like the hypocrites; for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, so that they may be seen by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. But whenever you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you. And whenever you fast, do not look dismal, like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces so as to show others that they are fasting. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. But when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, so that your fasting may be seen not by others but by your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you. Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

BEGINNING THE LENTEN JOURNEY

A period of silence is kept.

When the **bell sounds**, all are invited to leave their places and **visit the various stations**, each emphasizing an aspect of the journey of faith during the Lenten season. You may also choose to remain in your place for prayer and meditation.

During this time a single voice recites Psalm 51, followed by instrumental music for reflection. (See page 656 in the Book of Common Prayer if you would like to see the Psalm text as it is read.)

REMEMBERING MORTALITY

At the main altar rail, you may be marked with ashes, a sign of mortality and penitence.

RECALLING BAPTISM

At the **baptismal font** you are invited to recall your baptism. A cross is traced in your palm in reminder of baptism.

HEALING AND PRAYER

At the **prayer altar in the cross aisle**, you may ask for healing prayer with the laying on of hands and anointing.

Offering Prayer

In the **chapel**, you may offer prayers for the church, world, community, for all those in need and for yourself. You may light a candle if you wish.

WRITING LENTEN INTENTIONS

At the **table in front of the pulpit**, you are invited to write down one or more things you would like to accomplish in your Lenten journey. These are placed in a basket that is to be presented at the offertory and kept on the Holy Table throughout Lent. These cards will help kindle the new fire at the Easter Vigil.

Words Into Action

At the **table in the cross aisle**, you are invited to pick up cards inviting you to assist in baptismal ministry in the world through giving and volunteering.

Praying Through Color

At the **table in the cross aisle**, you are invited to pick up a marker and give yourself the gift of time and space to pray through coloring. In this hurried world, focusing on one thing is relaxing. For some people, coloring is a liberating way to pray. While the hands are active and creative, the mind has a chance to rest and to focus on God. Go ahead. Pick up a marker and color yourself closer to God.

At the conclusion of the Psalm and music, a brief period of silence is observed as all return to their seats. The **bell is sounded again** and the service continues with the **Litany of Penitence**.


At communion, you may place your offering in the basket at the head of the center aisle.


