About the Music

Notes by Geoffrey Wilchen

Prelude-Toccata

Gabriel Pierné succeeded César Franck as the organist of the Basilica de Sainte-Clotilde in Paris, and occupied the bench of its marvellous Cavaillé-Coll organ for almost a decade. He was also active as a conductor (leading the world premiere of Stravinsky's *The Firebird*) and a composer of large works such as his oratorio *La Croisade des Infants*, several ballets, a piano concerto, and also one of the early works for saxophone quartet. The Prelude-Toccata to be heard today rises twice from rhapsodic arpeggios to thunderous and cataclysmic assertions.

Leviathan

"There is the sea, vast and spacious... and the Leviathan, which You formed to frolic there."

-Psalm 104:25-26

Leviathan was born as a loosely-planned improvisation, which I subsequently set down on paper. I wanted to get outside some of my usual habits and create some music for organ that was full of images and scenery. The work begins with the sea, vast and spacious. Through references to the ninth century plainsong hymn Veni Creator Spiritus, the Spirit hovers over the waters. There are fishes swimming in its waters and seabirds crying above them, praising God in their own respective ways. Finally out of its depths comes the mighty monster, frisking and playing, and rejoicing in its life and its Maker, praising the God from whom all blessings flow.

The word "Leviathan" here means roughly "very large, very dangerous sea-dwelling creature." In ancient Hebrew literature, this is usually a fantastic monster, symbolic of overwhelming and destructive chaos. Thomas Hobbes gave the name to his theoretical Absolute Monarch whose unstoppable power alone could bring order to human society. More recent writers such as Herman Melville identified Leviathan with the great whales. However, Psalm 104 portrays the fearsome monster as God's own pet, exulting and praising God in its own way simply by being itself. Leviathan has a job: to frolic. The next verses of the psalm assert that all creatures, even great monsters, look to God to provide them their food "in due season."

Hymn Treatments

(Bridegroom / Wer Nur den Lieben Gott Läßt Walten / Westminster Abbey)

These three pieces all have their roots in improvisation. The first ("Like the Murmur of the Dove's Song") grew from the murmuring arpeggiated line which is heard from the very beginning. This line led me to calm, comforting places and verdant pastures which seemed appropriate for a gentle hymn to the Holy Ghost, the Comforter.

The second ("If Thou but suffer God to Guide Thee") is a solid German chorale and a dear old friend to me. The hymn is one of trust in God even through the confounding, dismaying and even frightening perils of life in the world. From it I took occasion to wander through strange and fragrant landscapes of harmony, sometimes letting the melody ride across the surface, sometimes hiding it deep within. God is not always easy for us to find.

The third ("Christ is Made the Sure Foundation") is melody adapted from one of Henry Purcell's anthems, "O God Thou Art My God." This exuberant treatment of an exuberant tune is still rolling on a course toward a final written form, and it is also an example of what I learned about hymn-based improvisations from the many works of the late Paul Manz, who in turn drew on Bach's chorale-based cantata movements and also the ritornello techniques of Vivaldi's multitudinous concertos.

Frescohaldi Toccata

Girolamo Frescobaldi publishes his collections of solo organ music, copies of which appear on the shelves of many important Baroque composers, notably including Johann Sebastian Bach. Frescobaldi, a contemporary of Monteverdi, treats tonal structure in a way that is reminiscent of the choral polyphony of the Notre Dame masters Leonin and Perotin. The bass is a series of extremely long notes possibly derived from Gregorian Chant. Each of these single notes becomes the basis for a long passage of free mayhem in upper voices. Those free upper voices take on a new and distinct melodic motive for each new bass note; reminiscent of the late madrigal style.

Debatable Variations

Among the first organ works I studied are the eight short preludes and fugues of Bach, BWV 553-560; I suspect I am not alone! They are well-known, oft-encountered pieces, and for that reason alone they become vulnerable to a certain disdain, and also to musicological attacks on their authenticity. After all, they are shorter and simpler than other organ works of the great master; they show occasional weaknesses which Bach usually avoids; and like a number of Bach's organ works, no manuscript copy has survived in the master's own handwriting. Alternate theories abound, enough to keep Bach scholars writing and publishing for years to come.

Meanwhile, this set of variations is based on the B-flat prelude (with its delightful Buxtehudean pedal break) and its modest little fugue, which I shall play to refresh your memory, because they are fun. The five variations draw upon the thematic bones of the prelude and fugue. Like their source, and unlike the other organ works of their alleged composer, they are concise and compact. The one surviving copy is written on entirely different paper from Wilcken's customary homemade staff paper, and the handwriting is difficult to match. The harmonic style, melodic contours and approach to rhythm and phrasing are also rather different from known Wilcken compositions; thus, it is conceivable that scholarly opinion will come to reject his authorship altogether and re-attribute them, perhaps to one of his students or an eccentric collector. More research is certainly needed.

Fantasia and Fugue in C minor (BWV 537)

The dark and wistful C-minor Fantasia spins out two melodic themes in the kind of fugal counterpoint for which Bach is justly revered. The first is a reaching leap followed by more rapid and shorter leaps, like a person repeatedly trying to catch something in mid-air. The second, whose octave leap is repaid in sobbing two-note teardrops, appears both normally and inverted. After a clear section-ending cadence, the two fugal themes return in the same order, worked out in a more elaborate harmonic path toward home—but home is not home to these wanderers after all, and they leave us on an unsatisfied dominant chord.

The resolution is the official fugue, which is built in a ternary form (unusual for Bach's fugues). First, he treats a bold subject that outlines tonic and dominant chords. Then, for a second section, not one but a pair of fugal subjects appears which are worked out together (one, a running stream of notes which forms gentle waves of harmony, and the other a string of long notes rising by half-steps). The second section reaches its cadence, and is answered by the returning first fugue theme, largely reprising the first section (though not exactly repeating it). The final cadence lands on the home key at last—but the upper voices remain tantalizingly stuck on an "unfinished" chord similar to the one which ends the Fantasia. They do finally resolve, but not before threatening further tormented development. This is a device sometimes described as a "feminine ending;" it is unusual in Bach's fugues, although it becomes much more common in the generations after Bach. Yet to this work of challenge, longing and frustration, it seems utterly appropriate.

The Love Amazing

"The Love Amazing" was written for the Episcopal Church of the Resurrection in Blue Springs for the organist and director of music, Vaughn Scarcliff, to be played as part of the dedication service for their new Johannus Ecclesia D-470 organ. Mr. Scarcliff suggested in particular that I might make something out of the THAXTED hymn tune, found in the movement Jupiter, the bringer of Jollity from Gustav Holst's suite *The Planets*. This soaring melody has been appropriated for a variety of hymns, including Michael Perry's O God Beyond All Praising, from which this work takes its title. As this was to be a dedication piece for a new organ, I felt that the work should explore as many as possible of that organ's colors and timbres—without making the work so specific that it could not be played anywhere else. Today's rendition is the second performance, and the first (to my knowledge) to be rendered on a different instrument.

The piece is about the way many different pieces come together to form a coherent whole, as the many different strands of nature weave together to glorify her glad Creator. In this work, the THAXTED tune has been taken apart into its constituent fragments, and these are used as motives to explore a wide variety of textures and colors. Each melodic idea winds through the various divisions of the organ, ranging from its dark and serious colors to its brightest and most exuberant, visiting along the way the mysterious, the unruly and the strange until they are brought together into a culminating statement of the complete hymn melody.

About the Artist

Geoffrey Wilcken is a prolific composer, conductor, organist and pianist. He has written for ensembles of all sizes and kinds, including solo, oratorio, concert band, jazz and liturgical forces. Recent commissions include One Out Of Many (2015) for the 40th anniversary festival concert of the Lawrence Civic Choir, Rosette (2014) for the dedication of a new organ at Village Presbyterian Church, Prairie Village, KS, and Music of the Spheres (2014) for the combined bands and choirs of Johnson County Community College, Overland Park, KS. He has also created numerous works for sacred and liturgical use, including Anthems for the Cross (2017) for St. Mary's Episcopal Church, and arrangements such as Angel Noels (2009) for the Kansas City Fine Arts Chorale, and a number of charts for jazz bands in the Kansas City metropolitan area. He is also the composer of the score for The Midwest in Panels (2014), a feature-length documentary about comic book shops.

He has twice won the Music Teachers National Association composition contest, and has been awarded the Anthony J. Cius outstanding composer prize. In 2015 he received the first ever Kansas Choral Composition award for his work, "Life's Symphony", and was named second runner-up in the 2017 ACDA Brock composition competition. He has titles currently available from Alliance Music Publications, Colla Voce Press and Alfred Publishing House.

Dr. Wilcken is an accomplished church musician, jazz pianist, continuo keyboardist, conductor, vocalist and organist who can currently be heard on the organ of historic St. Mary's Episcopal Church in downtown Kansas City. In addition, he has performed with various ensembles in Lawrence and the Kansas City area, including the Kansas City Fine Arts Chorale, Musica Vocale, and the Moon City Big Band, as well as serving as the artistic director of the Songflower Chorale, a semi-professional chamber choral ensemble in Kansas City. He has recently joined the music department of Kansas City Kansas Community College as staff accompanist for ensembles, and has already begun work on some custom arrangements for student groups there.
