From the Dean Hurry Up and Wait

While I write this we are all waiting. Yesterday, in anticipation of a grand jury decision on whether or not the officer who shot Michael Brown in Ferguson last summer will go to trial, the Governor of Missouri declared a State of Emergency. Who knows what will have happened by the time you read this. Many predict trouble no matter what the decision. One can only pray at this point for an outcome that includes healing and a good way forward.

Anxiety and tension often accompany waiting. It doesn't matter whether what one's waiting for is good or bad. All parents know what the days are like as the birth of a child nears, or until the call or text comes that a teenager had made it to a destination safely, sleep is near impossible. Those awaiting news on a pathology report are preoccupied with "What if?" and "Why me?"

We are well acquainted with waiting. But, waiting is a relative thing. It is changing in our times. Wait times in many instances are being reduced to next-to-nothing. Think of how rapidly we communicate with each other with all our electronic gadgets. We want things to be even faster! I find myself in a state of impatience when it comes to technology: "This website takes too long to come up on the screen!" "Can't Google Fiber go any faster?" We know all too well how quickly information and misinformation can spread through e-mails, Facebook posts, Tweets, and blog posts. "It may have been better to wait a bit," we rue when once gossip and rumor go viral.

Yesterday I saw my first Christmas tree set up in a building lobby. It wasn't displayed in a retail store where the red and green of Christmas has occupied space with the orange and black of Halloween. Not even Thanksgiving yet! I get the retail part. Merchants must make a living. However, it seems like holidays are anticipated earlier each year (Until a few years ago my big shopping days were 12/23 and 12/24. Don't ask about the wrapping). By the time Christmas comes that tree in the lobby is going to look plenty tired. How about waiting until the Plaza lights come on to start the decorating elsewhere?

Advent is waiting time. There is wisdom in this season. At some point our spiritual forebears took one of life's realities and turned it into days of expectation: Looking with both longing and holy fear for Christ's coming; Waiting for Christ's birth with both the joy and holy fear of expectant parents.

Some years ago there was an Advent devotional book titled, *Hurry Up and Wait!* That title gave me pause. Advent may be a season we need right now. Space is always opened up when we wait for good news and bad news, not-so-bad news and even surprises. In a world where instant communication and gratification collide with the ever-present reality of waiting, here is wisdom that speaks to our condition. Let's not miss Advent for all the Christmas around us. It may just help and bless us in our waiting!

Treasurer's Report

The income received by the Cathedral through October was higher than budgeted, as special gifts and higher endowment income more than offset the slow receipt of pledge payments through October. However, expenses at the Cathedral ran higher than expected through October, as unanticipated property and utility expenses were a significant drain on our resources. As a consequence, our net total as of the end of October is more negative

than expected. While income normally picks up at year end, balancing the budget this year will require



GHTC Provides Winter Coats for "New Americans"

The Social Outreach Committee recently provided new winter coats for 35 "New American" students at Gladstone and Whittier Elementary School in the Kansas City Public School District. These students have little or no experience with the English language and have had little or no formal education in their home country. Since most of these students are from tropical countries, they have

no experience with cold Missouri winters. Teachers at both schools were very appreciative that SOC was able to respond so quickly before the weather turned cold. While there certainly was a language barrier, the smiles on the students' faces translated their happiness in receiving the new winter coats and just in time for the cold winter weather and hopefully for them their first snow.

For these "New American" students attending Northeast High School, SOC provided 30 hygiene kits. These kits included a bath towel, two wash clothes, bar soap, shampoo, deodorant, body lotion, and lip balm. As these students learn essential life skills, they will also be learning the importance of hygiene as it relates to good health.






Dean's Advent Book & December Forum

Moravian Lovefeast

December 21, 5 p.m.

This service of carols, Scripture lessons, candle lighting and sharing over special buns and coffee provides an hour of peace before Christmas. The music includes familiar Advent and Christmas hymns, as well as Moravian Christmas hymns and anthems. Canon Musician John Schaefer and Cathedral Chorale Director William Baker are gathering singers and instrumentalists for the Lovefeast.

Holding Lovefeasts is a Moravian tradition dating back to the early eighteenth century. In 1717 a group of Moravian exiles were so moved at a celebration of Holy Communion that they stayed on to talk about the experience in small groups. Impressed by their piety and devotion, the German count on whose lands they had taken refuge, had food brought to them. The Lovefeast, inspired by this 1717 gathering and rooted in the early Christian practice of agape (love) meals, has been a part of Moravian practice ever since. Lovefeasts can be held at any time, but are often celebrated around major festivals such as Christmas, Epiphany, Easter, and Pentecost.

In offering the Lovefeast we seek to reach out to Moravians in the Kansas City area where there is no organized Moravian congregation. The Episcopal Church and the Moravian Church in North America are in full communion. We welcome this opportunity to share in this rich tradition received from our ecumenical partners. The Lovefeast is also offered for persons looking for a spiritual home. Coffee and buns in church? Why not?

The lighted, multi-pointed stars hanging in the Cathedral chancel and Founders' Hall are traditional Moravian Stars. It is customary that they be displayed and lighted from the First Sunday of Advent through The Epiphany, January 6.



In the next couple of weeks we all will be busy getting ready for the holidays; decorating our homes, cooking and baking


