## From the Dean Courage to Live Intentionally

"Time and tide wait for no man." Here is a modern day variant of age old advice. It speaks of the necessity to seize the day — to catch the wave — to read the times and to make the best of them. Embedded in the saying is the reality of seasons and rhythms in life. As tides ebb and flow, life advances and retreats while moving into the future.

"Nothing is certain but death and taxes." Benjamin Franklin shared this bit of wisdom late in 1789 in a letter written (in French) to his scientist friend, Jean-Baptiste Leroy. Franklin was commenting on the times. The young nation of the United States had just adopted its Constitution. It would most likely endure, Franklin mused. He wondered in his letter how his friend might be faring. Reports of the violent upheaval of the French Revolution had reached American shores.

The life of faith we live and profess is about pursuing the things that endure amid things that change. In the days ahead we have two opportunities to understand something more of faith wisdom.

The first weekend in March we are fortunate to welcome Dr. Matthew and Nancy Sleeth of Blessed Earth to Kansas City and the Cathedral (*see page 5*). The Sleeths present a good case for rediscovering the gift of Sabbath. In keeping ongoing Sabbath time of one down-day a week, one finds nurture and restoration of body, mind, and spirit.

"We need the Sabbath for the perspective it gives us." Dr. Sleeth writes. "You have more than you think if you have too little, and you have less than you think if you believe you have it all." Perspective on oneself is but one benefit of Sabbath. It is balm for our environmentally challenged world. A day when one unplugs and uses fewer resources gives rest and healing to the planet. It is good stewardship.

In the second weekend of May, Episcopal priest and author Barbara Crafton is with us to preach and to lead a workshop related to her recent book, *The Courage to Grow Old (see page 5)*. There is "a time to every purpose under heaven," the Book of Ecclesiastes proclaims. How we mature and age is also about stewardship of time, tapping into enduring wisdom, and living intentionally.

In preparation for these two events you may wish to read Dr. Sleeth's book, 24/6, A prescription for a healthier, happier life, and Barbara Crafton's, The Courage to Grow Old. Each of these books is available in our bookstore at a competitive price. A discussion of Crafton's book is taking place Sundays at 9:15 a.m., now through May 3, in the Common Room. A discussion of Dr. Sleeth's book takes place at the Dean's Forum, Sunday, March 1, in Founders' Hall.

We offer these events not only for the benefit of the Cathedral community, but for the greater good of church and world. Part of our purpose as a Cathedral is to broker things that endure in a changing world. We share a mission to be a resource center for worship and empowerment.

Of this we can be certain: We are entrusted with a treasury that offers life to a world always on the hunt for something better.

## Treasurer's Report

The year 2015 got off to a better financial start than in 2014 as pledge receipts in 2015 were well above those of 2014. The

better income numbers were partially offset by higher expenses this year. However, some of the

increase is only due to timing, as payments for some anticipated property expenses came earlier in the quarter this year. Other increases were caused by better staffing this year and the normal volatility associated with the timing of snow and ice removal costs. Lastly, the expenses associated with flowers this past Christmas exceeded the funds specifically contributed for that purpose.

While pledge receipts were up this year, fully funding the mission of the Cathedral requires the support of the entire congregation. If you have not already made a pledge, please prayerfully consider making one either online or by calling the office for a pledge form.



### Dean's Book for Lent: 24/6

This Lent consider reading 24/6: A Prescription for a Healthier, Happier Life. A discussion of the book will be March 1 during the Dean's Forum. The author, Dr. Matthew Sleeth, will visit GHTC this March. (See related article on page 5 of this newsletter.) The book is available in the Cathedral Bookstore.

From the book: "Remember the Sabbath, and keep it holy." Sounds nice, but how do we find rest in a 24/7 world? Just as the Hebrews

were slaves in Egypt, we have become slaves to technology. Our technological tools allow 24-hour productivity and connectivity, give us more control, and subtly enslave us to busyness itself. Sabbath is about restraint—intentionally not doing everything all the time just because we can. Setting aside a day of rest helps us reconnect with our Creator and find the peace of God that passes all understanding. The Sabbath is about letting go of the controls one day a week and letting God be God. So how do we do it?



Dr. Sleeth answers this question and others in this book that illustrates the philosophy of Blessed Earth, an educational nonprofit that inspires and equips people of faith to become better stewards of the earth.

In this introspective and challenging book, Episcopal priest, author, minister, and popular speaker, Barbara Crafton, shares profound insights into how Christians can cope with aging and do it with grace. Crafton shares reflections that inform, entertain, and challenge us to live into our age with joy and wonder. In her book, she addresses the aging process, letting go of youth, the advantages of growing old, and grace but no glamour. This reading is designed not simply for older people, but for younger people as well who are interested in wondering what lies ahead.

Barbara Crafton visits Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral May 9 for a workshop discussion of her latest book, The Courage

Reverend Crafton is an Episcopal priest, spiritual director and author of many books as well as the celebrated Almost Daily eMo from the Geranium Farm, read by thousands worldwide. She was rector of St. Clement's

Church in Manhattan's Theatre district. She was also a chaplain on the waterfront of New York, and served both historic Trinity Church, Wall Street and St. John's Church in Greenwich Village. She also served as a chaplain at Ground Zero during the recovery effort after the 9/11 attacks.

An actress, director and producer, she has worked for many years in combining the lively arts and the life of faith. Her books, articles, and radio scripts have won many awards, including numerous Polly Bond Awards from Episcopal Communicators and the coveted Gabriel Award for religious broadcasting.

## Holy Week 2015

Palm Sunday: March 29

8 a.m., 10:15 a.m., 5 p.m. Eucharist

The 10:15 a.m. service begins in Founders' Hall.

We gather to recall Jesus' entry into Jerusalem with the blessing of palms and a procession. The joyful arrival shifts to a drama of darkness and shadow as we read Matthew's story of Christ's passion and death. We enter into the story by singing hymns, offering prayer and sharing Eucharist. Nursery open for children three and younger during the 8 & 10:15 a.m. services. Children's Chapel begins after Communion.

#### Weekdays of Holy Week: March 30-April 1 Monday, Tuesday & Wednesday 12:05 p.m. & 5:30 p.m. Eucharist

The gospel lessons for each day center on Jesus' movement toward his suffering, death and resurrection.

#### The Three Days · The Sacred Triduum

#### Moundy Thursday, April 2 12:05 p.m., A simple Eucharist 6 p.m., Maundy Thursday Liturgy

The 6 p.m. service begins in Founders' Hall.

We remember Jesus' last meal with his disciples by listening to the gospel, washing feet as a sign of servant ministry, sharing the bread and wine of Eucharist and eating an agape meal together. We process to the Cathedral to sing, pray and witness the stripping of the altar. Spiritual direction and reconciliation (confession) are available following the service. The Cathedral is open for prayer until 9 p.m. *Nursery open for children three and younger.* 

#### Good Friday, April 3 12:05 p.m. & 7 p.m. Good Friday Liturgy

The service includes the singing of the Passion according to John, choral and instrumental music, familiar hymns, customary prayers and veneration of the cross of Christ. Nursery open for children three and younger by reservation only (childrensformation@kccathedral. org, 816-474-8260).

#### 2:30 & 5 p.m. Way of the Cross

This simple liturgy has its roots in the early practices of the church in Jerusalem. We follow Jesus on his journey to the cross. Participants are invited to share in readings, prayers and in carrying a cross from station to station. The 5 p.m. service includes ways for chidren to participate.

#### Holy Saturday, April 4 12:05 p.m. Liturgy

This brief and simplest of all liturgies recalls the mournful desolation of the lifeless Christ in the tomb.

#### Celebrating the Resurrection

### Easter Eve, April 4

#### 7:30 p.m. The Great Vigil of Easter

This service of Light, Lessons, Christian Initiation and Eucharist is the principal service of the Church Year. The Bishop presides and preaches at this first celebration of Easter. *Nursery open for children three and younger by reservation only (childrensformation@kccathedral.org*, 816-474-8260).

The congregation gathers in Founders' Hall prior to the lighting of the new fire in the Memorial Courtyard. All then move to the darkened Cathedral nave as the service continues. We celebrate the baptism and affirmation of baptism with those who have taken part in The Way. A festive reception follows the service in Founders' Hall.

#### Easter Day, April 5

#### 8 a.m. and 10:15 a.m. Festival Holy Eucharist

Hymns, choral music, brass and a Cathedral resplendent with flowers accompany our Easter morning celebrations. Children uncover the "Alleluia" buried away at the end of Epiphany as a prelude to the entire assembly acclaiming, "Alleluia. Christ is risen." Nursery open for children three and younger during the 8 & 10:15 a.m. services. Children's Chapel begins after the Collect of the Day.

Festive receptions follow each service. An Easter Egg Hunt follows the 10:15 a.m. service.

Note: The Cathedral office is closed Easter Monday, April 6.

### Easter Parking

In order to make room for Easter guests, if you are able, please use on-street parking or park in the parking garage on the north side of 13th Street (enter by either entrance — from 13th Street or Washington). Parking passes that allow you to exit the garage without paying are available from the ushers.

#### Labyrinth available during Holy Week

Labyrinth walk for private meditation is available in Founders' Hall Palm Sunday afternoon through Wednesday evening

and also Good Friday until 7 p.m. (The labyrinth is not available Maundy Thursday to allow for setup for the evening liturgy.)

The labyrinth is an ancient pattern that has been found in many cultures around the world.

Labyrinths have only one path to the center. You walk in by a winding path and exit the same way.

A printed guide will be available in Founders' Hall to assist you as you walk the labyrinth.
