FROM THE DEAN A Stewardship Timeline

5 Years Old About this time I got used to a weekly Sunday dole of 10 cents for the collection and 10 cents for penny candy at the news store after church. Those sweet Mercury Head and Roosevelt dimes mostly got to their destination.

10 Years Old I tried to fill a "mission" card with quarters for Lent. A full card would equal \$10. My card did not quite weigh in as many of the coin slots were empty. It was a nice thought. A quarter bought a lot in those days.

15 Years Old Whenever I went to church I made a point of giving a dollar. It was a nice offering that became my standard for years to come.

18 Years Old A local merchant who was a survivor of the Holocaust stretched out his open hand to me and invited me to think on these words, "An open hand is never empty." Many times I can still hear his words when I am handed change (a rare occurrence these days) or witness an act of generosity.

21 Years Old I often attended a church where at the time of the offering anyone who had a need at that very moment could take up to \$10 out of the plate. Those plates were piled high with ones, fives, tens and twenties! The expectation was stated that when one's fortunes had changed, the Lord would receive the money back and then some. \$10 filled a car with gas and then some in those days.

26 Years Old I learned that \$1 a week for the offering was pretty weak. I was at first shocked and shamed (in a good way) when I learned what the woman who would be my wife gave annually to the church. I learned that it was more than some Wall Street bankers in the congregation were giving. It was definitely way more than I was giving. My next step was to give at least \$2 a week?!

29 Years Old The pastor father-in-law of the Stewardship Chair in our parish that year shared his faith story and how he had become a tither. I'd heard plenty about tithing by this time. This one hit a spiritual nerve. Mary and I started on the journey to tithing — giving ten percent of our combined income for the work of the church. Like any journey it began with one step. It has not always been easy.

30 Years Old Our son was born. We both left good-paying jobs. We moved. I began three years of graduate school. Divinity School expenses would be supplemented by the generosity of individuals and congregations. I learned firsthand the power of community. We learned how to get by, eat well, and have fun on a very tight budget.

33 Years Old In my first position on a clergy staff the Rector was a tither. In the Episcopal Church, Authority is gained through example.

40 + Years Old The clergyman I worked with handed me a list of several pages. It was a list of givers in the congregation with annual amounts each gave. I was embarrassed to look at it. "You need to know this," he said. A doctor, banker, or lawyer knows these things.

50 + Years Old With no more school costs in sight we could begin to see the possibility of giving beyond a tithe. In time I would meet a bishop who published his annual giving. With fear and trembling I would do the same.

Present + We are tithers. We give beyond ten percent for other church ministries. We give to schools and other institutions. We do well.

Over Time To this day I can still feel my mother placing a dime in my hand while saying, "Make sure you put this in. It's what you give to God." I hear the accented voice of a refugee grateful to be alive say, all the while stretching out his weathered palm to me, "An open hand is never empty." The unvarnished testimony of that school janitor who preached on weekends still tells his the story of how he got his life together — and how in gratitude he gave his tithe for God's kingdom. I hear Mary's voice, no judgment or vanity coloring her words, "That's what I give."

May God use us, our stories, and our resources as we share ministry in this place and time.

Treasurer's Report

Income for the month of August was below last year due to the timing of disbursements from an externally managed trust. Pledge and plate were actually above the 2014 levels. Expenses this August were below last year's, primarily because of lower property expenses, which can vary significantly from month to month as repair costs fluctuate.

The income shortfall and the lower repair costs offset each other, and August net operating income was in line with last year.

and endowment income more than offset the temporarily lower distribution from the externally managed trust. In further good news, expenses ran lower than last year, especially in the property and administrative areas. Taken together, the better income and lower expenses mean that the Cathedral has a better cushion as it approaches the higher seasonal expenses usually encountered in the fall.

Book of Remembrance

We gather names and add them to a book started in 2007. It is a lasting memorial of "those we love but see no longer." The book is displayed in the Cathedral on All Saints' Sunday. The names are also be listed in the worship booklet. During the liturgy there is a time when lectors read aloud the names of those who have died in the past 12 months, followed by a time when all present say aloud names of those they would like remembered.

Forms for submitting names will be available at services beginning October 11. You can place these in the offering plate or in the basket on the ushers' table. Names can also be e-mailed to communications@ kccathedral.org. The deadline for submitting names is Tuesday, October 27.

All Saints' Memorial

You are invited to bring photographs of departed loved ones with you to church Sundays, October 18 & 25. Individual snap shots work best, though you may submit framed photographs as well. Please limit the size of photos to 8x10 and smaller. Photos will not be harmed and will be returned. Put photos in the envelopes (provided at the entrances to the Cathedral) then place the envelope in the baskets. Place your name, phone and email on the back of each photo. These will be become part of a display near the baptismal font. We pass by this "great cloud of witnesses" — the Communion of Saints — as we go to the altar for Eucharist. Photos will be available to take home the following Sunday in Founders' Hall.
