FROM THE DEAN Pilgrims' Way of Lent

This is both a personal invitation and a check list for the journey ahead of us. Come on the practical and spiritual road that is the season of Lent.

There are many places to begin and many ways to go. All lead to the celebration of sharing in the living memorial of Christ's death and resurrection.

As with any trip there are things to take into account before setting out on the road. There are things to expect along the way:

- □ **Map the Route** What about Christian faith and living? The Way continues on Wednesday evenings with a focus on preparing for Christian Initiation at the Easter Vigil: baptism, confirmation, reception into this church and reaffirmation of baptism.
- Pass Through New Territory Wednesday evenings in Lent we are pleased to welcome Dr. Glenn Young, assistant professor of theology and religious studies at Rockhurst University, who presents "Medieval Christian Mysticism: What Does it Say to Us Today?" Mysticism, what's this?
- Prepare for What's Ahead Using Barbara Crafton's book, *The Courage to Grow Old*, Jim Robertson leads weekly discussions, Sundays at 9:15 a.m. The Reverend Crafton comes to the Cathedral, May 9 & 10 for a Saturday workshop and to preach on Sunday.
- Ask Directions The Dean welcomes questions and facilitates discussion about issues of faith and living each Sunday in Lent at 9:15 a.m. in Founders' Hall. We'll have the Spirit as our guide and see where our questions take us.
- Say Your Prayers Come for a half hour of quiet reflection at Contemplative Eucharist, Wednesdays at 5:30 p.m. Eucharist is also celebrated Monday through Friday at 12:05 p.m. in the Chapel. Pick up devotional materials for keeping Lent available in the Tower and Founders' Hall entries, beginning February 15.
- **Stock Up On Provisions** Each week of Lent

you are invited to bring a different food item or necessity for the food pantry at St. Mary's. Add these items to your shopping list and look for good deals. Our neighbors in need will appreciate it.

- □ Leave a Gentle Mark The first weekend in March, 6-8, we welcome Dr. Matthew and Nancy Sleeth of Blessed Earth. At Friday and Saturday workshops, they talk about the challenge of keeping Sabbath as an act of stewardship for one's life and the planet. Dr. Sleeth, who has been a frequent preacher at the National Cathedral, preaches Sunday, March 8. He is author of, 24/6, the Dean's book for Lent. (Life can be simpler and more meaningful.)
- □ **Expect the Unexpected** From the screen and keyboard of your electronic device you can participate in Lent Madness. Yes, that's Lent Madness! Enter your brackets daily, just as you might do in the NCAA basketball tourney for an exciting time in the arena where God's saints play. Curious? Go to lentmadness.org.
- □ Simply Begin Ash Wednesday, February 18, we offer a briefer liturgy for working persons at 7 a.m., a liturgy that includes hymns at 12:05 p.m., again with working persons in mind, and at 7 p.m. when the choir sings and we observe a creative open, journeying space within the liturgy. Can't make it to the Cathedral? Find a church nearby wherever you happen to be! Every journey begins with that first step.

Treasurer's Report

In December of 2014, income was in line with December of 2013 as the Cathedral had high pre-payments of 2015 pledges. The expenses last month were lower than in 2013 as last year the Cathedral made lump sum payments of cost of living allowances to the staff. These payments were to cover the whole year of

2013 and were the first staff compensation increases in several years The new level of compensation was then paid on a regular monthly basis in 2014. Last year also saw higher expenses for

property, due to weather, and for support of the larger church through our Diocesan assessment.

Turning to the year as a whole, pledge and plate in 2014 were in line with the totals in 2013, while endowment income was up reflecting the impact of strong security markets over the last few years. However, the Cathedral experienced a deficit in 2014 as expenses increased faster than income. The higher expenses in 2014 were primarily in the areas of property and utilities, driven by the weather early in the year. The Cathedral also spent more on education, parish life and music than in 2013. These expenses were associated with growth initiatives of the Cathedral.

The Cathedral is blessed to have a healthy endowment to support the ongoing expenses of maintaining our facilities. However, funding of ministries that serve the congregation need the active financial support of the congregation. If you have not already done so, please prayerfully consider making a pledge in 2015 in support of the Cathedral's mission.

Looking Ahead to Lent



7 a.m. Liturgy

Designed for persons on their way to or from work this is the briefest of the three services. The essential elements of the Ash Wednesday liturgy are included in a contemplative setting.

12:05 p.m. Liturgy

This service is shaped to include both the downtown business community and persons who are free during the day. Two hymns are included in this traditional Ash Wednesday liturgy.

7 p.m. Liturgy

This traditional service features *open space*. Following the invitation to a holy lent, those present visit various "stations" around the nave to be marked with ashes in acknowledgment of mortality, be signed with water as a reminder of baptism, light candles and offer prayer, pick up information on ways to engage in outreach, receive laying-on-of-hands and anointing for healing, and fill out a card with personal Lenten intentions to be presented at the Offertory. Following the open space, the liturgy continues with the Litany of Penitence and Holy Communion.

Labyrinth Walk, All Day and Evening

A labyrinth is available in Founders' Hall beginning at 7 a.m. Walking a labyrinth is a spiritual exercise to quiet, center and allow contemplation and prayer.

Ashes To Go

Cathedral clergy and others are commissioned at noon and go out into city streets to distribute ashes to anyone who desires to be marked with them.

In this introspective and challenging book, Episcopal priest, author, minister and popular speaker Barbara Crafton shares profound insights into how Christians can cope with aging and do it with grace. Crafton shares reflections that inform, entertain, and challenge us to live into our age with joy and wonder. In her book, she addresses the aging process, letting go of youth, the advantages of growing old and grace but no glamour. This reading is designed not simply for older people, but for younger people as well who are interested in wondering what lies ahead.

Reverend Crafton is an Episcopal priest, spiritual director and author of

many books as well as the celebrated *Almost Daily eMo from the Geranium Farm*, read by thousands worldwide. She was rector of St. Clement's Church in Manhattan's Theatre district. She was also a chaplain on the waterfront of New York, and served both historic Trinity Church, Wall Street and St. John's Church in Greenwich Village. She was a chaplain at Ground Zero during the recovery effort after the WTC attack.

An actress, director and producer, she has worked for many years in combining the lively arts and the life of faith. Her books, articles, and radio scripts have won many awards, including numerous Polly Bond Awards from Episcopal Communicators and the coveted Gabriel Award for religious broadcasting.

Dean's Book for Lent: 24/6

This Lent consider reading 24/6: A Prescription for a Healthier, Happier Life. A discussion of the book will be March 22 during the Dean's Forum. The author, Dr. Matthew Sleeth, will visit GHTC this March. (See related article on page 7 of this newsletter.) The book is available in the Cathedral Bookstore.

From the book: "Remember the Sabbath, and keep it holy." Sounds nice, but how do we find rest in a 24/7 world? Just as the Hebrews were slaves in

Egypt, we have become slaves to technology. Our technological tools allow 24-hour productivity and connectivity, give us more control, and subtly enslave us to busyness itself. Sabbath is about restraint—intentionally not doing everything all the time just because we can. Setting aside a day of rest helps us reconnect with our Creator and find the peace of God that passes all understanding. The Sabbath is about letting go of the controls one day a week and letting God be God. So how do we do it?



Dr. Sleeth answers this question and others in this book that illustrates the philosophy of Blessed Earth, an educational nonprofit that inspires and equips people of faith to become better stewards of the earth.
