FROM THE DEAN Holy Habitat

The numbers are going down.

The news is widespread though you may have missed it. It's not, I suppose, the kind of news that most people would be concerned about or would like to hear. The number of practicing Christians in the United States is declining. The number of persons claiming no religious affiliation is rising. In the mainline Protestant churches, the shrinking of the church is taking place more noticeably than for Roman Catholics or evangelical churches. But, with few exceptions numbers are either in decline or stagnant.

With such trends and the statistics to back them up, it is easy to be drawn into a downward spiraling vortex. Such thinking is normal, but it is contrary to our tradition. Here it is better to declare with Paul when he writes about internal woes plaguing the first century church at Corinth, "We are treated ... as dying, and see, we are alive." 2 Corinthians 6:8, 9 Paul writes to the Corinthian church with which he has had problems. He encourages them in their life in Christ. In the midst of external and internal problems, grace is sufficient.

The numbers of the stately monarch butterfly are in decline. Habitat loss is the culprit. In North America the milkweed species critical to monarch reproduction has been severely reduced due to development and to chemicals used in farming. Forests in Mexico where the butterflies overwinter are being cut down and threatened by disease and eratic weather patterns. In response to this crisis scientists urge protection of existing habitat and taking measures to restore and enhance habitat.

Welcoming Back STEPHEN MINISTRY

I am so grateful to be part of the team that is bringing Stephen Ministry back to Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral. Recent training in St.

Louis was excellent, and we were able to see how our community would benefit from having Stephen Ministers as part of our Cathedral Caregiving Ministry.

The mission for the program is "to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ." Ephesians 4:12–13

When I was in treatment for cancer last year, I was a care receiver. I experienced care and concern from this community. I received several ministries, including hospital and home visits, communion visits, intercessory prayers and healing prayers at church after communion. I received calls, cards and support from individuals that I really did know well, as I was new to the congregation. The people from this community who chose to care about me and offer support were instrumental in my healing. I felt the love and compassion of Christ through their ministries. I am so blessed and honored to be healthy enough to serve the community that served me in my time of need as a Stephen Leader.

The training that we will begin this autumn will enable us to enhance and expand care giving for our church community. A Stephen Minister is a caring volunteer who has received 50 hours of training, learning skills such as active listening, reflecting feelings, assertiveness and boundaries. Confidentiality is a core component of the training.

Treasurer's Report

April saw lower pledge and plate payments than in 2014. The result was a larger monthly operating deficit than in 2014, even though expenses for the month were well contained vs. both the budget and last year. On a YTD basis, income was stronger than

last year as better e n d o w m e n t i n c o m e a n d higher user fees offset the sluggish receipt of pledge p a y m e n t s. With regard to expenses, this has been a good start to the year with lower expenses vs. both the



Why do butterflies matter? According to the English organization Butterfly Conservation, butterflies aid scientists of all stripes in investigating "areas of biological research, including such diverse fields as navigation, pest control, embryology, mimicry, evolution, genetics, population dynamics and biodiversity conservation." Besides, they are beautiful and are a metaphor for fanciful freedom.

On the Day of Pentecost, May 24 this year, the day we celebrate the birth of God's called-together church, the monarch butterfly served as a symbol of the Holy Spirit for us. Handmade paper butterflies hovered above altar flowers. Small pots of habitatenhancing orange milkweed were sold. The funds raised will help pay for planting a way station of "butterfly friendly" common milkweed in our rain garden on the south side of the campus.

In the midst of declines and species crises the practical wisdom is that every bit of habitat helps. Way stations sustain and give life. As in the natural world, so it is in the world of the Spirit. With a shifting religious landscape, places where nurturing habitat is cultivated and souls are fed with spiritual food matter all the more. What we have going for us at the Cathedral is the holy habitat of worship to feed souls. What we need to do better is to take our story into the world. The human species may not know that it is hungering for connection in Christ. As one person has written about the church in today's societal flux, it is a time for us "to embrace the decline." We are blessed to have our way station of real church, real people, in the heart of the city.


