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From the Dean Life-long Learners

Here is something we all share in common. Every day we pick up new knowledge and reprocess old information. Often "life-long learner" is an honorary title bestowed on individuals being praised in a speech, eulogy or write-up. The concept comes up in resumes and job descriptions. It is an implied base goal cited for students set forth in degree programs and other courses: "You are expected to be a life-long learner."

Taking part in the Christian life implies this very thing. Often I hear the question, "Is there a book I can read (or a website I can go to) where I can learn about the Episcopal Church and what it believes?" For years I kept a bibliography of titles in my head, geared to interest/age/educational levels to share when this question came up. I'd always caution, however, that no one resource really satisfies this pursuit. In more recent years I have found that I take a more comprehensive approach.

Learning about Christian faith in the Anglican/Episcopal tradition and practice is more than a book, or a course, or super website. Formation involves becoming familiar with multiple sources and methods, and sitting at the feet of the great teacher of ongoing experience. Life-long faith formation is an automatic given in the baptismal promise taken right out of the Acts of the Apostles, "Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, the breaking of bread and in the prayers?"

When it comes to adult formation at the Cathedral, a group of persons, some well-established and others new to the community, recently looked at this area of our common life. They reviewed what we currently are doing and what we have done in the past. The real energy in that meeting came as new ideas were shared. At the center of the group's envisioning is the understanding that formation happens on many levels, takes many forms, and evolves over time. 
Birthday Presents for Foster Children

In this hard-hitting paperback, Kenneth Leech writes: "The cross stands between human fallenness and human fulfillment, between dust and glory, between Eden and the New Jerusalem." According to this Anglican priest, the Lenten experience involves a rendezvous with the scandal of Christ's passion. The Jesus who "entered into the pain of the world" calls us to do the same.


Leech exhorts readers to study and enact the Lord's servanthood, the ethic of nonviolence, and the love of enemies. This resource is studied during Lent by many church small groups.

Lent is Not Rocket Science: An Exploration of God, Creation, and the Cosmos by W. Nicholas Knisely Published by Forward Movement, Jan. 2014, ISBN: 9780880283588

The season of Lent prompts us to ask questions, big and small, about the nature of our being, and about our role in the world. Astronomer, physicist and Episcopal Bishop W. Nicholas Knisely explores the intersection of faith and science, creation and the cosmos.

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The Rt. Rev. W. Nicholas Knisely was consecrated in 2012 as the 13th Bishop of the Diocese of Rhode Island. Prior to his election as bishop, he served as a priest in Delaware, Western and Eastern Pennsylvania and as dean of Trinity Cathedral in Phoenix, Arizona. Bishop Knisely earned an undergraduate degree in



physics and astronomy and did graduate work in cosmology and solid state physics before entering seminary. He taught physics and astronomy for seven years at Lehigh University and is part of the Episcopal Network for Science, Technology & Faith.



March 28 Concert: The Saint Thomas Choir of Men and Boys, *tickets on sale now*



The Saint Thomas Choir of Men and Boys will be in concert at the Cathedral Friday, March 28 at 7:30 p.m. Tickets are on sale through Central Ticket Outlet 816-235-6222 or follow the link posted at kccathedral.org/musicevents).

The Saint Thomas Choir of Men and Boys is considered by many to be the leading ensemble in the Anglican choral tradition in the United States. Directed since 2004 by John Scott, formerly Organist and Director of Music at St. Paul's Cathedral in London, the choir performs regularly with period instrument ensembles, Concert Royal and Sinfonia New York, or with the Orchestra of St. Luke's as part of its own concert series. Its primary *raison d'être*, however, is to provide music for five choral services each week. Live webcasts of all choral services and further information including recordings of the choir may be found at www.Saint-ThomasChurch.org.

Supplementing its choral services and concert series over the past three decades, the choir has toured throughout the United States and Europe with performances at Westminster Abbey and St. Paul's Cathedral in London, Kings College, Cambridge, Windsor, Edinburgh, St. Albans and the Aldeburgh Festival. In 2004, the choir toured Italy, and performed for a Papal Mass at the Vatican. During 2007, the choir performed Bach's Saint Matthew Passion for the opening concert of the Mexico Festival in Mexico City as well as at Saint Thomas Church. More recent concerts have included the Bach Mass in B Minor; the Monteverdi Vespers of 1610; a Henry Purcell anniversary concert; Rachmaninoff Vespers; the U.S. premiere of John Tavener's Mass; a concert of American composers featuring works by Bernstein and Copland as well as a composition by Saint Thomas chorister, Daniel Castellanos; the first modern performance of Richter's Missa Hyemalis, the world premiere of Scott Eyerly's *Spires* and a concert of music by Benjamin Britten. In the summer of 2012, the Choir of sang concerts in Germany, including performances at Magdeburg Cathedral; Thomaskirche, Leipzig; Frauenkirche, Dresden; Berliner Dom; and in Copenhagen Cathedral in Denmark.

The Men of the Saint Thomas Choir are professional singers; the Boy choristers attend Saint Thomas Choir School. Founded in 1919, it is the only church-related boarding choir school in the United States, and one of only a few choir schools remaining in the world. The Choir School offers a challenging pre-preparatory curriculum, interscholastic sports, and musical training for boys in grades three through eight. The Choir School is committed to training and educating talented musicians without regard to religious, economic, or social background. Choristers are sought from all regions of the country.

Treasurer's Report

For the 2013 year income exceeded budget by nearly \$12,000 which was assisted by pledges exceeding budget by nearly \$10,000. Pledge income was up nearly 7 percent from 2012. Expenses for the year

were over budget by approximately \$6,500 which resulted in net operating income of just under \$10,000 for the year.

The importance of the pledge income cannot be understated. Receiving more pledges than budgeted for 2013 was a

Additionally, there has been a trend of having approximately 50 families with no increases in pledges over the past two years.
