FROM THE DEAN

Glad to be here

“I’m glad to be here!” That is the unanimous opinion expressed by members of the Budget Committee this past week. This was said in more ways than there were people around the table. Those who were present are excited about their faith and the Cathedral: “This is a lively place.” “This is a real community.” “The congregation is welcoming and diverse.” “The music is superb and transcendent.” “The liturgy is done well.” “The Cathedral and grounds are places of much beauty.” “There are lots of new people.” “Our people do much to help this church, the community and the world.”

Typically, budget meetings are dry—mostly about income and expenses. Focus is on planning and number crunching, projections for revenue sources and prudent management of resources. At times, a palpable undertow of economic angst breaks the surface and pulls at heart and purse strings. Not this time. Yes, the committee members ran the numbers and reviewed the current fiscal landscape. They came to terms with projected shortfalls. Pledges totaling \$76,000 to reach our goal have yet to be made. And yes, the committee members believe that with God’s help these funds can be raised. With the support of the people who love this place and are “glad to be here,” even greater things than these can happen.

What’s at stake when seen from the perspective of the Budget Committee is the way forward in ministry and congregational growth in the coming months. Essentially the \$76,000 (not yet received!) of expected pledge commitments represent two areas of staff development: The hiring of an **Associate Priest for Young Adults and Outreach** and a **Parish Life Coordinator**. These positions are planned to address areas of ministry that have been identified as top priorities by the congregation and Vestry.

Calling an Associate Priest for Young Adults and Outreach is directly tied to ministry to our immediate community and

to the future vitality of the Cathedral community. We would like to call a new seminary graduate to join the staff as a priest charged with gathering the young adult community. This makes sense. This is direct outreach to the residents in the Downtown and Crossroads neighborhoods, and would be in support of the young adults already attending the Cathedral. Other church groups have moved already into the downtown area to do this very thing!

Directly related to this is our long-standing commitment to Outreach. Addressing need and changing the world for the better is what young adults crave when it comes to church. All that we do in the Name of God carries credence and integrity when it issues in direct ministry dealing with human and environmental needs. Church is about changing lives and changing the world. The new Associate Priest would gather and challenge all of us to continue and expand Outreach.

Much more of what we do depends on gathering and empowering people. The gifts and time of volunteers need to be used creatively and effectively both for the life of the Cathedral community and for its mission in the city and beyond. To meet this need a Parish Life Coordinator would be called to manage the people needed for community life and ministry.

Now comes your part. We need your prayers and your commitment. Claim that part of your Christian journey, which is to pray, share, and give for the kingdom of God. Giving is a tangible sign of the covenant that binds us as God’s people in this place. Make a pledge of financial support today as you are able for the ministry of the Cathedral.

One hundred-fifty one households have made pledges for 2014 representing \$424,000. More than two-hundred households who see this church as a spiritual home have not. Some who have been faithful in pledging yearly have not yet renewed. Should each of these make a commitment, far more than our current need for 2014 would be met.

This is a lively place. This is a real community. The congregation is welcoming and diverse. The music is superb and transcendent. The liturgy is done well. The Cathedral and grounds are places of much beauty. There are lots of new people. Our people do much to help this church, the community and the world.

What makes you glad about the Cathedral?

Conflict Transformation Skills for Churches Workshop

Saturday, May 10 • 9 a.m.-4:30 p.m.

Conflict is a normal part of life, even in the church. Understanding this can help church members realize that they should not be surprised or ashamed when they experience conflict in their faith communities. What is important is how the conflicts that inevitably arise are addressed. The *Conflict Transformation Skills for Churches* workshop teaches some basic skills that will help participants manage conflicts within their congregations in a healthier manner.

The goal of the workshop is prevention. We want participants to gain the understanding and the skills needed to prevent destructive conflicts. We also want participants to see how church conflict can be transformed into an opportunity to learn something new about God's will for their church.

This workshop is led by the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center (LMPC), a non-profit ministry whose mission is "to proclaim Christ's good news, the gospel of peace and justice, and to be active in the sacred ministry of reconciliation."

Treasurer's Report

For the month of February, income exceeded expenses as pledge payments rebounded somewhat from a slow start to the year in January.

However, for the first two months of the year, the Cathedral incurred a modest deficit. Expenses ran above income to start the year primarily due to the timing of

Calling knitters and crocheters

You are invited to join others who have begun work as participants in a project sponsored by the Eine Welt organization in Schwäbisch Gmünd, Germany. The purpose of the project is to take advantage of the one-hundredth anniversary of the beginning of World War I as an opportunity to raise awareness among the town's citizenry and visitors of the organization's mission that includes promoting peace and human rights throughout the world.

The project itself consists of "yarn-bombing"* the Siegestsäule (victory column) that is in Schwäbisch Gmünd's central marketplace. In order to accomplish this, 1,670 11cm by 11cm (4.3" x 4.3") knitted or crocheted squares are needed to wrap the column in a huge patchwork stocking. The squares can be made of any color or weight yarn and with any size needle as long as the finished product is the required size. The deadline for finishing the squares is April 24th so they can be sent on to Germany for assembly in time for the "bombing" of the column on August 1, 2014. Cordula Reichert, the German project chairman, says if more squares are received than are needed for the project, the extras will be sewn together into blankets for persons in Third World areas.



Those interested in participating in the project can make squares at home and deposit them in the Yarn-bombing Project basket in the Tower and/or come to the second Yarn-bombing Workshop scheduled for **Saturday, April 12**. If you are interested in participating, need yarn, and/

or need more information, please contact Candy McDowell at 816-741-0992 or candylee@kc.rr.com.

Those who deposit yarn squares in the Yarn-bombing Basket are asked to attach a note describing what was originally knit with the yarn. So far original projects include newborn caps for babies in Haiti, a prayer shawl for a friend, bags, cowls and scarves for friends and family, sweaters for grandchildren, baby blankets, and hats for homeless folks.



Journey through Holy Week to Easter

Palm Sunday: April 13

8 a.m., 10:15 a.m., 5 p.m. Eucharist

The 10:15 a.m. service begins in Founders' Hall.

We gather to recall Jesus' entry into Jerusalem with the blessing of palms and a procession. The joyful arrival shifts to a drama of darkness and shadow as we read Matthew's story of Christ's passion and death. We enter into the story by singing hymns, offering prayer and sharing Eucharist. *Nursery open for children three and younger during the 8 & 10:15 a.m. services. Children's Chapel begins after Communion.*

Weekdays of Holy Week: April 14-16

The gospel lessons for each day center on Jesus' movement toward his suffering, death and resurrection.

The 6 p.m. service begins in Founders' Hall.

We remember Jesus' last meal with his disciples by listening to the gospel, washing feet as a sign of servant ministry, sharing the bread and wine of Eucharist and eating an agape meal together. We process to the Cathedral to sing, pray and witness the stripping of the altar. Spiritual direction and reconciliation (confession) are available following the service. The Cathedral is open for prayer until 9 p.m. *Nursery open for children three and younger.*

Good Friday, April 18

12:05 p.m. & 7 p.m. Good Friday Liturgy

The service includes the singing of the Passion according to John, choral and instrumental music, familiar hymns, customary prayers and veneration of the cross of Christ. *Nursery open for children three and younger by reservation only (childrensformation@kccathedral.org, 816-474-8260).*

2:30 p.m. Way of the Cross

This simple liturgy has its roots in the early practices of the church in Jerusalem. We follow Jesus on his journey to the cross. Participants are invited to share in readings, prayers and in carrying a cross from station to station.

Holy Saturday, April 19

12:05 p.m. Liturgy

This brief and simplest of all liturgies recalls the mournful desolation of the lifeless Christ in the tomb.

Celebrating the Resurrection

Easter Eve, April 19

7:30 p.m. The Great Vigil of Easter

This service of Light, Lessons, Christian Initiation and Eucharist is the principal service of the Church Year. The Bishop presides and preaches at this first celebration of Easter. *Nursery open for children three and younger by reservation only (childrensformation@kccathedral.org, 816-474-8260).*

The congregation gathers in Founders' Hall prior to the lighting of the new fire in the Memorial Courtyard. All then move to the darkened Cathedral nave as the service continues. We celebrate the baptism and affirmation of baptism with those who have taken part in The Way. A festive reception follows the service in Founders' Hall.

Easter Day, April 20

8 a.m. and 10:15 a.m. Festival Holy Eucharist

Hymns, choral music, brass and a Cathedral resplendent with flowers accompany our Easter morning celebrations. Children uncover the "Alleluia" buried away at the end of Epiphany as a prelude to the entire assembly acclaiming, "Alleluia. Christ is risen." *Nursery open for children three and younger during the 8 & 10:15 a.m. services. Children's Chapel begins after the Collect of the Day.*

Festive receptions follow each service.

An Easter Egg Hunt follows the 10:15 a.m. service.

Note: The Cathedral office is closed Easter Monday, April 21.

Easter Parking

In order to make room for Easter guests, if you are able, please use on-street parking or park in the parking garage on the north side of 13th Street (enter by either entrance — from 13th Street or Washington). Parking passes that allow you to exit the garage without paying are available from the ushers.

Labyrinth available during Holy Week

Labyrinth walk for private meditation is available in Founders' Hall Palm Sunday afternoon through Wednesday evening and also Good Friday until 7 p.m. *(The labyrinth is not available Maundy Thursday to allow for setup for the evening liturgy.)*

The labyrinth is an ancient pattern that has been found in many cultures around the world. Labyrinths have only one path to the center. You walk in by a winding path and exit the same way.

A printed guide will be available in Founders' Hall to assist you as you walk the labyrinth.

Three times a year, the Cathedral collects diapers for HappyBottoms. Our next collection will be during the month of June.




