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FROM THE DEAN Where sacred and secular interface

As I write workers are busily finishing the installation of Wi-Fi in the Cathedral nave. We'll be wired in time for "Social Media Sunday." That means that in most of our spaces there is now internet access. For those in need of information such as service technicians, students, and staff, this is a real boon. Information on mechanical systems operation and resources for Christian formation can now be easily accessed. I suppose, too, this means that one has an alternative to counting panes of glass or stones to alleviate boredom while in church. Wi-Fi makes using that discretely held smart phone or tablet all the more reliable.

Technology and cathedrals have a long history. Last summer when I accompanied our choir on their singing tour of English cathedrals I was intrigued at how, over time, technology and innovation has been used in these great medieval structures. I was amazed at the ingenuity of the builders and rebuilders of these sacred spaces. In every era it seems that the latest in technology has been employed in each place. This was most apparent as I stood in the pulpit of Bristol Cathedral to preach. Logging into the Cathedral's Wi-Fi, I was able to fetch my sermon from the "Cloud" and preach using my iPad.

But, more than being inspired by enduring architecture and openness to the newest trends in technology, I was impressed with how these cathedrals have served and continue to serve as resource centers. Each functions as a spiritual and cultural meeting ground. They are places for hospitality and outreach to their local communities and world. They provide visible links to history. These cathedrals are iconic centers for active engagement of mind, senses, and spirit. They figure into the age old search for meaning.

Not long ago I had a conversation with a Kansas City native. She was here for the first time to attend a service. Since her childhood she has been intrigued by the Cathedral. As

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with nearly everyone who steps into the Cathedral she was awed by its vast beauty. But, even more than the inviting warmth of the rough stone interior and its array of artful treasure, she was delighted to learn about all that goes on throughout our campus. This is not just a church. This is a house of living stones.

To follow Jesus requires that we care about the plight of those we don't know as well as the well being of those we do Many years ago, the "righteous" of Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral followed Christ's call from Matthew's Gospel in founding what has become the Kansas City Community Kitchen. Every week day, nearly 600 of Kansas City's marginalized citizens are fed a hot, nutritious meal.

This effort requires the dedication of numerous volunteers in order to accomplish it's objectives. It is to this end that we once again call upon the "righteous" of this Cathedral to answer the call of the Matthew Gospel and assist in this ministry. We are instituting the "Matthew 25 Ministry" to call on Cathedral members to volunteer to help the Community Kitchen to continue its' ministry. There are many things Cathedral members can do to help, whether it is serving meals, prepping for the meals or scheduling volunteers to help.

We encourage each of you to consider joining the Matthew 25 Ministry in the coming weeks. The Kitchen is the Cathedral's ministry. It began here and for many years was sustained by this Cathedral's membership. Treasurer's Report

For the month of May, pledge income trailed the budgeted amount, however on a positive note, the pledge receipts were higher than in May 2013. Expenses in May were higher than budgeted due to higher than expected costs associated with Easter and the cost of a special music event in late March.

On a year-to-date basis, income is above the budgeted amount due to higher than expected revenue from the endowment

and certain external trusts from which the Cathedral receives ongoing income. Expenses for the year were also higher than the budget due to the impact of the bad winter

Yarn-bombing Squares Received in Germany

On Saturday, May 24 members of the Arbeitskreis Eine Welt (The One World Working Group) of Schwäbisch Gmünd, Germany displayed and opened packages of "peace squares" knitted and crocheted by needle-

crafters in various countries. Included in the event was opening the box of 222 squares made by members of Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral.



All the collected peace

squares will be sewn together to make a huge stocking to wrap the Siegessäule (victory column) that is in Schwäbisch Gmünd's central marketplace. This yarn-bombing event will take place later this summer at the one-hundredth anniversary of the beginning of World War I. The purpose of the effort is to raise awareness among Schwäbisch Gmünd's citizenry and visitors of the organization's mission that includes promoting peace and human rights throughout the world. Other communities joining Schwäbisch Gmünd in the project are Zürich, Switzerland, Katmandu, Nepal, Faenza, Italy, Resistencia, Argentina, and a neighborhood of refugees in Schwäbisch Gmünd.

Birthing home in Haiti

The 2013 Annual Report from MN contains good news. Following are excerpts from the Report by Jim Grant, executive director of Global Birthing Home Foundation. The name of the foundation was changed because people had trouble with pronouncing and spelling Maison de Naissance. However, the facility in Haiti still uses the MN name.

Lespwa Fe Viv ("Hope Gives Life"), a Haitian Proverb, describes MN. It has been and is a source of hope to the people in the community where MN is located, and even beyond. MN has remained steady and kept the doors open through adversity of every kind — natural disasters (hurricanes and an earth-quake), equipment malfunctions, local infrastructure breakdowns and financial hardships. Now in its 10th year of operations, MN has provided more than 128,000 consultations and delivered 4,700 babies without a single maternal or infant death — an incredible statistic for Haiti.

Other improvements MN has brought to the area include erecting a radio tower and satellite dish to achieve the first internet connection in the area.

In 2004, it took more than an hour to travel from MN to the nearest hospital, IF one had access to a 4-wheel drive vehicle. Infrastructure improvements now allow mothers in labor to reach the delivery center in less than an hour. This has resulted in mothers coming from surrounding cities to deliver their babies at MN's remote location.

The all-Haitian staff now numbers 27 and includes midwives, lab techs, ambulance drivers, facility manager, custodians, security guards, laundry attendants and community health workers. Achieving an all Haitian staff has always been a goal of the MN Founders and Board of Directors.

The biggest change and improvement comes from the much improved Haitian Ministry of Health. Prior to MN's opening in 2004, a woman could be refused delivery care at the hospital if she could not afford the prepayment fee. Now there are two nearby hospitals with modern birthing facilities. With support from the Ministry of Health, MN is making a transition from being a delivery center to a maternal health center, a big step towards local sustainability, and the ultimate goal for MN. The Haitian government's goal is to decrease dependence on outside funding, and to build the integrity and capacity of local institutions. This does not mean there will not be a need for MN! The ongoing goal is for more "double wins," or *Dekabes* of Healthy Mothers — Healthy Babies.

MN will now focus on prenatal and postnatal care, women's reproductive health, family planning services & education, HIV/STD testing, education & treatment and community health services.

Partnership with the Ministry of Health will also help MN reduce expenses for 2014 while preserving its core maternal health care services. The revenue total for 2013 was \$399,173 but expenses amounted to \$441,690.

Maison de Naissance continues to need financial gifts. The Cathedral, through the Social Outreach Committee, sends a quarterly donation to MN. In addition, at one point in 2013, when MN was within a week of having to close its doors, SOC sent \$5,000. MN was begun with the help of the Episcopal Church, St. Luke's Hospital, and many others. It has been one of GHTC's many ministries almost since its beginning. Our heartfelt thanks go to all who continue to make personal gifts in addition to the Cathedral's gift.


Children's Formation Leader Workshop


