From the Dean Clearing the clutter

"This is what things are like for the Church!" Except, there was no church, no steeple. Just a lot of signs and cars full of people. It was the height of morning rush hour. We were in almost "everytown USA" in search of a Starbucks. The four lane highway outside this Midwest river town was lined with a jumble of businesses of every description; fast food and chain restaurants, big box stores, motels and gas station super marts.

What prompted the comparison of church to commercial strip was, when once spotting the mermaid logo and the sleek Starbucks store, we had the devil of a time getting to it. The development along that highway was an urban planners' and consumers' nightmare. Entrances. Exits. Parking lots. And everywhere, signs! We made not a few wrong turns before reaching our destination.

We knew what we wanted. But, in our quest to find it we had to wrestle with advertising and suburban sprawl overload. When at long last we turned into the only access to the coffee shop, I couldn't put the comparison to the church in our times out of my head.

The way we do business, form communities and even build churches has come to a crossroads. Many are beginning to challenge the "sustainability" of our towns and cities. What kind of future is there for a society that interacts in cyberspace and spends too much time moving about in cars from one business to the other, with so little opportunity for social interaction of lasting value?

A growing desire among young adults and others seems to be for building walk-able cities fully integrated into a world of e-commerce and instant access to information. But the operative here is livable and walk-able. Communities where we live, work and play must be on a human scale.

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That Starbucks along that unplanned eyesore of a highway was filled with a crowd that was mostly young, but included all ages. They ordered their coffee and tea drinks in an inviting and user-friendly atmosphere. Apart from the hip store vibes, there was a sense of community gathering space and an unspoken invitation to linger around "a cuppa" with friends.

Author and church observer Phyllis Tickle has said that in the early twentieth century the church is holding one of its "rummage sales." Every five hundred years or so, the church undergoes a shift in its emphases and power structures. What can come out of such times are both a renewal of mission and the rediscovery and repurposing of spiritual treasure.

As a church and denomination, I believe that we have the essential pieces of community, a vast spiritual treasure, an openness to new ideas and a livable faith with which to navigate our times. What seems to be our challenge is how to get the word out that we are open and always ready to offer a livable experience of Christ. Part of our effort as a church community must be to let people seeking a faith community know that we offer just what they might looking for, but can't see or get to for all the clutter. What we have, I believe, can be part of what builds a livable and sustainable city and world.

Centering prayer groups begin

What is centering/contemplative prayer?

We live in an age in which our senses are ceaselessly bombarded by traffic noise, canned music, the waiting room TV, and coworkers' conversations. Even those treasured moments of quiet prayer time before worship have been snatched from us by conversations all around us in church.

We may think of prayer as thoughts or feelings expressed in words. But this is only one expression. In the Christian tradition contemplative prayer is considered to be the pure gift of God. It is the opening of mind and heart — our whole being — to God, the Ultimate Mystery, beyond thoughts, word, and emotions. Through grace we open our awareness to God whom we know by faith that is within us, closer than breathing, closer than thinking, closer than choosing — closer than consciousness itself.

Contemplative Prayer is a method designed to facilitate the development of Contemplative Prayer by preparing our faculties to receive this gift. It is an attempt to present the teaching of earlier times in an updated form. Centering Prayer is not meant to replace other kinds of prayer: rather it casts a new light and depth of meaning on them. It is at the same time a relationship with God and a discipline to

foster that relationship. It is a method of prayer is a movement beyond conversation with Christ to communion with Him. The focus of Centering Prayer is the deepening of our relationship with the living Christ. It tends to build communities of faith and bonds the members together in mutual friendship and love.

On Monday, September 15, from 7:15–8:30 p.m. and again on Thursday, September 18 from 1:30–3 p.m. we will begin our Centering Prayer sessions. We will meet each week through December 29.

Treasurer's Report

So far this year, income is in line with the approved budget as lower pledge receipts have been offset by higher than expected income from the endowment and trusts. In contrast, expenses are running above budget on a YTD basis. Some of these higher expenditures were anticipated but simply occurred earlier than expected in the budget year. However, expenditures for growth and

maintenance of the campus have exceeded forecasts. The problem has been compounded by weather related costs from this past winter.

Oct. 6-10: Mediation Skills Training Institute

The institute includes lectures, discussion, and guided practice in role-plays. Active and practical in focus, the sessions emphasize handson skills training and real-life role-plays based on the kinds of conflicts faced by participants.

Everyone Has to Deal with Conflict

Conflict is normal and inevitable – whether in the home, school, community, church or workplace. Leaders in all walks of life often have a responsibility to help others work through their conflicts.

The *Mediation Skills Training Institute* presented by the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center (LMPC) is designed to equip church leaders with the skills necessary to deal effectively with interpersonal, congregational, and other forms of group conflict. The five-day institute also includes a component on congregational mediation and consultation, placed within the context of family systems theory.

Although focused primarily on the church setting, the skills learned are directly transferable

to other settings. Thus, managers in business, attorneys, experienced mediators, and others in leadership will be enriched by the training as well.

Who Will Benefit

- Lay leaders and committee members

 to receive valuable leadership training to benefit the church, while also gaining insight for peaceful conflict transformation in the home.
- Administrators to introduce conflict transformation to the organizations they oversee
- Managers and supervisors to help workers diminish conflict and enhance productivity.
- Attorneys to gain skills in alternative dispute resolution procedures.
- Community mediation center staff and volunteers — to acquire additional skills in a transformational model of mediation for working with both individuals and groups.

Tuition

Tuition is \$695 when paid by September 12 — or \$795 after this date. Participants receive a training manual and other materials upon arrival. Cancellations are subject to a \$100 non-refundable fee if LMPC is notified at least two weeks prior to the institute, or half of the registration fee otherwise. Enrollment is limited, so register early.

Registration forms are available in the Cathedral's tower entrance or on our website.

The *Mediation Skills Training Institute* runs daily from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., with the exception of Monday, which starts at 9 a.m., and Friday, which concludes at 4 p.m.

Guest Preacher: Justin E. Crisp

Episcopal LGBT Fellowship Group

The Cathedral has a long history of advocacy for social justice issues and inclusion of all people into the life of the congregation. This has included the acceptance of gay and lesbian people among other minorities. All have been welcome in God's household, this church.

This summer a visioning group met at the home of Jim Robertson to discuss whether a gay and lesbian fellowship group might be a welcome addition to existing ministries in our parishes. Walker Adams, from St. Paul's Church attended as did Marcus Halley from St. Andrew's Church. All felt that such a group was another way in which we can live into our call to inclusivity and love of all God's people. Three primary talking points came out of this visioning session.

First, the group might function as a safe place where people, perhaps some not out publicly, can gather for fellowship under the umbrella of church, without incurring judgment. All felt that a straight ally buy-in and presence would be essential for sustaining the group, reaffirming the notion that all are welcome, not just gay and lesbian people.

Next, the group might be a way in which all parishes in the metro Kansas City area can share in a ministry if they so choose. There will be no boundaries. The notion of putting out the word from "Lock Lloyd to Liberty" prevailed, with no single parish having ownership of the Group.

Finally, the group may become an effective evangelism tool, bringing new people not only into the gathering itself, but into the life and fabric of our parishes. "Invite your friends" will be the given, not the exception.

There will be no business meeting, presentations or lectures. Rather, the agenda will focus on three Fs: fun, food, and fellowship.


