





Centering Prayer Opportunities

Spiritual formation is writ large across the pages of Scripture ... so large, in fact, that it's often easy to miss it altogether. In C.S. Lewis's The Silver Chair, from The Chronicles of Narnia, Eustace and Jill search for a sign in a ruined city of giants, but are disheartened to find themselves wandering through a confusing maze of rock trenches without uncovering any message. The following morning, while looking out from a high window, they are astounded to see the words "UNDER ME" carved in huge letters on the stony hillside ... and they suddenly realize they had spent the previous day stumbling through the very words they had been seeking. They simply lacked the vantage point from which to read the sign.

Some of us experience the same problem when it comes to prayer. We lack the vantage point from which we pray. Faith and *prayer* are a journey — an experience in which we can grow beyond childlike understanding about faith and prayer into a mature understanding that prayer is interactive conversation with God and about what we and God are thinking and doing together.

The mid-twentieth-century minister and writer George Buttrick refers to prayer as "friendship with God." Author Richard Foster tells us "prayer is the key to the heart of God, the one place we truly belong."

This fall I invite you to participate in one or both of the following Centering Prayer opportunities here at the Cathedral. Anyone desiring to deepen his or her prayer life will benefit from this introduction to Centering Prayer. The format will include presentation, discussions and the opportunity to practice Centering Prayer. Through DVD interviews, Betty Sue Flowers draws out of Fr. Keating the importance of silence and contemplative practices as a means of opening the mind and heart and one's whole being to God.

As Fr. Keating states: "We are being called by God, to open to a new reality that is our True Self ... the Image and the likeness of God. This path to the True Self and all it fruits and gifts in the challenge of become fully human. And to become fully human is to become fully divine. This is the fullness of life itself, a life abiding in the grace and truth of Christ.
