FILLING IN FOR THE DEAN Grateful Things

When my children were little, we would kneel beside their bed every night and I would ask them what their "grateful things" were. They would think really hard and come up with three things that had happened that day for which they were thankful to God.

I think back on those times as some of my most favorite memories with my children. The reason for this is that when you have gratitude in your heart, there's no room for hate or prejudice or any of the other awful feelings that sometimes seem to overwhelm our world. Knowing that I did my best to instill in my children a sense of gratitude, gives me a feeling of hope; hope that as they head out into the world, they will remember to pay attention and at the end of the day, they will take a moment and find something worthy of their gratitude.

Over the past few years, there were days when it was a challenge to recognize something worthy of my gratitude. I had been laid off and was having a very difficult time finding another job. But more than that, I felt that the path my career had taken up to that point, left a lot to be desired. I have never been an overly ambitious person, I simply wanted to go to work, do my job and go home at the end of the day. I would, of course, like to make a decent amount of money and feel somewhat appreciated for my contributions to my employer, but I was not really interested in climbing any corporate ladder. Maybe that lack of ambition showed through and I was paying for it. It always seemed like, no matter how much my bosses would say they loved my work or how many accolades I would receive from coworkers, I was always the one drawing the short straw when layoffs or downsizing happened. Or, more likely in my opinion, I was simply trying to work in all the wrong places.

When I interviewed for my current Communications Coordinator position here at the Cathedral, I immediately noticed a sense of calm when I entered

the building. Now that doesn't mean things are always calm around here, sometimes things are just plain hectic. But it does mean that when I am at work, I am relaxed. I am not constantly watching my back, afraid of saying the wrong thing to the wrong person who might secretly be after my job. I feel supported here and that feeling is priceless. And as the weeks went by and I accepted that feeling as something that wasn't going to be pulled away from me, I realized that I recognized that feeling from a few years ago, when I had the opportunity to work for another church. It hit me then that maybe that was the missing piece. Maybe I need to work in a place that makes me feel wanted, appreciated and valued. I despise office politics and being able to put all those negative feelings aside and just do my job in a supportive environment...now there was something to put on my list of "grateful things."

When Dean DeVeau had his stroke a few weeks ago, it brought all of these things that had been in the back of my mind to the forefront. I started thinking about previous employers I have had and I realized that I now have one for which I am proud to work. Dean DeVeau creates an atmosphere where all ideas are welcomed and employees feel truly supported. That's a rare gift and another thing to add to my list of "grateful things."

So as we approach the holiday season, I would invite all of us to be mindful of those little things that happen throughout the day. Maybe it's as simple as a smile from a stranger. Or maybe it's as life-changing as a new career. Regardless, recognizing and embracing those things which are worthy of your gratitude will undoubtedly lead to a major adjustment in your attitude. And this world could use a little more gratitude right about now.

Treasurer's Report

Income in September of 2016 fell well short of the amount for the prior year due to a sharp fall off in Pledge receipts. This lower income for September came as expenses rose for the month vs. the September 2015 expenses. The primary driver of the higher expenses during the month was money spent on the grounds and utilities. Lower income and higher expenses naturally led to a bigger deficit in September than last year.

On a year to date basis, the situation was much the same. September's drop in Pledge income caused the YTD income total to trail the 2015 YTD total. The higher expenses on a YTD basis through September reflect higher expenses for the grounds and utilities. At this point last year the Cathedral had a reasonable surplus in Net Operating Income, but lower income and higher expenses means that this year the Cathedral enters the very active fall months with a smaller operating cushion.

Parishioners are asked to prayerfully remember to keep current on their pledges as their donations are a vital support of the Cathedral's mission.

After several months of prayerful consideration, the Music Director Search Committee is very pleased to announce that Paul Meier, currently the assistant music director at Grace Cathedral, San Francisco, will be the next Music Director here at Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral. Paul will begin his work here with us on February 1, 2017, and his first Sunday will be February 12, 2017.

At Grace Cathedral, Paul is the primary organist and directs the Cathedral Camerata, an adult choir that sings for weekly Sunday Evensongs. Paul holds the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Southern California. In addition to Grace Cathedral, his professional background includes work at St. James in the City Episcopal Church (Los Angeles), Bel Air Presbyterian Church (Los Angeles), and Christ the King Lutheran Church (Houston). He has been a featured organist with the Los Angeles Master Chorale and the Pacific Symphony. More importantly, the Search Committee felt his sense of humor, communication skills, and welcoming manner made him a good fit for our Cathedral. We have enjoyed getting to know Paul during the search process and feel that he will be a superb leader for the wonderful program that has been built here. Paul, his girlfriend Suzanne Anderson, and their dog and cat will be moving to Kansas City in January.

The Search Committee thanks everyone for their prayers and support during the search process. We invite you to pray for Paul and Suzanne during this time of transition and look forward to his formal introduction to the Cathedral community in February.

Cathedral on All Saints' Sunday. The names will also be listed in the bulletin. During the liturgy, there is a time when lectors read aloud the names of those who have died in the past 12 months, followed by a time when all present say aloud names of those they would like remembered.

Forms for submitting the names of those who have died within the past year will be available at services beginning **October 9**. You can place these in the offering plate or in the basket on the ushers' table. Names can also be emailed to communications@kccathedral.org. The deadline for submitting names is **Tuesday, November 1**. The names of all those who have passed away within the past year will be included in a visual display in the Nave.

Celebrating the Ministry of Canon John Schaefer


