FROM THE DEAN Strength in Vulnerability

The morning of Halloween, October 31, I witnessed history in the making. This is an event I would have missed had I not been sitting in a hospital room with discretionary time before going to Physical Therapy. Via Swedish Television on the internet I watched live from Lund Cathedral in Sweden, as the president of the Lutheran World Federation and Pope Francis opened the 500th anniversary of the Reformation by signing a document to define and guide the Lutheran-Catholic Common Commemoration of the Reformation in 2017. The document signed by Pope Francis and Bishop Munib A. Younan, of The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land, contains five imperatives for ecumenical interaction and dialogue. The first imperative declares: "Catholics and Lutherans should always begin from the perspective of unity and not from the point of view of division in order to strengthen what is held in common even though the differences are more easily seen and experienced."

What occurred to me as these two leaders signed the five imperatives contained in the document titled, "From Conflict to Communion" is how the spirit of the first imperative speaks to our times. The signing event took place during the last week of frenzied

rhetoric before the 2016 Presidential Election. A call to focus on what unites us, not what divides, is always a good starting point. It is certainly a perspective we need now in light of those national elections.

In the days since watching the Pope sign the agreement acknowledging a need for Christian unity before the altar in a Protestant church in predominantly secular Sweden, I realized that what contributed to this critical moment was not only the movement of the Holy Spirit, but also how in Post-Christian Europe the only power the Church has is the gospel of Jesus Christ. There are no longer vast stores of wealth and political power at stake as there were at the time of the Reformation. What remains is the credible authority of the good news that prompted Paul to write to the conflicted Church in Corinth,"My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness." 2 Corinthians 12:8b

It is perhaps time for us to focus on the uniting power of living into Christ's death and resurrection, a strength that is shown in making oneself vulnerable. Let this seeming weakness be our power and our strength. -Peter

Income in October of this year exceeded last year's income due to the early receipt of a distribution from a recurring bequest. That early distribution offset lower pledge payments in October of this year. Expenses were higher in October than last year due to early payments to pension plans and higher property repairs. On balance, the Cathedral had a smaller deficit this October.

The early distribution from the recurring bequest and the lower pledge payments affected the YTD numbers as well. The net of these offsetting items was that Income temporarily looks better than last year. This in turn helped pay for higher property and utility expenses this year. In summary, the deficit at the Cathedral was modest through October and well within normal variability.

However, as we enter the final months of the year it is vitally important that pledge payments pick up. Receipts from pledge are now trailing those of last year and the Cathedral's mission depends upon the financial support of the Congregation. Parishioners are asked to prayerfully remember to fulfill their 2016 pledges.

Vestry Nominations Sought

At the Annual Meeting of the congregation on January 29, 2017, four members of the Cathedral Vestry will be elected. The Vestry oversees the temporal affairs of the Cathedral parish. It works closely with the Dean in guiding the life and ministry of the Cathedral. Meetings are held 10 times a year, usually on the fourth Thursday of the month at 5:30 p.m. and regular attendance is essential.

Nominees for Vestry should be committed parishioners who

- regularly attend Sunday Eucharist;
- participate in the life of the parish; and
- have been pledging members of the Cathedral for at least six months prior to the election.

If you would like to nominate yourself or another parishioner, you may submit that person's name via email to *vestry@kccathednal.org* no later than December 15, 2016. (Before nominating someone else, please discuss the matter with that person first.) The nominating committee will evaluate potential candidates and publish a slate in late December or early January.

Saint John's Bible Presented to the Cathedral by Peter DeVeau, Dean



We are very pleased to announce that an anonymous donor is making a gift of the

entire seven volume heritage edition of the Saint John's Bible to the Cathedral. The Saint John's Bible is the first illuminated manuscript of the entire Bible and Apocrypha created since before the sixteenth century Reformation. It was commissioned in 1998 by the monks of St. John's Abbey, Collegeville, Minnesota as a work of sacred art to mark the new millennium. A team of artists and calligraphers under the direction of Donald Jackson, principal scribe to Elizabeth II of England labored over a decade to complete this work of enduring beauty.

Over the past year we have participated in A Year with the Saint John's Bible, having been entrusted with the care of two of these strikingly beautiful exact replica volumes: the Gospels and Acts of the Apostles and, The Pentateuch, comprising the first five books of the Old Testament or Hebrew Scriptures. This exhibition was made possible through a gift in memory of the late Charles N. "Pete" Seidlitz, Jr. A gift from the Bebe and Crosby Kemper Foundation provided funding to create a secure and attractive space for display of the Bibles in the former cloak room outside the Common Room. Bud McDowell built the oak cases for display of the books. Dave and Diane Barker and Vince Alagna were instrumental in seeing to the refurbishment of this space as well as of the entire entry area of the Parish House. They were assisted in this by Cathedral staff members, Julie Toma and Mike Guidry.

As much as possible since last November we have displayed open pages of the Bible at the front of the nave during services. We have also used the Bibles in adult formation and have shared these inspiring works with community groups. In the Easter season we sent one of the books to the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception for use during the Great Vigil of Easter and at Pentecost.

As we look forward to receiving the other five volumes we will plan a celebration featuring speakers from St. John's University, Collegeville, to lecture on this masterwork and its creation. Early in 2017, a group will be convened to develop policies and guidelines for sharing the Bible with other churches and institutions.

The Saint John's Bible is a significant addition to the art of the Cathedral and helps fulfill our mission as a resource center for the Diocese of West Missouri and the Kansas City community. We are grateful for the generosity and vision of the donor in giving this gift designed to last well into the third millennium of Christian history.
