Why I am an Episcopalian

Not a very catchy title, but to the point. In September 2001, I joined the Episcopal Church and began the process to receive Holy Orders as an ordained priest. It is a decision that has caused a lot of curiosity, especially among American Baptist friends. It is a move that has been made with a lot of thought...over 15 years worth of thinking and debating the "reasonableness" of such a move. In the end, reason had nothing to do with my decision. It was based on faith and theology.

I first considered leaving the ABC to join the Episcopal Church back in 1985. After a very positive interview experience with Bishop John Spong of the Newark Diocese, I decided to stay an ordained minister in the ABC primarily for personal reasons. After all, to leave seemed a bit similar to leaving my family company. Over the years, I have tried to bend congregations to my liturgical will. I finally decided that it might be better for me to be in a place more in line with my liturgical theology...hence, my decision to join the Episcopal Church. In September 2001, on the eve of the Feast of St. Michael and All Angels, the Right Rev. Douglas E. Theuner, Bishop of the NH Diocese, received me into the Episcopal Church, and allowed me to begin the process for ordination.

The big question seems to be how an American Baptist, immersed in water and free church tradition, could abandon that "freedom" to join a church with rules, hierarchy and creeds. Several people have asked me how I could go to church where I am told what to believe and how to say what I believe. The creeds are not mind-control, but a wonderful way to affirm, individually and corporately, what we believe. Reciting the creed is a wonderful connection with the cloud of witnesses that have done the same, generation after generation. That wonderful emphasis of continuity and tradition has been very moving.

However, the thing that attracted me to the Episcopal Church initially was the liturgy of the Book of Common Prayer. The BCP is beautiful, scripturally based, poetic, ancient and modern. It gives the congregation a chance to participate fully in the service. I prefer the traditional style of worship, which invites me to contemplate the meaning of the presence of Christ in our midst as we celebrate weekly the love of (*Continued on page 6*.)


Sandra Stogsdill to lead Church School

Meditation

Kahlil Gibran (1883-1931)

Your neighbor is your other self dwelling behind a wall. In understanding, all walls shall fall down.

Who knows but that your neighbor is your better self wearing another body? See that you love him as you would love yourself.

He too is a manifestation of the Most High, whom you do not know.

-from Jesus, The Son of Man: His Words and His Deeds as Told and Recorded by Those Who Knew Him God in the resurrection. For whatever reasons, I am agitated by big screens, praise songs (a friend defined this as 7-11 music: 7 lines, 11 times), extemporaneous prayers that tell Jesus what we just want to do, drums, etc. I realize this style of worship works great for some people, but not for me. I'm much happier with the BCP. I've even gotten pretty adept at juggling a hymnal and a prayer book each Sunday.

I find the use of Word and Sacrament as the heart of worship to be very powerful. I also appreciate the acceptance of God as Mystery, without a need to explain every bit of God. The historic development of worship with the emphasis on ancient practices and theology, as well as more modern expressions of faith.


The weekly celebration of the Eucharist is vital to my understanding of what it means to be the body of Christ. As the congregation goes to the altar, with hands outstretched to receive what God has to offer, I understand in more vivid ways what it means for Jesus to be made known in the breaking of the bread. Continuing presence has far more power for me than mere memory of an ancient act.

Still, the Episcopal Church is more than its liturgy. The structure, as outlined in the Canons and Constitution, is laity, bishops, priest and deacons. The way the Episcopal Church functions, in General Conventions, diocese and parish is very democratic. The canons protect against chaos and arbitrariness. An Episcopal priest has as much freedom as a Baptist minister, if not more so, because the power structure is well defined by the canons and not by the ever-changing personality cults.

There are theological reason, too: the importance of incarnational theological emphasis, and the emphasis on baptism as full initiation into the church and the emphasis on the grace of God, versus personal conversion, just to name a couple of reasons.

In a book by mystery writer Ngaio Marsh, an art collector tells a painter that he has one of her early paintings. When the painter remarks that she doesn't paint the same way now, the collector replies, "But it's been a development...not an abandonment." My journey to the Episcopal Church has been a development of

my liturgical theology, and not an abandonment of my Baptist roots. I am an Episcopalian because that is where I am fed spiritually and challenged to grow theologically.



The youth group is back in full swing after a long summer of various trips and gatherings. In case you haven't noticed, we're meeting from 7:00 PM to 8:30 PM each Wednesday evening in Haden Hall. Here we do a variety of activities, learning, discussing, and growing together. Our sessions are ended with singing and worship together. We also meet on Sunday mornings between the 8:00 and 10:15 services. This time is for check-in and consideration of the weeks current events and the lectionary of the day. If you are in 6th through 12th grade, think about joining us at either of these places.
