FROM THE DEAN

Early on the morning of Sunday, August 26, Eliseo Mederos died on the grounds of the Cathedral. Exact details will never be known, but he died after being stabbed. Eliseo may have started a fight; he may have been an innocent victim. The police investigation wrapped up shortly after 7:30 a.m., so only a few people arriving for the 8 a.m. Eucharist saw the distinctive yellow police tape.

At all three services, it was announced that police were investigating a death that occurred on Cathedral grounds and were treating the death as a homicide. We did not know the victim's name at that point, so we prayed for John Doe and the person or persons responsible.

For several days the police asked for the community's help in locating anyone related to Eliseo who could claim his body. It appears no one did. On Friday afternoon, August 31, Mother Carol Sanford and Deacon Allen Ohlstein prayed at the spot where Eliseo was murdered. His soul was commended to God, and the waters of Baptism were used to transform the place of deadly violence and reclaim it as holy ground.

Several members of the Cathedral congregation and staff, along with Bishop Howe joined in the prayers. And several regular guests and the staff from the Kansas City Community Kitchen who knew Eliseo by his nickname "Papa" rounded out the assembly. One Cathedral member told the Bishop that when he heard about this service, he just had to come and pray.

A saying attributed to Celtic spirituality says that there are certain holy places and certain holy times that create a "thin place" where the veil between those who live on earth and those who live in heaven is virtually non-existent. The celebrations of All Hallows' Eve, All Saints' Day, All Souls' Day, and the Sunday after All Saints' Day create such thin places.

Indeed, at every celebration of the Eucharist, when we join our voices with angels and archangels and the all the company of heaven, the Holy Table becomes a sacred thin place. And this year, on November 6 and 8, we will join with our sisters and brothers from the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception for Requiem and Remembrance as the combined choirs sing Fauré's *Requiem* accompanied by orchestra and prayers. *(See page 9 for more information.)*

In these thin places and during these thin times, we naturally pray for those we love but see no longer. We trust in the sure and certain hope of the Resurrection, that those we love now live with God, and one day, we, too will join them. But let us not forget that there are others to pray for, lives which touched ours very briefly and anonymously, even souls we never met. Like Eliseo.

The author of Ecclesiasticus encourages us to sing the praise of our famous ancestors. Those who ruled kingdoms and made a name for themselves by their valor, wise counselors and composers of musical tunes and verses. Still others were rich, endowed with resources, honored in their generations and the pride of their times. But, the writer continues, there are others who have no such legacy, completely unknown to us. But these too were godly people, they performed righteous deeds, and though they are unknown to us, by the mercy of God, their glory, too, will never be blotted.

All souls, all God's children, deserve to be remembered in the Church's prayers, perhaps especially those who have no one to pray for them. As we offer such prayers, the veil between heaven and earth truly disappears.

Nominations for the Vestry

At the January 28, 2008, Annual Meeting, new members of the Vestry will be elected. Nominations are now being received through November 26. Please have the permission of the person you are nominating, or nominate yourself by contacting the Nominating Committee (not the Dean!) either by a letter sent to the Cathedral office addressed "Vestry Nomination" or via email to vestry@ghtc-kc.org.

The following should be taken into account before placing a name in nomination:

A qualified candidate for the vestry is:

- Keenly interested in the well-being of Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral:
 - the congregation
 - the clergy and staff
 - the buildings and grounds
 - the greater church
 - the community.
- Regularly attends services and various events.
- Spiritually attuned.
- One who has demonstrated commitment to the work of the Cathedral by giving substantially of their time and money
- A person serving on our Vestry
 - Has at least a basic set of business skills.
 - Has a sense of humor.
 - Has the ability to distinguish between

being a Vestry member and *serving* on the Vestry; willing to serve on at least one parish committee.

• Should have sufficient time to dedicate to

the work of the Vestry.

- Should be of a positive nature but understand that the Vestry's work can be difficult.
- Must have the courage to speak his/her mind even when his/her positions are in the minority.
- Must listen to opposing opinions, be open to change and accept the greater will, communicating a vestry decision one did not initially support with grace and integrity.

A good Vestry member is able and willing:

- To leave behind "constituencies" and personal agendas, in favor of doing what is best for our parish.
- To share one's talents and abilities and one's honest opinions. And then, listen to others' opinions with an open heart and mind.
- To be a good steward of the Cathedral's resources, both human and financial.
- To know enough of the Cathedral's history to be buoyed by a strong sense of accomplishment and community, yet not enough to through be unwilling to change.

• To understand and be faithful to the concept of confidentiality.

A member of the Cathedral Vestry

• is positive and enthusiastic about God's ministry in Kansas City and the surrounding communities.

• is supportive of and trusts the clergy and staff of the Cathedral to do their work and to

serve the best interests of the parish, diocese and national Episcopal community.

• is aware that whenever two or more are gathered in Jesus' name, Christ is there also.

Supporting MN for healthy moms and babies in Haiti

Maison de Naissance, a facility and program in Haiti, began as a local project in the Kansas City Episcopal community and St. Luke's Hospital to provide local and sustainable solutions to poor maternal health, infant mortality and impact poor water sources and health in southwestern Haiti.

Our Cathedral support of Maison de Naissance enables the birthing center in Haiti to provide training for midwives from the community, safe prenatal and birthing care and follow up with the families to provide ongoing health support.

In addition to the safe and supportive birthing center, MN is working on malaria education due to its impact on birth weight, pre-maturity and birth complications. Malaria nets distribution, vitamin and de-worming of the children and digging of safe wells are part of other missions which MN supports Haiti, which has the worst poverty and infant mortality area of the Western Hemisphere.

MN provided 4,785 patient visits this year due to continued support of friends in the United States.

The support of the MN also supports the Millennium goals which include: reduce infant mortality; improve maternal health; combat HIV/Aids, Malaria and other diseases; create a global partnership for development.

Due to the extreme need of the poor women and children in Haiti, and the increase of expenses from energy and continued expansion of the client base and services, continued support of Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral members is needed.

Most of all, however, this was an


opportunity for members of the Cathedral to meet and greet relative newcomers.

Calling all bakers

Coffee hour after all services November 11 will feature an array of Scottish shortbread. We need lots of shortbread to serve the parish and our special guests this festive day. One recipe is listed to below but feel free to use your favorite.

Cathedral Shortbread

5 cups of flour

1 cup of sugar

This can be made in a food processor, in two batches. Process cold butter with sugar and add flour. Do not overprocess or it will get too hot. Pat it into an 11×17 ungreased jellyroll pan. You can use a smaller pan and it will just be thicker.

Prick all over with the tines of a fork. Sprinkle sugar on top and bake

1 lb. of cold butter

on lower oven shelf for 40-45 minutes at 300 to 325 degrees.

As soon as it begins to brown, take it out because it will continue browning after it comes out of the oven.

Cut into whatever shapes you want while it is hot. You can leave it on the counter in the pan overnight and it pops right out in the morning.



- I All Saints The day, along with November 2, when we specifically pray for the departed
- 2 Commemoration of All Faithful Departed
- 3 Richard Hooker, Priest, 1600 - At or near the top of the list of English theologians; wrote extensively and was particularly critical that the Roman church did not believe in justification by faith
- 6 William Temple, Archbishop of Canterbury, 1944 - 98th ABofC who was known for his diplomacy skills, he had a special knack for boiling down complex issues to make them easily understood
- 7 Willibrord, Archbishop of Utrecht, Missionary to Frisia, 739 - One of twelve sent by Anglo-Saxon Christians to preach in presentday Holland and Denmark
- 10 Leo the Great, Bishop of Rome, 461 - Early pope who shaped the form of church government; vocal proponent of the then-debated idea of Christ being both God and man
- 11 Martin, Bishop of Tours, 397 -French (technically, Gaul) bishop who opposed the Arian view that Christ was not fully divine; tried unsuccessfully to keep a group of heretics from being executed for their ecclesial crimes
- 12 Charles Simeon, Priest, 1836 - Educator who believed in the transformational power of the Eucharist; influenced many students to pursue missionary work overseas
- 14 Consecration of Samuel Seabury, First American Bishop, 1784 - consecrated by Scottish bishops because English bishops were forbidden to; in return applied many Scottish Anglican practices in America
- 16 Margaret, Queen of Scotland, 1093 - Encouraged the development of schools, hospitals and orphanages in Scotland and promoted receiving Holy Communion frequently
- 17 Hugh, Bishop of Lincoln, 1200

- Defender of the poor who had no use for royal snobbery, despite being an associate of several kings of England
- 18 Hilda, Abbess of Whitby, 680 - Founder of several monasteries: successfully mediated between discordant Roman and Celtic Christian practices
- 19 Elizabeth, Princess of Hungary, 1231 - Sacrificed her considerable personal wealth and devoted considerable time and energy for the well-being of the poor
- 20 Edmund, King of East Anglia, 870 - Refused a demand from invading Danes that Christian practice be banned in the kingdom, was captured and killed for refusing
- 22 C. S. Lewis, Apologist and spiritual Writer, 1963 - Better known as "lack"; writer of, among many other books, works that explained and defended Christian faith while deliberately avoiding areas of belief that are not shared across denominations
- 23 Clement, Bishop of Rome, c. 100 - Third bishop of Rome (after the apostles) who is known for a letter he wrote to the church at Corinth during a time of internal tension
- 25 James Otis Sargent Huntington, Priest and Monk, 1935 - Boston native who worked with the poor in New York and became active in the labor union movement
- 28 Kamehameha and Emma, King and Queen of Hawaii, 1864, 1885 - Christian rulers who feared growing American influence; the Queen was especially influential in founding several hospitals
- 30 Saint Andrew the Apostle The first of the Apostles, Andrew's feast marks the beginning of the church year; he is portrayed in the Gospel of John as being the one to bring individuals to meet Christ; the Fellowship of Saint Andrew is devoted to bringing oneself to a deeper knowledge of Christ
