FROM THE DEAN

We are a blessed congregation! This community of faith is blessed with an abundance of gifts and riches! And thanks to so many committed and generous people, our community is enabled to use these gifts to carry out the work God has called us to do. Hospitality is shown to those who are hungry in body and soul. We provide a location for service groups to carry out their programs of outreach and education such as job training, prenatal and postnatal care and tutoring.

We extend hospitality to groups who do not have an easy time finding a place to meet. We encourage various diocesan committees and gatherings here, enabling vital ministry throughout all of the Diocese of West Missouri. The Holy Eucharist is offered eight times a week six days out of every week, feeding the faithful with the Bread of Life and Cup of Salvation as the needs of our parish, the city, the Church, and the World are lifted to God in prayer. And as music is such a vital ministry, a number of rehearsals, recitals and concerts are held here for well-known area ensembles but also students at various stages of their education. It bears repeating: we are a blessed congregation!

The second Sunday of May will not only be Mother's Day, but this year is also the Day of Pentecost, the fiftieth day after Easter when the Holy Spirit came upon the apostles as Jesus promised. The Spirit gave to the first followers of Christ gifts for ministry, the tools needed to go forth and share the Good News of the Gospel to all the world.

No single apostle was given all the gifts. Thus, a community was formed to pool together the various gifts. Indeed, the more diverse the community, the richer the variety of the Spirit's gifts, leading to a more effective mission. Today, the gifts of the Spirit are continually poured upon the Church as new believers are baptized and the promises of baptism are renewed. With every commitment, another gift is added to the community, a unique gift for ministry, and the Body of Christ becomes stronger and more vital. You can see and experience this richness throughout the Cathedral congregation and throughout the Episcopal Church today as mission grows.

As a parish, we do well to give thanks for the gifts of ministry consistently shared here. And let us rejoice with every new gift that is added to our mission so that our work might be even more fruitful. Our God is ever-faithful, and supplies us with every gift needed for ministry. Two EfM groups prepare members for lay ministry

Education for Ministry (EfM) is for laypeople. Some EfM participants go on to be ordained — Bruce Hall and Andrew McMullen are recent examples — but most of us benefit from EfM by becoming more effective in our lay ministries. Whether we teach in Children's Formation, act as a Eucharistic Visitor, serve on a church committee, volunteer on a cook team or anything else, EfM can help us identify our "M" and prepare us for those ministries.

Those who want to experience spiritual growth in scripture, history, theology and ministry gather once a week at the Cathedral from September through May to study and discuss the many facets of their faith lives. The Cathedral has two EfM groups; one meets Tuesday mornings and one meets Thursday evenings.

EfM is a four-year course of study that comes to us from the University of the South (Sewanee) through their extension program. The first year concentrates on the Old Testament; year two on the New Testament; year three on church history; and year four on theology. A person commits to just one year at a time, at a cost of \$340 per year. Books are provided.

In addition to the reading and discussion of lessons, students also find nourishment in common lessons and theological reflections, exercises that combine their faith with incidents from their lives, scripture, literature and from other aspects of the world. These thoughtful discussions often provide new insights into both faith and life.

The EfM year begins this fall with a one-day EfM retreat Saturday, September 6. Classes will begin Tuesday and Thursday of the following week.

If you are ready to expand your spiritual life and grow in knowledge, faith and ministry, you may want to consider enrolling in EfM. To learn more about EfM, please contact Gary Hicks, Greg Morgan or the Rev. Carol Sanford through the church office (816.474.8260).


foods, attend "Synagogue School" and make new friends in the



Water is *Sous Lavi*

Two of the Millennium Development goals are to 1) reduce by two-thirds the mortality rate among children under five, and 2) reduce by one-half the proportion of people without access to safe drinking water.

MN is invested in promoting health to Haitian women and children through safe childbirth, preventive medicine and educational programs. Clean water is very important in the effort to promote healthy mothers and children.

MN also is involved in an ongoing project to build new wells for clean water and to improve sanitary conditions in the Haitian community. This project



is called Sous Lavi meaning "the source of life" in Haitian Creole.

Less than one-third of Haitians have access to clean drinking water and sanitation. Diarrhea and dehydration caused by drinking contaminated water are major causes of death. Even mild dehydration can increase susceptibility to viral infections. Twelve of every one-hundred Haitian children die before their fifth birthday. In the United States, fewer than one out of one-hundred children die before age five. The average life span of a Haitian woman is fiftyone years and forty-seven years for a Haitian man, compared to eighty years and seventy-five years, respectively, in the United States.

In addition to digging new wells and building latrines, work is being done to make the water safe for drinking. BioSand Water Filters have been developed to remove bacteria and other wastes from the water. Another benefit is that the filters improve the taste and smell of the water. These filters are without moving parts, do not require electricity and are easy to transport and use. With a little maintenance, the filters can last up to twenty years and are inexpensive to manufacture.

Simple water, clean and free of contaminants, will give our Haitian family a chance for a healthy and longer life.

Air-friendly outdoor activities

The flowers blooming, trees blossoming, warmer air and a desire to spend as much time outside as possible are marks of spring. This season, consider scheduling these air-friendly activities into your leisure time:

Pitch a tent: You don't have to travel far to enjoy the great outdoors; the Kansas City metro area has many opportunities. You can search for

a campsite in Missouri (www. icampmo.com) or Kansas (www. kdwp.state.ks.us/news/state_ parks/locations) online. You can also check out the Parks Service for more great outdoors suggestions and fun day trips. Important AirQ Tip: If you're grilling outside, bring a charcoal chimney rather than using




lighter fluid, which produces harmful fumes.

- Take a hike: Call your friends, pack a lunch, and make a day of walking outside enjoying the fall colors. Light hiking burns about 225 calories in just 30 minutes. Check out the walking opportunities that Kansas or Missouri trails and historic sites have to offer, or consider a walking trip in a nearby city or county park, such as Loose, Shawnee Mission or Wyandotte County Lake. If urban hiking is more your style, pay a visit to your favorite spot and let your feet do the work.
- Organize a group bike ride: Try converting an activity you usually do with your friends into a bicycle-oriented one. Going out for coffee? Meet up and bike to your favorite café. Want to explore your town? Do it from a bicycle and discover streets and shops you never knew existed. Check out the Missouri Bicycle Federation's calendar for local social-cycling events.

This spring, look for emissions-free activities that require minimal driving and involve a maximum enjoyment of the outdoors. No matter what activity you're taking part in, remember that you're playing a role in keeping our air clean and helping others — and yourself — breathe easy!
