FROM THE DEAN

God is love. John's first letter states clearly what is repeated throughout the all of Holy Scripture. Nothing is more central to the Christian Faith and the Anglican Tradition than this proclamation.

God is love. We cannot communicate that message too often. And we must not assume that people readily believe this truth. A parishioner, commenting on a recent homily, observed that the kind of God you speak of, a loving God who is always with us and took a human form to experience all that we experience as His creatures, is a God so different from the one I learned about as a child. Indeed, the message that God is love is not necessarily what people hear the Christian Church proclaiming today.

But I firmly believe that the ministry of our Cathedral consistently and boldly witnesses to St. John's conviction that God is love. Opportunities abound both to experience and to share the Good News of God's love. Souls are fed, nurtured, healed, forgiven, welcomed, and strengthened. The lives of receivers and givers alike are changed when

God's love is known. There has never been a more important time to share the sure and certain proclamation that God is love.

May our commitment to sharing God's love continue to grow in varied and wondrous ways. May we seek to know more deeply how much we are loved, and with Christ's help, may we be authentic instruments of that love. For God is love.

O Lord, you have taught us that without love whatever we do is worth nothing: Send your Holy Spirit and pour into our hearts your greatest gift, which is love, the true bond of peace and of all virtue, without which whoever lives is accounted dead before you. Grant this for the sake of your only Son Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen. (Collect for the Seventh Sunday after the Epiphany, BCP, p.216.)

Cavanaugh memorial fund created

Sunday, June 22, Al Mauro announced at all three services the creation of the Cavanaugh Memorial Fund:

"This week marks the 50th anniversary of the ordination of the Very Rev. James Earl Cavanaugh as a priest. On August 9, 2007 we lost Earl, who lives in our hearts and minds as someone who ministered to us here as our dean and who believed in collaboration for the common good.

He lived out the greater part of his vocation as priest at Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral as our dean, pastor, counselor and friend. Upon his retirement as dean, Earl was chaplain at Bishop Spencer Place where he also served as a board member.

Serving the community by caring for the poor, feeding the hungry, nursing the sick and providing access to education were not just priorities for Earl, they were sacraments.

Earl was instrumental in starting a hunger ministry at the cathedral that grew into the Kansas City community kitchen which now feeds more than 400 daily.

Earl also had concern for those who could not afford care at Bishop Spencer Place. Bishop Spencer Place presently provides financial assistance to 18 of its 177 current residents at an annual cost of more than \$37,000 per subsidized resident.

As a memorial to honor Earl and to carry out the ministries which he was devoted to, Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral has created a Cavanaugh Memorial Endowment to continue the fight against hunger, ignorance and poverty in Kansas City, and Bishop Spencer Place has created a Cavanaugh Memorial Endowment to benefit benevolent care for residents of its care facility.

A joint committee comprised of representatives of the cathedral and Bishop Spencer Place is working together to raise funds for the respective endowments.

Donations received will be donor-designated and applied either to the Cavanaugh Memorial Endowment for Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral, or the Cavanaugh Memorial Endowment for Bishop Spencer Place, or a combination thereof as directed by the donor.

All donations will be administered by the greater Kansas City Community Foundation for the respective endowment. Distributions will be from earnings of the funds as directed by the

trustees for each fund. Trustees are appointed by Bishop Spencer Place for its fund and the vestry for its fund.

The joint committee is making calls to meet with prospective donors to consider pledges from three to five years to fund the endowment.

As co-chairman of this effort, after consultation with Nancy Cavanaugh, we thought it would be appropriate to announce the formation of the Earl Cavanaugh memorial endowments on the anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood, and to request that you consider how you might participate in continuing the noble and good work of our departed dean and friend Earl Cavanaugh."

Ellen Goheen, Al Mauro and Dean White are members of the fund's Advisory Committee. The fund is designed to receive gifts of any amount at any time.

A word from a chaplain about your becoming hospitalized

Hospitals and healthcare facilities by every means possible seek to protect the privacy of your medical information. Various regulations govern this matter, but the one you are most familiar with is the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act commonly referred to as: HIPAA. You encounter this every time you go to a new health provider and are given a document to sign that says how your privacy will be protected.

As a result of the efforts to maintain your privacy, hospitals and health facilities do not routinely contact clergy about your admission. The fact that you are in the hospital, once known by any individual including your clergy person could be confirmed by calling the facility. Because, unless you specifically object and opt out at the time of admission, *your name, the location in which you are receiving care, your condition (in general terms) and your religious affiliation (if provided) can be made known to the caller*—and that is all!

So how is your clergy to know you have been admitted and might want to be seen? You or a family member or someone you authorize must call or contact her/him. Hospital staff, including chaplains, if given permission can call on your behalf, but do not expect, even if you tell them you are a member of _____ that this means a call will be made to the congregation or clergy person. You are responsible.

If you know you are to be admitted, call your clergy person. If you are able after an unplanned admission to call, do so as soon as possible. Ask a family member or other to contact your church. Ask for the assistance of a chaplain.

Your clergy wants to know and wants to be with you. Make it so.

If you are interested in exploring questions such as these, the Education for Ministry program of study, reflection and fellowship may be for you.

Education for Ministry is a four-year extension program for lay people from the University of the South (Sewanee). In EfM, we learn about Holy Scripture, church history, theology and ourselves.

Students commit to just one year at a time, at a cost of \$340 per year.

EfM groups will meet at the Cathedral from September through May, Thursdays at 6:30 p.m. or Tuesdays at 9:15 a.m.
