FROM THE DEAN

As we approach Holy Week, the Sacred Triduum, the Day of Resurrection and the glorious Fifty Days of Easter, I invite us to pray and meditate upon the words of the collects and holy day liturgies from The Book of Common Prayer we shall be experiencing.

The Sunday of the Passion: Palm Sunday

Assist us mercifully with your help, O Lord God of our salvation, that we may enter with joy upon the contemplation of those mighty acts, whereby you have given us life and immortality; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Almighty and everliving God, in your tender love for the human race you sent your Son our Savior Jesus Christ to take upon him our nature, and to suffer death upon the cross, giving us the example of his great humility: Mercifully grant that we may walk in the way of his suffering, and also share in his resurrection; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

Monday in Holy Week

Almighty God, whose most dear Son went not up to joy but first he suffered pain, and entered not into glory before he was crucified: Mercifully grant that we, walking in the way of the cross, may find it none other than the way of life and peace; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who lives and reigns ...

Tuesday in Holy Week

O God, by the passion of your blessed Son you made an instrument of shameful death to be for us the means of life: Grant us so to glory in the cross of Christ, that we may gladly suffer shame and loss for the sake of your Son our Savior Jesus Christ; who lives and reigns ...

Wednesday in Holy Week

Lord God, whose blessed Son our Savior gave his body to be whipped and his face to be spit upon: Give us grace to accept joyfully the sufferings of the present time, confident of the glory that shall be revealed; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who live and reigns ...

Maundy Thursday

Almighty Father, whose dear Son, on the night before he suffered, instituted the Sacrament of his Body and Blood: Mercifully grant that we may receive it thankfully in remembrance of Jesus Christ our Lord, who in these holy mysteries gives us a pledge of eternal life; and who now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit ...

Good Friday

Almighty God, we pray you graciously to behold this your family, for whom our Lord Jesus Christ was willing to be betrayed, and given into the hands of sinners, and to suffer death upon the cross; who now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit ...

Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the Living God, we pray you to set your passion, cross, and death between your judgment and our souls, now and in the hour of our death. Give mercy and grace to the living, pardon and rest to the dead; to you holy Church peace and concord; and to us sinners everlasting life and glory ...

Holy Saturday

O God, Creator of heaven and earth: Grant that, as the crucified body of your dear Son was laid in the tomb and rested on this holy Sabbath, so we may await with him the coming of the third day, and rise with him to newness of life; who now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

The Great Vigil of Easter

Rejoice now, heavenly hosts and choirs of angels, and let your trumpets shout Salvation for the victory of our mighty King!

This is the night, when Christ broke the bonds of death and hell, and rose victorious from the grave!

Sunday of the Resurrection: Easter Day

O God, who for our redemption gave your only-begotten Son to the death of the cross, and by his glorious resurrection delivered us from the power of our enemy: Grant us so to die daily to sin, that we may evermore live with him in the joy of his resurrection; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Beloved in Christ, the way of the cross is the way of life. Let us seek Our Lord's grace that we may faithfully take up our cross and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life. We have been delivered from the power of our enemy. May we die daily to sin, that we may evermore live with the Risen Christ in the joy of his resurrection.

Maison de Naissance: 2008 in review

As we look back on 2008, Haiti has had many challenges, inflation, violent hurricanes, lightening strikes and civil unrest. Maison de Naissance has suffered in these adversities. With \$8 per gallon gasoline prices, it cost \$150 per day to keep the generator and ambulance in operation. The "rice riots" set up roadblocks and emergency procedures were necessary to insure that MN stayed open and operational. MN's ambulance slid off a road during a spring rainstorm and was a total loss, thankfully no fatalities. During the four hurricanes there was loss of crops, homes and livestock. A lightening strike hit MN and the center was without consistent power for eight weeks. The staff worked with kerosene lamps delivering babies. In spite of these hardships the number of visits and deliveries almost doubled in the second half of the year.

From these times of crisis wonderful things happened. First, a volunteer work group from Kansas City, Omaha and Canada re-wired and




re-roofed MN. Second, relief funds were contributed for solar panels to replace the expensive diesel generator. Third, contributions allowed for the replacement of the ambulance with two new ambulances, an addition that will allow MN to reach more mothers. Pere Alphonse held a blessing ceremony, organized by the staff, for the new ambulance at MN the first morning they were driven from Les Cayes to MN. Since then each morning when the staff is picked up they take a moment to say a morning prayer of thanks before they journey to MN. Also, new partnerships will now allow MN to purchase large quantities of medications at a discount. The staff will be strengthened with two additional nurse midwives and two more in training.

Since its opening in 2004, MN has grown from providing safe births for a few to serving a community of more that 25,000, delivering hundreds of babies and providing HIV/ AIDS, malaria and family planning education.

The Cathedral Friends of MN thank everyone for their continued support of our work for the beautiful and hopeful people of Haiti.

Pausing to let our souls catch up

Beloved Cathedral Family and Friends,

It is with peace, sadness and hopeful expectation that I am writing to let you know that after Sunday, May 3, I will be stepping away from my position at the Cathedral. The peace is because my leaving at this time is the result of a difficult discernment process which began for me some time ago and has now come to an end, and so I am resting more gently in God. The sadness, of course, is because I have grown to love the people of the Cathedral so much that it is very difficult to imagine not being with you in our hallways and at our altar.

The great Christian story goes on, but I must admit to already feeling the grief of missing out on the next chapter of the ongoing life at Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral, and of your individual parts in it. My joyful expectation is that our God is just what we are taught that God is, a loving and transforming presence who, when we release our lives into God's care, carries each of us more and more into who God is, into our love for each other, and into who we are created to be.

I want to make two things very clear:

1. My decision has nothing to do with any situation, person or condition at the Cathedral. It would be natural, for example, to assume that the recent budget concerns somehow prompted this action. When it became clear that the Cathedral, like virtually all institutions and individuals these days, was facing financial challenge, I did, in fact, offer the Dean my resignation, which he firmly declined.

2. I am not ill. It would also be natural, given what I hope is my obvious love and respect for the parishioners, the staff, the Dean and my clergy colleagues to imagine that I would only leave under some kind of duress. The 'duress' under which I take my leave is the same invitation of God which brought me here in the first place; the invitation to follow as best as I am able what I believe I am called to do as a priest in God's church.

What was initially puzzling for me, and may be puzzling for you as well, is that I am not called to a new position elsewhere, but rather into a time of Sabbath rest and renewal. It appears as something of a wilderness experience, since this particular Sabbath is not defined by time or place, but simply by a strong call to be away for awhile from what is ordinarily understood as the work of ministry. A spiritual mentor, however, recently pointed out that the work directly in front of me is to rest with God and to wander some in the desert.

Bishop Howe said during his recent visitation to the Cathedral that, "There is no such thing as a solitary Christian."

Christian discernment does not happen alone. My decision has come through prayer and self-examination and conversation with, among others, our generous Bishop who has once again guided and supported this somewhat off-the-norm sheep. I thank Bishop Howe and offer, too, my particular thanks to Dean Terry and Canon Sue who have also graciously accepted me for who I am and trusted God in this process.

As some of you know, I once heard a nowfavorite story about a group of anthropologists. It seems that they were studying an aboriginal tribe which would mysteriously stop in their travels and activities for no apparent reason. When questioned as to the purpose of these stops, the leader of the tribe responded, "Ah, that is when we pause to let our souls catch up."

I am pausing now to let my soul catch up. Thank you each and all for the abundant life you have lived in Christ and shared with me, and thank you for your prayers.



While some children have taken off with the new skill, others remain steadfast in their commitment to learn something new and keep trying. We hope to create a whole new group of spiritual knitters to help create tiny hats for newborns in Haiti while raising awareness of the great need of our brethren in Christ.











Stewardship modeling centers inspire children & Maison de Naissance

Children's Formation remains committed to teaching children about the world beyond our classroom. Our stewardship modeling centers in Haden Hall (Mini-MN, Junior Community Kitchen and tiny priest sacristy with vestments) have been operating since 2006. We "serve" international foods and have introduced more food groups to demonstrate healthy, balanced meals in our Junior Community Kitchen. Our Mini-MN center has added more "babies" and "medical equipment," including a "laboratory" with pretend microscope, x-ray machine and human body models. We thank Joan Bock for her donation of the Haitian painting that adorns the wall of the center and Sharyl Wallace for the red doctor's medical bag. Our center has been photographed by a representative of Maison de Naissance and plans to use the Cathedral's Mini MN as a paradigm to create educational materials for MN are in the works. —by DeAnn McTavish
