FROM THE DEAN

From several perspectives, September is a time of excitement marked by new energy and renewed commitment. Whether it is due to some time off for travel and rest, or making one's way through a difficult situation, or beginning a new journey by entering a new grade or school or job or relationship, or by coming to the realization that we are loved by God and thus are never alone in whatever we face, hope and expectation are hallmarks of this time of year.

As the Cathedral's program year hits the ground running, you are invited to engage in the worship and life your faith community. Whether you are continuing in familiar areas of parish life, or looking to change course, or are new to the community and considering a commitment of time and energy to support the Cathedral mission and ministry, I invite you to include in your discernment and prayers the following selections from The Catechism of The Book of Common Prayer:

- Q. How does the Church pursue its mission?
- A. The Church pursues its mission as it prays and worships, proclaims the Gospel, and promotes justice, peace and love.
- Q. Through whom does the Church carry out its mission?
- A. The church carries out its mission through the ministry of all its members.
- Q. What is the duty of all Christians?
- A. The duty of all Christians is to follow Christ; to come together week by week for corporate worship; and to work, pray, and give for the spread of the kingdom of God.

Supporting the mission of the Church of Jesus Christ with our prayers, time, and money is the call of all the baptized. Early in my faith journey, as I discerned how God wished me to live out my baptismal vows, a priest shared the following attributed in Bishop Frank Weston:

"You are Christians, then your Lord is one and the same with Jesus on the throne of his glory, with Jesus in His Blessed Sacrament, with Jesus received into your hearts in Communion, with Jesus who is mystically present with you as you pray and with Jesus enshrined in the hearts and bodies of His brothers and sisters up and down the world. Now go out into the highways and hedges, and look for Jesus in the ragged and naked, in the oppressed and sweated, in those who have lost hope, and in those who are struggling to make good. Look for Jesus in them; and when you find Him, gird yourselves with His towel of fellowship, and wash His feet in the person of His brethren."

From the Baptismal Covenant: Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself? I will, with God's help.

You have much to offer the mission of Jesus Christ through the work of this Cathedral. Thank you for your commitment, and may God bless you in the work your are called to do.

September 6, 13, 20 **Atonement Theologies**

Christian thinkers have disagreed sharply over the last 2000 years about how it is that humans are reconciled with God through the sacrificial death of Jesus Christ.

Led by Canon Sue Sommer, the class will examine atonement from a variety of perspectives, starting with the Old Testament.

"While we'll be in the midst of this class, our Jewish brothers and sisters will embark upon the Days of Awe - Rosh Hashanah (the Jewish New Year) is September 18 this year which means that Yom Kippur (the Day of Atonement) will be 10 days later on September 27," Canon Sommer observes. "Christians certainly didn't invent atonement as a concept or doctrine, and in order for us to understand the various Christian understandings of atonement, we need to start with Jewish teaching."

- September 6: Leviticus the blood of bulls and the scapegoat, plus a look at rabbinic Judaism and how the observance of Yom Kippur has evolved.
- September 13: An overview of teachings by the Early Church Fathers through the Reformation (Anselm or Abelaard - you
- September 20: Some contemporary interpretations of atonement theology. What "works," what doesn't and why.

September 27, October 4 The Gospel According to Rock &

It is NOT the Devil's Music: The Gospel According to Bob, Bono, the Boss, the Beatles ... and More

These two Sundays, Founders' Hall will turn into the Fillmore, the Cavern Club and maybe even Max Yazgur's farm for a couple of hours through the magic of the music that is the soundtrack of our lives.

The title of these sessions refers to the soul and spirituality that we will explore in the music, lyrics, and lives of Bob Dylan, U2, Bruce Springsteen, the Fab Four and many, many more. We'll listen to some great music and discuss some of the saints and prophets of rock & roll: artists like Van Morrison, James Taylor, Aretha Franklin, Sam Cooke, the Doors, Dion, Jerry Lee Lewis, Don McLean, and others.

On one of his tours, almost every night Bruce Springsteen would speak exuberantly of "the power, the magic, the mystery and the ministry of rock & roll." If you like both the Bible and rock & roll, you will not want to miss these two weeks of Adult Formation.

MN, happy fifth anniversary

Maison de Naissance will soon reach its fifth anniversary. The good folks there have persevered through supply shortages, equipment failures and even hurricanes, all the while helping more and more families.

In 2009 they are on target to deliver between 50-60 babies every month and see between 500-600 mothers and babies in clinic. The Community Health program now has six outreach workers visiting families monthly to collect data and provide healthcare resources. They have accomplished so much and have so much to celebrate!

Sunday, August 16 was a joyful day for local agencies and organizations that advocate for children in the Kansas City Metro area. Members of GHTC gave generously to the school supply drive for local foster children and kids in need. Thank you to everyone at the Cathedral, your efforts and generosity make a difference in our community.

Among the items collected and distributed to St. Luke's-Crittenton Children's Center and their Family Advocates Foster Care Program were:

- 239 reams of notebook paper
- 160 notebooks
- 50 legal pads
- 75 folders with pockets
- 32 composition books
- 90 boxes of crayons
- 35 boxes of colored markers
- 10 boxes of highlighters
- 20 packages of pens
- 180 glue sticks/bottles of glue
- 16 calculators
- 24 boxes of colored pencils
- 101 rulers
- 35 watercolor sets/ pastels
- 24 packages of mechanical pencils

There were numerous miscella-

neous items such as: lip balm, pencil sharpeners, erasers, pencil pouches, pencil boxes and storage bins.
