## FROM THE DEAN

Liturgical scholar and hymn composer, the Rev. Dr. Percy Dearmer, lived from 1867 to 1936. Born in London, he was educated at Westminster and at Christ Church, Oxford. He was one of the early members of the Christian Social Union, which was established in 1889. After he was ordained deacon and priest, he began a systematic and lifelong study of liturgics and liturgical ceremonial. In 1899 he published *The Parson's Handbook*, in which he demonstrated that it is possible to be an Anglican ritualist without being a Romanist.

He put his ideas into practice as vicar of St. Mary's Church, Primrose Hill, Hampstead, 1901-1915. From 1919 until 1936, he was professor of ecclesiastical arts at King's College, London. In 1931 he became a Canon of Westminster Abbey. Dearmer was a co-editor of the English Hymnal, Songs of Praise, and the Oxford Book of Carols. Eight of his hymns are found in our *Hymnal 1982*, one being hymn 145 whose text is found below.

There is a progression of thought in this text which I find to be utterly true. The hymn verses describe a progression I tend to walk each Lent. By that I mean that I begin Lent resolved to keep a certain observance, only to find a week or two later that though I have the ability to keep up the observance, I am simply not finding that my soul is being fed, and I need a change. This is not to say that my Lent got off to a bad start. Quite the opposite; through my annual observance, I discover again how I must shift my focus in order to move deeper in the heart of God.

Here are Dr. Dearmer's first two stanzas:

*Now quit your care and anxious fear and worry;  
for schemes are vain and fretting brings no gain.  
Lent calls to prayer, to trust and dedication;  
God brings new beauty nigh;  
reply with love to love most high.*

*To bow the head in sackcloth and in ashes,  
or rend the soul, such grief is not Lent's goal;  
but to be led to where God's glory flashes,  
God's beauty to come near.  
Make clear where truth and light appear;*

Dr. Dearmer then paraphrases verses of Isaiah 58 read on Ash Wednesday. The fast that God seeks, and judging from my own heart, the fast I need, calls me to connect piety to servanthood. Indeed, this is the fast all of God's people are called to live out. The final three stanzas of the hymn are:

*For is not this the fast that I have chosen?  
(The prophet spoke) To shatter every yoke,  
of wickedness, the grievous bands to loosen,  
oppression put to flight,  
to fight till every wrong's set right.*

*For righteousness and peace will show their faces  
to those who feed the hungry in their need,  
and wrongs redress, who build the old waste places,  
and in the darkness shine.  
Divine it is when all combine!*

*Then shall your light break forth as doth the morning;  
Your health shall spring, the friends you make shall bring  
God's glory bright, your way through life adoring;  
And love shall be the prize.  
Arise and make a paradise!*

As we continue our journey to, and through, the Passion, may we keep the fast that God has chosen, the fast that God would have us choose, that we may come to true joy of the Resurrection.

# Good news from Maison de Naissance

The news from Maison de Naissance is better than first expected. Rosemond Menelas, Haitian director of MN, has demonstrated he is a good administrator by thinking ahead and planning for possible shortages. When he could, he stockpiled critical supplies. So, in the short term, they are prepared.

It is the long term that is of great concern, especially as people leave the wrecked city of Port-au-Prince and return to the areas of their origin. The Haitian government estimated at the end of January that 262,000 people had taken advantage of free transportation provided by the government. Many more people have left us-

ing private transportation. This means that the services provided by MN, already at capacity, will be strained in the weeks and months ahead as they serve a larger population.

Rosemond and the staff at MN, all have family members and friends who have died, been injured or are still missing. Yet, even in their grief, they continue to provide the best possible care to the women who come to MN to give birth.

As information and images of the devastation in Haiti fade from the media, let us not forget

## Connors named as Episcopal young adult delegate

Alexandra Connors, a student at Kansas State University and Cathedral member, has been named as one of ten Episcopal Young Adult Delegates to the 54th United Nations Commission on the Status of Women meeting in March in New York City. The Commission on the Status of Women meets each year and is a functional commission of the United Nations Economic and Social Council.

Along with delegates from other Christian dominations, she will participate in training sessions, forums, worship services and other events, engaging issues from the perspective of international cooperation and the Baptismal Covenant. The conference is dedicated exclusively to exploring topics related to general equality and the advancement of women. This year it will meet March 1-6.

More than 70 young Episcopal adults applied for the delegation's coveted 10 spots. Alexandra will join young adults from Alabama,

Florida, Kentucky, New Hampshire, Hawaii, California, Arizona and Michigan. She will interact with young adults from the National Council of Churches and the World Christian Student Federation which will conduct a worship service and facilitate an event examining the institutional barriers to women's empowerment.

Alexandra writes, "I am greatly looking forward to further exploring the range of issues affecting women in Latin America and discovering how my current field of study can be used to help their situation. I will have the opportunity to attend presentations, engage in lobbying to mold conclusions that come out of daily meetings and delve in a myriad of workshop opportunities. All of these different avenues of participation span cultural, geographic, denominational and even religious differences."

## Diocesan youth honor Curtis Hamilton and Canon Behen

The fifth annual Bishop's Ball at St. Paul's in Kansas City on January 30 drew over 200 youth and adult supporters of youth ministry. In the midst of the dancing and fun, several clergy and lay leaders received coveted awards from the vibrant and growing diocesan youth community.

Among those honored at this year's ball were Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral's own Curtis Hamilton and Canon Joe Behen. Curtis received the Lifetime Contribution Award in recognition of his great support of parish and diocesan youth ministry over the years. Father Joe received the Above and Beyond Award, presented by his daughter Samantha, in recognition of his deep commitment to youth ministry.

## Why we walk

This is the 22nd year for AIDS WALK Kansas City, and our Episcopal community has supported this cause over the years primarily through a walk team coordinated through the Cathedral. Twenty years, and to date there has not been one cure and HIV/AIDS infection is on the increase.

In Kansas City, more than 5,700 people live with HIV/AIDS, 700 of those being between the ages of 13 and 24. Medical care, shelter, and other basic life needs are a challenge for many of those stricken with AIDS—and funds raised by AIDS Walk benefit local AIDS service organizations in this community. The AIDS Walk raises both awareness and money for local service organizations such as the Kansas City Free Health Clinic, the Hope Care Center,

SAVE, and the Good Samaritan Project.

This year, the walk will be Saturday, April 24 at Theis Park, just south of the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art. Registration opens at 8 a.m., welcoming ceremonies commence at 9 a.m. and we walk at 10 a.m.

Jayson Vucovich will be the team captain for the Cathedral walkers this year. We hope you will join us for in the fight against HIV/AIDS in our community. Watch for additional information on how you can help, including our first coffee hour on March 14. Whether you walk or pledge a donation, we all thank you for your support.

For the month of January 2010, income totaled \$91,642 which compared favorably with budget of \$90,617. Expenses for the month totaled \$135,239 which included the non-budgeted Diocesan assessment payment of \$16,435 for 2009 which was approved at Vestry in January. Excluding this payment, operating expenses would have been \$118,808 which was below the budget of \$119,276. Additionally, the expenses were significantly lower than 2009 when the expenses totaled \$137,443. The shortage for the month totaled \$43,597. Excluding the amount of assessment for 2009, the shortage would have been \$27,162 which was also below the budget of negative \$28,659.



Café Grazia turned into Café Gras in February with Mardi Gras favorites red beans and rice being served along with jambalaya. The next Café Grazia will be April 14.






# Book Review

*The Bronze Bow*

written by Elizabeth George Speare

Elizabeth George Speare's *The Bronze Bow* is one of those books you can read repeatedly and it strikes you differently each time! If you like historical fiction and imagining what life might have been like during the time of Jesus, you must give this a try and again and again.... It was awarded the Newbery Medal (the author's second) in 1962, and has been studied by students because of the literary devices so subtly mastered by this author.



Speare wrote this book when she was teaching Sunday school in the late 1950s. She stated that she "longed to lift the personality of Jesus off the flat and lifeless pages of our textbook." She wanted the children, and others, to imagine life in a turbulent society of Palestine; and create a wonderment of what boys and girls, at that time, felt and spoke about this carpenter from Nazareth, Jesus. How would it have felt to be a young person at that time; and have heard rumors of this man who preached to large crowds, healed the sick, and talked of a kingdom that was not of this world?

Training to be a warrior ready to fight and filled with hatred toward the Romans, Daniel, becomes his own worst enemy. It is only his quest for revenge that robs him of knowing love—for his family, friends and himself. So when he hears preaching about how love conquers and the truth will set you free, it doesn't make sense to this soldier!

Daniel's heart is hardened, but I tended to keep looking for the 'good' in him. Overall, this book addresses loyalty, friendship, determination and a love that heals our internal conflicts and external turmoil. Suggested to readers ages 9 and up. 
