FROM THE PRIEST-IN-CHARGE

By the time you read this, the consecration of Bishop-Elect Martin Field will be one short month away. The consecration will be March 5 at 11 a.m. in the Colonial ballroom of the Marriott Hotels' Muehlebach Tower — a location that enables a far larger crowd than the Cathedral could possibly accommodate.

As some of you know, I learned in December that I would be in charge of designing, planning and emceeing the consecration liturgy. Meanwhile, Cathedral staff members Mary Ann Mansfield and July Toma learned that they were heading up Hospitality and Communication at about the same time. So though the consecration itself will not take place at the Cathedral, the Cathedral is certainly VERY well represented in the weekend's events.

In my copious spare time these days, I've been doing pre-marital counseling with couples who will be married this spring. And it occurs to me that there are striking similarities between couples planning a wedding and the diocese planning a consecration. Both are celebratory events that mark the beginning of a new creation. Both involve massive planning and organization, the occasional melt-down, new clothes and not-inconsiderable expense.

The challenge for bridal couples, during pre-marital counseling, is to focus on the marriage, not simply on the wedding, and I daresay that those of us who are actively (some would say obsessively) involved in the consecration details would do well to lean into that challenge as well.

Bishop-elect Field was elected from a slate of strong candidates. He is well aware of the challenges placed before him. Chief among those challenges will be living faithfully into the demands of office. In the consecration liturgy, Bishop-elect Field will be asked by one of his co-consecrating bishops, *"As chief priest and pastor, will you encourage and support all baptized people in their gifts and ministries, nour-*

ish them from the riches of God's grace, pray for them without ceasing, and celebrate with them the sacraments of our redemption?" Living faithfully into that charge, to say nothing of the administrative and organizational demands of office, is a daunting challenge in itself.

The new bishop will then be seated at Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral the following day at our 10:15 a.m. liturgy. Using the crosier, one of the symbols of office, he will ritually knock three times on the door of the nave. The Senior Warden will open the door, the new bishop will greet us and be escorted to the chancel.

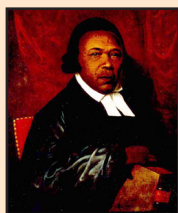
He will be welcomed ritually, to which he will respond ritually by asking to be seated in the chair that is the remaining symbol of office (the others having been given to him the day before at his consecration). He'll then be led to his cathedra where he will be seated. He will then stand, move to the presider's chair, and preside at the regular celebration of Holy Eucharist.

It is a wonderful liturgy that Cathedrals alone are privileged to celebrate, as gracious as it is brief. It acknowledges the shared ministry of bishop and priest, and recognizes that while it is the bishop's prerogative to preside and preach whenever he/she is in the Cathedral, the parish itself is led by the dean (or priest-in-charge, as the case is at present). That marvelous system of checks-and-balances, a hallmark of how the Episcopal Church governs itself, is enacted ritually in this little service.

Anyone who wishes to attend the consecration is welcome. It promises to be rich in pageantry as only the Episcopal Church can do, as well as wonderfully symbolic of the continuity of apostolic leadership. I am particularly hopeful that Cathedral members will want to participate both in it as well as in the Seating the next day.

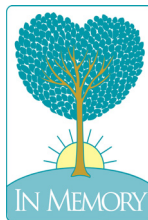

The month of December was very close to budget in nearly all categories of income and expense. The pledges totaled \$61,805 compared to budget of \$60,000 and plate offering was \$16,882 compared to budget of \$17,000. The total income of \$180,948 for the month included a distribution from endowment of \$40,000. The expenses were lower than budget and reflected a net operating income of \$59,091 for the month. Adjusting for the \$40,000 endowment amount, the operating income would have been \$19,091 for the month of December 2010.

The year ended December 31, 2010, reflected expenses held below budget (\$1,608,340 actual and \$1,620,929 budget). The shortage in income relates to the month of November 2010 in the area of pledge and plate. As a result of November's shortfall, the year-to-date pledge was \$447,534 actual as compared to a budget of \$466,582 and plate was \$76,918 actual as compared to budget of \$80,000. Special gifts and users fees were below budget as well for year. The net operating income is reported as \$37,623 which includes the \$40,000 in endowment income. Adjusting for the \$40,000 endowment amount, the net operating income would have been slightly negative at \$2,377 for the year.

At this point, the budget for 2011 generally keeps expenses in line and will be dependent upon pledge and plate income to be realized in the amount similar to the 2010 budget amount. Pledges for 2011 continue to come in and we appreciate everyone's efforts towards returning pledge cards and planning for 2011.

One year later in Haiti

A year has passed since the devastating earthquake in Haiti and frequently we hear how difficult it is to get funds and supplies out of Port au Prince and to the people. Only a fraction of the outpouring of donations have actually been put to use to help the country rebuild. Fortunately, this is not the case for gifts and support going to MN, according to Heather Ehlert, executive director of Maison de Naissance Foundation.

We can be confident that our monetary contributions and gifts, such as the knitted caps and onesies, are not held up in the political process. Funds designated for MN are deposited directly into an account in a safe bank in the city of Les Cayes, nearest to MN. Many of the needed supplies are purchased locally. When materials are needed from the United States, they often are carried to MN by volunteers traveling to Haiti.

It is important to enable MN to continue providing daily care and services to mothers and babies, as well as making it possible for MN to build small inventories of supplies to see them through the hard times when supplies are not so plentiful.
