#### PRIEST-IN-CHAR FROM T

With so much attention appropriately given to Japan in the aftermath of its catastrophic earthquake and tsunamis, it is easy for the aftermath of the 2010 earthquake in Haiti to have gone off our radar screens entirely. Japan has the considerable resources to mobilize reconstruction efforts; their task, while enormous, is manageable. By contrast, the sad reality is that 15 months after the Haitian earthquake, the poorest country in the western hemisphere remains devastated.

The Episcopal Diocese of Haiti is a member of the Episcopal Church. It is part of Province II and is home to nearly 100,000 Episcopalians. It has 97 parishes, 200 schools, and in 2008 celebrated over 200 baptisms and 700 confirmations. Its cathedral in Port-au-Prince is named Holy Trinity Cathedral, and it suffered catastrophic damage in the earthquake.

Episcopal Relief and Development moved in immediately after the earthquake with medical support and temporary shelter, aiding efforts already underway by Bishop Jean-Zache Duracin. ERD continues to provide humanitarian support, and Bishop Duracin and his staff have been tireless in their local efforts to raise funds to meet the day-to-day needs of their people.

Starting this month, the Diocese of West Missouri will join other dioceses to take a very important next step: Rebuild our Church in Haiti. This is a campaign to raise the resources necessary to rebuild the Cathedral, and return it to its former status as a place where Haitians can go in times of trouble, and where they will be lifted up spiritually and physically. The Diocese is doing this as part of an effort promulgated by the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church to encourage every parish in the USA to participate. In helping them, we will help a diocese which

is at once the poorest and the most populous diocese in the Episcopal Church.

Rebuild Our Church in Haiti asks parishioners to "buy a brick" for \$10. Monies raised in this way will help clear remaining rubble, restore the surviving murals and rebuild Holy Trinity Cathedral as a center of hope, faith and refuge to the people of Haiti.

I would very much like for Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral to lead the way in the Diocese of West Missouri in supporting Holy Trinity Cathedral in Port-au-Prince. As Cathedral parishioners, we know how much our own beloved building means to us in terms of our worship and community life. Long-time parishioners may recall how you felt when a portion of the north wall of the nave crumbled 20 years ago. Imagine our entire Cathedral in ruins, and you can begin to imagine what the people of Holy Trinity Cathedral have experienced this past year. We share an Episcopal heritage with our Haitian brothers and sisters, and our two cathedrals share a very similar name. What is different for us is that the per capital income among Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral members is considerably higher than the \$480 annual per capita income in Haiti. Most all of us have it well within our capacity to support this very important, easily reachable goal.

The campaign formally kicks off on May 15 and will run for nine weeks. More information will be available on the website and in the Sunday bulletins.

As we celebrate the Great 50 Days of Easter, may we be mindful that God's "default setting" is always on new life from death. From the rubble of Holy Trinity Cathedral, a rebuilt cathedral will take shape and provide shelter and spiritual support for Haitian Episcopalians.

Comparing March 2011 to March 2010, there were three notable differences. During March 2010, \$100,000 of the DST note repayment was realized. The difference in income between March 2010 and March 2011 also included higher user fees and higher endowment income which was approximately \$5,000 greater than in 2011. As a result of the differences, March 2011 was approximately \$105,000 lower than March 2010. On the expenses for the month, total expenses were \$9,000 less in 2011 than 2010.

For the year-to-date, pledges and plate revenues were higher in 2011 by about \$16,000. Excluding the DST note income in 2010, the year-to-date 2011 income is performing better than 2010. Likewise on the expense side, total expenses are about \$66,000 less in 2011 than in 2010. The year-to-date 2011 reflects a loss of \$23,327 as compared to a positive \$6,308 for 2010.

# Adult Formation

Sundays • 9:15 a.m. • Founders' Hall

May 1, 8, 15, 22 How to Read the Bible and Why Bother. A Reprise.

This four week session led by the Reverend Dr. Michael Johnston will examine anew the relationship that the believing community has to its sacred texts and how the texts function to define the community. We will look in detail at the ways in which the stories of Holy Scripture work to "assemble" our Christian identity.

### Children learn, serve and love

Some activities the children of formation have been up to in the past few months include:

We made bread. As part of the 'Stories of the Kingdom of Heaven' lesson, the children learned about parables of the mustard seed and yeast. Jesus showed his disciples that these are symbols of the power of God. The tiny mustard seed can flourish into a thriving tree providing shelter to birds and how a somewhat stinky thing like yeast can make lumps of simple dough rise! As per our lesson plan, "Jesus encouraged his disciples by showing them the surprising effect that such an imperceptible force can have on the whole society....God's plans (also) work(s) almost invisibly to bring about its purposes." Additionally, I liked the explanation the teachers were able to read: "Episcopalians see salvation ... as a process. Like a growing mustard seed plant or a bowl of dough, our salvation develops and grows...(W)e believe we are always being saved through the continual mercy and grace of God. The focus is not so much on the act or the achievement of salvation as on the way of life that moves toward a right relationship with God and with one another." See how enriched us teachers of youngsters get to be?!?!

We transformed crayons. As part of 'Transfiguration' lesson, we shredded crayons up, dropped them onto parchment paper (with a design of a glowing Jesus), and melted the shavings with a hot iron and then framed the. We tried to explain that the change in Jesus was really a change in the hearts of the disciples. Just like crayons can transform to a stained glass looking object, so can our understanding of each other and God. We teachers got to read how this "...Transfiguration touches on the mystical side of Episcopal temperament, the side that honors the mystery of the word made flesh without seeking to comprehend all of its meaning or pretending to understand all of its significance."

We made cards for our homebound parishioners. The children made colorful, and touching in some cases, cards for our homebound parishioners. This continued our 'Be Ready! The Son of Man is Coming' lesson and helps the children recall, "For whatever you did for the least of my brothers and sisters, you did it to me" as well as enhancing the concept of helping those in need. One homebound parishioner even wrote the children back.

We even washed feet. As we told the story of the last supper we explained how the feet of those that walked in Jesus' time would be dusty and dirty. The task of washing a guest's feet in those days was for the lowliest of servants. Jesus did this for his disciples as an expression of his great love and how the least amongst you shall be least. The children dirtied their feet with paint and walked across a white cloth and then put their feet into basins to be washed by either Phineas Gitta or Debbie Marrs. The clothe we dirtied with foot prints was used to fashion a cross and was placed on a banner with the phrase, 'Love one another as I have loved you." This banner was used in our Maundy Thursday service and is now in one of the children's chapels.

### Update on the search for our next dean

As the screening committee has corresponded with and talked with clergy from all over the country, one gets the sense of how close this Episcopal Church is, and how fortunate we are to be a part of her. Almost every communication either starts or ends with "we will be praying for the people of Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral as you remain in discernment for a new Dean." There is a good deal of interest in our search and the screening committee would

like to take this opportunity to update everyone on our progress.

As of this publication, we have narrowed our search to seven candidates from all regions of the country. We have completed three of our

initial interviews with these candidates, and expect to finish the first round of interviews with all candidates by April 30. Following these interviews, the list will be refined and sent to the search committee who will then invite selected candidates to Kansas City for a second round of interviews.

A list of finalists will be selected following the interviews here in Kansas City. This will trigger site visits to the home parishes of the finalists by a sub-committee appointed

by the larger search committee. The same committee will visit all of the candidates. Background checks will be performed. Following these reports, the search committee will recommend a short list of acceptable candidates to be reviewed by our Bishop and our Vestry. "The Bishop nominates and the Vestry elects" in a collaborative process that should bring us a new Dean by mid summer.

There have been some questions about the amount of time it takes to complete a search.

We appreciate the enthusiasm of parishioners for the search and the impatience that may result in the early stages before the names of candidates can be released. We would, however,

discourage folks from taking rumors seriously. At this point, virtually all speculation is groundless and can only complicate the lives and ministries of candidates who may not be moved forward in the process.



### Helping mothers provide a healthy beginning

Those of us who are parents probably can't imagine living in a situation where we were unable to provide our children with the medical care they have needed since before they were born. This is the reason that I support Maison de Naissance: to give other mothers the chance to provide a healthy beginning to their children's lives.

In March alone, MN staff provided 154 women's reproductive health visits, saw 544 women for prenatal visits, delivered 63 babies, conducted 26 postpartum exams, and provided 517 well-baby check-ups. Kyra Abbott, MN's new country director, says she looks forward to working with the MN staff as they continue to give women and their babies the best care possible. Although she is new to her position, Kyra has been

with MN since 2008 when she was the first expatriate to have an on-site presence at MN. MN is asking parishes to celebrate Mother's Day by remembering the mothers and babies they serve. A generous donor has offered to double match all contributions made to MN
