Finding spiritual refreshment

Many of us experience a deep thirst for a meaningful spiritual life. We find ourselves touched by the haunting image in Psalm 42:1-2: "As a deer longs for flowing streams, so longs my soul for you. O God. My soul thirsts for God, for the living God."

We feel the need for genuine spiritual refreshment as we wander through an environment all too often parched and dry. We long for an affirming relationship with God that will make a difference in how we experience daily life. We eagerly set out on the inviting journey of spiritual growth, seeking deeper relationship with God's very self.

We may indeed begin such a journey, doing some reading, joining some worship, trying to live attuned to God's presence. Yet before we are very far along, we discover that we cannot go it alone. We need help, advice and guidance.

I invite to consider the one of the four class offerings being presented this fall at Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral.

Option one and two are built around Ester de Waal's book *Seeking God: The Way of St. Benedict*. One class meets one day a week during the daytime and the second class meets in the evening. Both classes will meet for eleven weeks. Each session will be one

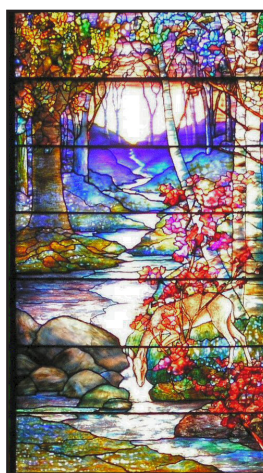
and a half or two hours in length. Along with the book, we will use a resource guide with questions and exercises to help with our discussion.

Option three and four are built around Joan Chittiter's book *The Rule of Benedict: A Spirituality for the 21st Century*. One session will meet during the day and the other will meet in the evening. These sessions will be held once a month. These sessions, we will look at The Rule to see how it can guide and ground us in living out our Baptismal Covenant. in the middle of a chaotic and challenging world.

The meeting place, day of the week and length of the each of the four sessions will be determined by those who sign up to attend. Each session will be limited to 10 persons. You are invited to one of two orientation sessions in Founders' Hall at 9:15 a.m. **Sunday, August 24 or September 4** to hear more about this adult education opportunity coming to Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral.

Update on the search for a dean

Over a several-week period, the Dean Screening Committee conducted telephone interviews of candidates for Dean, evaluated each of the telephone discussions and agreed on candidates to be continued in the process. Dean Screening Committee co-chairs Paula Henderson Connors and Michael Thomas presented the candidates to the Search Committee for their consideration. By consensus, the Search Committee agreed to invite three of the candidates presented to Kansas City for additional interviews with the full Search Committee.

We anticipate the interviews being held in Kansas City will be completed by the latter part of July. At the conclusion of these second round interviews, the committee will determine which of the three candidates will be visited in their home parish for further review and evaluation. Three members of the Screening Committee will be selected to visit the home parish of the selected candidates and report their findings to the full Search Committee.

The Screening and Search committees thank you for your prayers as we continue the discernment process in our search for the next Dean of Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral.

During the month of June 2011 revenue from pledge and plate exceeded both budget and actual June 2010. Total operating income for the month also exceeded budget. On the expense side for the month of June 2011, total expenses were nearly \$11,000 higher than budget due to property expenses in a number of categories. As a result of higher expenses, the actual results for the month of June were lower than budget by nearly \$8,000. For the year-to-date ended June 2011, income from pledge and plate is running behind budget. As a result, total income was about \$7,000 lower than budget. For expenses, property expenses have outpaced the budget by about \$23,000. As a result of being behind budget in both income and expenses, the net operating income is about \$25,000 below budget year-to-date.

Every baptized person is called to ministry. The Education for Ministry (EfM) program provides lay people with the education and an opportunity to discover how to respond to their call to Christian service.

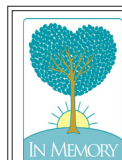
EfM groups will meet at the Cathedral from September through May on Tuesdays at 9:15 a.m. or at 6:30 p.m. beginning September 6.

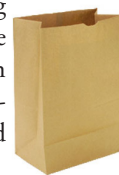

MN continues to help the under-served

In an update from MN at the end of June, they were very thankful for the solar panels to have electricity for which to run fans as it has been hot and humid there. In May they had obstetrical rotation from a group of nursing students at a local college. They said 16 motivated ladies rotated through the center for six weeks. They've also been doing a lot of training of their own staff.

MN counseled and voluntarily tested 311 people for HIV and syphilis last month. They have many women coming from outside the zone of MN because of the reputation for quality, free care. MN cannot provide home visits to these women because of staffing and financial limitations, but they come anyway.

The Mother's Day double-match campaign exceeded the \$10,000 goal by several thousand and they received a grant for clinical training from the Hogdon Family Trust Fund. We want to share with you the good that comes from nurse Kyra at MN, "We could not do our important work without you." Please continue to help support MN. HEALTH NEWS Staying cool and hydrated

Our bodies are made up of 75 percent water. Whenever our water intake is less than what we excrete, we find ourselves in a state of dehydration. With the hot summer days upon us this can happen rapidly. Dehydration can have a devastating effect on one's body if it is left untreated. Awareness and early recognition of the signs and symptoms is the key to prevention.

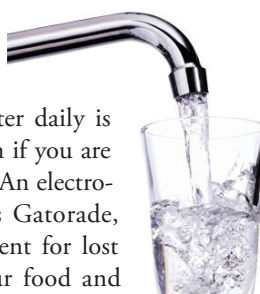
During outdoor activities it is easy to forget that you may be losing excessive amounts of water through sweating and exercise. One of the early signs of dehydration is dark yellow or amber colored urine. Other early symptoms include: dry mouth and thirst, decreased urine output, headache, dizziness or lightheadedness, muscle weakness or cramps, sleepiness or fatigue. Advanced symptoms include: extreme thirst or dry mouth, irritability or confusion, lack of sweating, rapid heartbeat and fever.

To prevent dehydration,

drink before you become thirsty. Drinking at least eight glasses of water daily is recommended, even if you are not in the hot sun. An electrolyte drink, such as Gatorade, is a good replacement for lost fluids. Balance your food and water intake, avoiding alcohol and caffeine; with water loss your body also loses salts needed to function properly. Avoid the outdoors and/or direct sunlight during the hottest part of the day. If you must be in the sun, wear a hat and loose light colored clothing.

Think to replenish your body with fluid. Monitor young children and older adults closely, as they are more prone fluid loss and the damaging effects of dehydration. Stay cool!

Community participant volunteers needed at Crittenton

Crittenton Children's Center needs community participant volunteers for their Planned Permanency Review Team (PPRT). This team consists of professionals (foster parents, therapists, case managers, Guardian Ad Litem/CASA, etc.) that meet and discuss permanency, progress of children and parents, services needed, and placement needs for kids. You won't need to have a background in child welfare just the availability to attend the meetings (held Monday through Friday during business hours). The meetings will be at Crittenton (10918 Elm Ave. off Longview Pkwy) or at Family Court (26th and Holmes). Volunteers will have at least a two-week notice when a meeting is to be scheduled. A Crittenton representative/supervisor will always be present to facilitate the meetings. Joplin Tornado RELIEF EFFORTS

The first event is a No Charge Garage Sale at St. Philip's Church August 6. The Social Outreach Commission thanks all who donated so generously. The Cathedral's donations have been sorted and delivered to St. Paul's, who will get the items to Joplin. Watch bulletins for information about a second No Charge Garage Sale, which is scheduled for October 22. There will be a week in the fall to bring donations for this sale.

Plans to build a two-story duplex for Lafayette House in Joplin (a women' and children shelter) are moving forward. Those plans will involve the need for work-teams on weekends to accomplish various construction projects, e.g. hanging drywall, painting, etc. Specific dates will be set later this summer as the plans develop. Saturday, November 19, all are invited to join the Bishop in Joplin for liturgy of blessing for this work. Other activities may well be planned for the 19th — stay tuned for more information!

The diocese plans to "releaf" a park in Joplin in the spring. Volunteers will be needed to buy trees and assist with the planting of trees.
