FROM THE PRIEST-IN-CHARGE

Cady and I started riding at a different stable in September. Because we use lesson horses, as opposed to owning and boarding our own, this change in venue has also meant some adjustment for the two of us.

It's all good, you understand, but it is different. At the former stables, the horses were pasture-boarded, and there was 400 acres of trails. It meant traipsing out to the pasture to catch our mounts, and more time for grooming, but there was room to roam. By contrast, the horses are in stalls in this new place, but there are no trails. The horses are cleaner, but more jittery at the beginning of the lesson. I now ride a beautiful big chestnut mare named Jazz who moves like no horse I've ridden before. And everything I thought I knew about posting, 2-point and cantering I'm having to re-learn on a horse who is much more responsive and whose action is much more brilliant than what I'd grown used to. It's great, it's exhausting, it's discouraging, it's exhilarating — often, all within the course of a single lesson.

Change is like that. Old expectations, old certainties, old trajectories within a given learning curve come to an end, and a whole new reality is ushered in. It's exciting and unsettling, often in equal measure. Little wonder that so many of us resonate with the magnificent collect from the fifth Sunday of Lent:

Almighty God, you alone can bring into order the unruly wills and affections of sinners: Grant your people grace to love what you command and desire what you promise; that, among the swift and varied changes of the world, our hearts may surely there be fixed where true joys are to be found ...

As I write this, your new dean has been elected, but the name not yet formally released, pending the completed negotiation of the Letter of Agreement. (No doubt by the time you're reading this, all has been revealed and a start date set.) A new and exciting era in the life of Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral is on the cusp of being ushered in. And though it's unclear at this point how relatively swift the changes will be, they are sure to be varied, because that's how it works in organizations. A well known saying in our nation's capitol is that elections have consequences. In any parish or diocesan election, lives are deeply touched and relationships necessarily changed, new priorities and issues emerge, old priorities are re-imagined or set aside. Our task, as members of a Christian community is to navigate those consequences carefully, transparently, faithfully and with integrity.

It has been a privilege to serve as your priest-in-charge

since August of 2010. It's been quite a ride. In that time, we elected a new bishop and the Cathedral played a huge role not only in hosting the election convention, but also in planning and executing the consecration and subsequent seating. We lost two beloved staff members to death — Betty Phillips and Deacon Bruce Hall. We welcomed in an interim sacristan (Janet Sweeting) and new deacon (Jerry Grabher), both of whom have brought new energy and skills. We embarked on some new outreach initiatives as well as some much needed capital improvements. We said goodbye to the Kansas City Community Kitchen in the lower level of Founders' Hall as they moved to their new location, and hammered out a new agreement with ECS regarding ongoing usage of the property. Our beloved adjunct clergy, Fr. Michael, Pastor Richard and Mother Carol, stepped up not only as celebrants in the daily Holy Eucharist, but also as preachers and celebrants on Sunday as well. Without their able and gracious assistance, Fr. Joe and I truly would have met ourselves coming and going in this very busy place. The wardens have truly gone above and beyond during this time as well and I am truly indebted both to David Rice and Steve Moore for the support they've given me as well as for the extra demands placed upon them during this time.

In all of this, I've been truly mindful of your prayers and good wishes as we navigate the swift and varied changes that now are upon us, including some very exciting possibilities that lie ahead for my family and me. And I am reminded of St. Paul's haunting, paradoxical words in 2 Corinthians 12 that God's grace is sufficient ... for power is made perfect (ie., whole or complete) in vulnerability. I daily pray for the people of Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral, and for the grace to do the work that is set before me. I ask for your prayers as well.

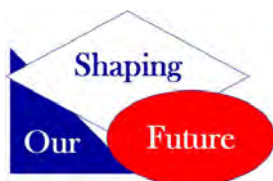

The last meeting is Sunday, October 9 here at the Cathedral from 3-5 p.m.

For the month of August 2011, total operating income exceeded budget by about \$500 and expenses were about \$5,000 lower than budgeted. Net Operating Income for the month totaled \$11,361. For the year-to-date through August 2011, income exceeded budget by about \$8,000; however, expenses were about \$12,000 greater than the budget due in part to higher property expenses. Net Operating Income year-to-date totaled \$49,528, which was about \$4,000 below budget.

Maison de Naissance — the community

The mission of MN is to improve health for mothers and babies in impoverished communities. In Haiti, the services of a modern maternity center and community health program are offered from the hospitality of a safe, culturally appropriate and welcoming home: a home for birth — Maison de Naissance.

This month we will look at the people and environment (“the community”) of MN. With MN, as its center of operation, a positive community relationship is critical for its acceptance, support and success.

As a refresher: MN is located in the plain of Torbeck, an agricultural area in Haiti’s southwest peninsula. Men and women work hard to cultivate crops including rice, beans and corn. Unfortunately the fruits of their labor fall short of sustaining them financially. It is still cheaper to buy imported rice than to buy local rice. There are signs of progress as large parts of MN’s zone of service have irrigation canals, constructed in recent years, and one of our health community workers is the proud operator of a small tractor.

Here are some highlights from recent months:

- The successful recruitment of an experienced professional nurse midwife. Recruitment of midwives is difficult due to competition from larger NGO’s offering inflated salaries. We are blessed to have her.

- The participation of our auxiliary nurses, lab techs and community health supervisor in 2 full days of on-site continuing education.
- MN participation in the Ministry of Health and UNICEF’s ‘Child Health Week’ activities including daily vaccination posts throughout our zone of service.

The above information has been supplied by Kyra Abbott, MN Haiti Director. The monthly statistics will appear next month as Kyra is on a much deserved vacation.

We thank everyone who attended the Ministry luncheon August 28 and shared their time at our table; it is always wonderful to share our story with folks at the Cathedral.

The following local events will give all of us an opportunity to support MN by attending and/or through donations. On Sunday, October 2, 2011, at the Cathedral, we will celebrate the 7th anniversary with the Cathedral Friends of MN hosting coffee hour following both services. MUSIC NOTES

from Canon Musician John Schaefer

At its July meeting, the Vestry approved the forming of a Cathedral Music Guild. The purpose of the Guild is to develop projects that go beyond the day-to-day music program covered by the Cathedral budget.

As many of you know, the first major project is a Choir tour of England in 2013. The Choir has offered its services to Exeter Cathedral for an Evensong, Wells Cathedral for an Evensong, Bristol Cathedral for a weekend, and Worcester Cathedral for a week long residency. This is expected to begin in mid-July of 2013.

Raising funds for the tour is off to a good start, thanks to the generosity of those who attended Richard Preis's concert in July and my own recital on my birthday.

The next event in the fundraising journey is a Lobsterfest Saturday, October 1, which happens to be the 35th anniversary of my becoming the Organist/Director of Music at Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral. The deadline for ordering lobsters has passed. However, please come to the potluck celebration at 6 p.m. Each person contributes \$10, and provides a dish to share and brings his or her own favourite (English spelling) beverage. Coffee and tea will be provided.

Special musical events in October include a Hymnfest, led by Dr. John Ferguson and the St. Olaf College Cantorei, on Saturday, October 15, beginning at 8 p.m. Please come and sing. Also, if you can provide overnight housing for a singer or two (or have an air mattress they can use), please phone Mary Ann Mansfield at the Cathedral.

On Sunday, October 30 at 8 p.m., Dr. Ann Marie Rigler of William Jewell College will present an organ recital of the music of Jehan Alain, whose centenary we celebrate this year. The music is beautiful and often exotic; and Dr. Rigler is one of the area's finest organists. The recital is free admission.

The Trinity Choir will sing Choral Evensong on Tuesday, November 1, the Feast of All Saints. Andrew Lang, former organist of the Church of the Good Shepherd, will play an extended prelude and postlude. The service begins at 7:30 p.m. with the prelude and will end about 8:30.

Now available for purchase are several CDs or DVDs. The CD is of my recital in August; the DVDs are of the choir's visit to Dublin in 2006; and John Fowler's recital in January of 2008.

HEALTH NEWS

Flu and pneumonia vaccines

The Health Ministry will be offering flu and pneumonia vaccinations two weeks in October during after service coffee hour. Your cost will be \$28 for the flu vaccine and \$7 for the pneumonia injection. These injections are covered by Medicare and most insurance companies. So we can preplan our resources for those interested, please sign up October 2.

The company from whom we are obtaining this service requires sufficient interest of the parishioners. Other churches, through their Health Ministries, and local companies in the greater Kansas City and St. Joseph areas also use this particular organization.

The Center for Disease Control (CDC) states that the flu vaccine can be given to anyone five years of age or older. The optimal timing of the flu vaccine is quite unpredictable but most flu activity peaks in January or February and a person's immune protection from a vaccination declines over the flu season. We hope to offer this on an annual basis if we have enough interest.

A parishioner's survey is available online and in the back of the Nave to assist the Health Ministry in forming this coming year's informational meetings. Please take a moment to

complete the survey and place it in the "questionnaire" box at the back of the nave as you leave.

Lafayette House Project

Vacant land has been purchased in Joplin upon which will be constructed a single-story, three bedroom, two bath home for Lafayette House (a women's and children shelter).

The building project will require work-teams on weekends to accomplish various construction projects, e.g. hanging drywall, painting, etc. A general contractor should be in place shortly and a schedule for work days will be

published as soon as construction plans are approved. Resources for this project come from funds which have been donated to the Joplin Tornado Relief Fund.

Saturday, November 19: All are invited to join the Bishop in Joplin for liturgy of blessing for this work.

Feeding hungry children

Many families living in poverty rely on free or reduced-fee school breakfasts and lunches for their school-age children. Often those children don't have enough to eat between Friday and Monday. The Cathedral is joining Episcopal Community Services's work to provide food for hungry children through the BackSnack program. Harvesters' local community food bank provides food and ECS delivers the food to the Cathedral. Volunteers fill the backpacks on Wednesdays with food and deliver them to schools. School officials identify students who

need assistance and send them home for the weekend with the backpacks—and no one has to know there aren't just books and homework inside.
