FROM THE DEAN: PRESENCE OF CATHEDRAL

A long time parishioner shared with me that one of the greatest assets of Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral is its presence in the heart of Kansas City. Even though growth moves out in successive rings around the city, Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral is anchored in one place. Resisting the temptation to follow the movement to whatever street and “plowed ground,” the Spirit and the spirit of the congregation conspired to remain rooted in downtown.

This investment in place and presence is a good one. It has paid out rich dividends over time. We have members who come from all over the metropolitan area. The beauty of the Cathedral itself, of Founders’ Hall with its unique views of the city, and the surrounding green spaces anchor this sense of presence. This place is grounded in the beauty of holiness as expressed in our corporate worship and music programs, in offerings for spiritual formation, and opportunities to serve the world in Christ’s name.

As I have reacquainted myself with the Cathedral and Kansas City these last several weeks, I find myself asking how we can continue and grow our ministry. What are we being called to do as God’s people who happen to gather at the “crossroads” of greater Kansas City?

With Lent having arrived by the time you read this newsletter I would like to invite you to think, and pray, and speak about what it is most important to you about the ministry we share at Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral. What feeds your soul? What needs to be renewed? What could be added? What things need to change? How is Christ present and recognized among us?

I’d also like to invite you to consider doing the some simple actions to help us discern what God is calling us to do at this time.

- **Be Welcoming:** One of the things even the shyest of people warm to is simply being welcomed. When we are here on Sundays and at other times, let’s be a welcoming presence to all whom we encounter. Welcoming can be done in a variety of ways from a smile to a hearty greeting to body language that says “It’s good to be here.”
- **Be Invitational:** The main reason people engage in a church community is simply because someone invited them to do so. It’s as simple as that. But, it isn’t always the easiest thing to do. But, it can make all the difference. Who will you invite with you to come and see?
- **Be Intentional:** “Ninety percent of life is showing up.” This wise quip attributed to Woody Allen holds truth, but it is only a beginning. Come for worship. Take part in some form of spiritual growth. Contribute to the common good. Invite others to join you in the process. Expect to meet Christ all over the place. But, show up and be ready to for something more.

Being here is one of our greatest strengths as a church in a changing city. In the days ahead let’s be aware of that Presence we meet in familiar and new ways.

Celebration of Mutual Ministry

Saturday in Easter Week

April 14 • 10:30 a.m.

We gather to celebrate our baptismal ministry and the call of Peter DeVeau as our new Dean. Bishop Marty Field presides at this service which includes renewal of baptismal vows and Confirmation, Reception and Reaffirmation.

Participants in the liturgy will include persons representing each Deanery of the Diocese of West Missouri and the wider community. A festive reception follows the service in Founders’ Hall.

Vaccination day is Wednesday

Wednesdays here are not like Wednesdays at Maison de Naissance (MN)! Wednesdays are 'Vaccination Day' at the MN Well Baby Clinic, and nearly 80-90 babies and young children are evaluated and/or treated during these visits. Immunizations are administered according to the Haitian national vaccination schedule, which is based upon recommendations by the



World Health Organization (WHO). Routine childhood vaccinations in Haiti include: tuberculosis (which is rampant in Haiti), polio, diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, rubella and measles.

Vitamin A supplementation is also given routinely as

it is an important co-enzyme which assists the immune system. Inadequate Vitamin A, commonly seen among these Haitian children, puts them at an increased risk of dying from common infections such as viral illnesses and pneumonia. These Wednesday Well Baby Clinics/Vaccination Days are paramount to improving the health of Haiti's children, where fewer than 60 percent of children are fully immunized.

The average cost per client visit to MN (prenatal, labor + delivery, postpartum, gynecology, reproductive health, well baby visits) = \$13.80. When Wednesday rolls around, remember *Vaccination Day*, and consider making a donation that would assist keeping our MN babies healthy (www.maisondenaissance.org).

FAQs: Bishop Suffragan

From Canon Sue Sommer, who is on the slate of candidates for Suffragan Bishop of Virginia.

OK, you've been nominated to be *what* kind of bishop?

Suffragan. Pronounced with either a hard or soft G. From Middle English by way of medieval Latin: *Suffraganeus*, meaning to pray, to support and/or to vote.

Does every diocese have a Suffragan? I've never heard of them.

Suffragans are more common in large dioceses, where the work of episcopal oversight cannot be handled by one bishop alone. The Diocese of Virginia has a diocesan bishop, a suffragan and an assisting bishop.

You're giving me a headache. What is an assisting bishop?

Sorry. An assisting bishop generally has been called out of retirement to assist in a diocese. He or she serves at the pleasure of the diocesan bishop. Bishop Barry Howe, for example, retired to Sarasota, Fla., and is now assisting bishop in the diocese of Southwest Florida at the request of Bishop Dabney Smith.

Any other kinds of bishops I ought to know about?

Well, there's a coadjutor bishop. Occasionally, a diocesan bishop will announce his or her retirement and call for the election of a coadjutor. The coadjutor is elected and consecrated, and then serves with the diocesan bishop for a period of time until the diocesan bishop retires. Bishop Howe was elected coadjutor bishop and served for several months with Bishop Buchanan. By contrast, our current bishop, Bishop Field, was elected to be diocesan bishop. His consecration and seating coincided with Bishop Howe's retirement.

Who elects a suffragan bishop?

In my case, the clergy who are canonically resident in the Diocese of Virginia, along with lay delegates to their electing Council (what we call Convention). The person must receive a majority of both clergy and lay votes in order to be elected. The Diocese of West Missouri used a similar process in November 2010 when Bishop Field was elected.

Do suffragans serve only with the bishop who is in office at the time he/she is elected?

No, a suffragan is elected to serve the diocese. The challenge for diocesan bishops who serve dioceses with suffragan bishops is that they do not "hand pick" their team mate. The clergy and laity make that choice for him/her.

What's the next step?

Walkabouts are scheduled for the week of March 18. All six nominees and our spouses will travel from site to site to meet with clergy and lay delegates to Electing Council. We'll visit six sites in five days. You may recall that GHTC hosted one of the West Missouri walk-about prior to Bishop Field's election.

When is the election?

Saturday, April 21. They'll consecrate the new bishop at the end of July.

What has this been like for you?

It has been an extraordinary process of listening, going deep and stepping out onto this (risky) limb. Both the Nominating and Transition Committees have been extraordinary in their thoughtful shaping of the process. They have been appropriately transparent without unduly raising anxiety. Five out of the six of us will not be elected on April 21 AND nothing is ever wasted in God's gracious economy. This process has been profoundly beneficial to me, both personally and vocationally, regardless of the outcome in April. I thank everyone for their prayers for my family and me.

Lenten Academy Dinner: Dinner is provided each week by ministry groups at the Cathedral. We ask that you make a donation of \$5 per individual or \$10 per family, though free will offerings of any amount are accepted as all are welcome at our table. Pilgrimage for a Lifetime: Planning a Trip through Holy Week: In the ongoing journey of the Christian year we are invited annually to hear and experience the story of the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus. The travel log of Egeria, a woman who visited the Holy Land in the late fourth century, will serve as a guide for this course. At the time of Egeria, the church was making a shift from being a countercultural movement to becoming intertwined with the Roman state. In our contemporary culture we are taking the opposite journey in what many call post-Christian culture. Egeria recorded observations of Palm Sunday, the days of Holy Week and the Great Three Days that brim with life and energy. We will use them as a beginning point to understand our own experience of Palm Sunday, Holy Week, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday and Easter in these changing times. The question, “What does this mean?” will be a constant thread to inspire and inform our forward movement as people of faith. Those who participate in this course will be encouraged to join in the actual pilgrimage of Holy Week and Easter through their presence and participation in our gatherings for worship and prayer. This class will be led by Dean Peter DeVeau assisted by Canon Sue Sommer and others.

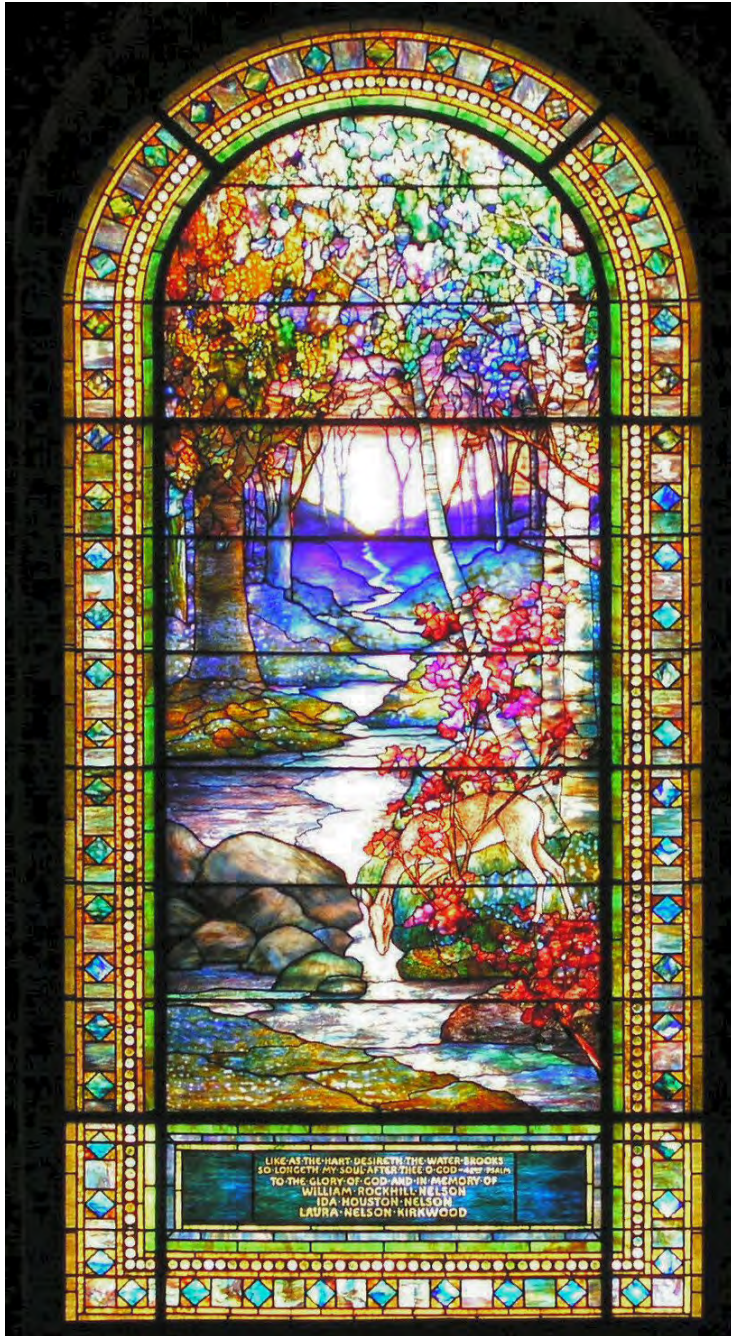
Paper bags for food pantry

*A Pastoral Letter from the Bishop of West Missouri Introducing: **Our Diocesan Priorities & A Covenant for Mission***

OUR DIOCESAN PRIORITIES: Since mid-2011, the people of the congregations of the Diocese of West Missouri have been engaged in a sweeping and long-range, futuring process which included several forums across the diocese entitled "Shaping Our Future". The raw results of the forums was a pile of thousands of individual pieces of input about would-be priorities for our diocesan life. Our Futuring Task Group took your significant and varied input and extrapolated it all down to five, overarching priorities, all dealing with growth. The members of the Futuring Task Group and I agree these priorities should be both the core of our future life together, and the keys to responding to God's call for us to be in mission. With brief explanatory notations, they are:

- #1 – Grow Congregations:** we seek congregations growing in membership, more congregations being started, excellence in liturgies
- #2 – Grow Personally:** we seek Christian formation for all ages, especially children, youth, and young adults; we seek growth in knowledge of the faith and in spiritual depth; we seek growth in responsible stewardship; we seek excellence in liturgies
- #3 – Grow in Community:** we seek unity, cooperation, and mutual support congregation-to-congregation and in our connections beyond the diocese
- #4 – Grow in Compassion:** we seek to do social outreach to aid the children of God
- #5 – Grow Leaders:** we seek leadership development for lay and clergy alike

I believe these priorities are what God is calling us to be and do as a diocese, and these priorities will guide future decision-making about diocesan structure, budget, staffing, and governance. I am committed to conforming to these priorities, and each decision I make (or take part in making) will seek to further these ends.

Therefore, I offer the following **Covenant** between the people and congregations of West Missouri and me, which expresses what I promise to do as my part in pursuing our common priorities.

I also call upon each parish and congregation to reciprocate in this covenant formally by discussing it appropriately at congregational, Bishop's Committee, or Vestry meetings, by adopting it by resolution duly approved, and by sharing a copy of such resolution with my office.

Then I ask each congregation to find any and all ways to keep the congregational portion of the covenant before them in the midst of their common life: e.g. post it, use it in publications, review it before all meetings, make it part of the Prayers of the People at worship, etc. If we all concentrate on doing what we hereby covenant to do, we will go beyond mere words of support for the covenant, but will live out and embody our support for the God-given priorities we have articulated together.

DIOCESAN COVENANT

In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, I, Martin S. Field, 8th Bishop of West Missouri, hereby make the following covenant with the congregations and people of the diocese.

I hereby pledge that my staff and I will further the priorities of our diocese by:

- serving both the congregations of the diocese and the Church beyond the diocese;
- linking the congregations and members of the diocese to the greater Church and to the communities they are called to serve;
- facilitating open and dynamic communication;
- encouraging congregations to know and pursue the specific missions and ministries given to each by God;
- inspiring congregations consistently to help their members discern God's call on individual lives;
- nurturing all members of the diocese (children, youth, and adults) toward life-long formation of Christian character and unceasing service through Christ's Church; and
- modeling responsible, Christian stewardship by making holy use of God's resources.

I also call the congregations and congregants of the diocese to join me by covenanting to:

- build vital, viable, mutually supporting, and growing congregations for the glory of God and the spread of God's kingdom;
- articulate and pursue the mission and vision God gives to each congregation;
- support the Bishop and the ministries of the diocese financially;
- maintain open, healthy lines of communication that apprise the Bishop and the bishop's staff consistently of the realities of congregational life; and
- raise up Christians of Godly character and developing leaders for God's kingdom.

Easter baskets for teens in foster care

Members of the Social Outreach Commission's Foster Children's ministry will be distributing Easter baskets to foster children in residential treatment centers at Kaw Valley Center and Crittenton Children's Center. We are requesting donations from the congregation for healthy snacks and individually-wrapped candy.

Some examples of items we need include:
