FROM THE DEAN Hope's Harvest

By the time you read this a "harvest" will have been gathered at the Cathedral. The harvest I speak of is the one of your ideas and thoughts that you may have written down on cards passed out during services in September. Anyone attending church was given three separate cards: A yellow card on which to write celebrations, "What do you celebrate about the Cathedral?" A green card for jotting down challenges, "What challenges do you see for the Cathedral?" An orange card for recording dreams, "What dreams do you have for the Cathedral?"

Thank you to all who have filled out cards! This is just the beginning of *Ripe for Harvest*, a process designed to help us discern what God is calling us to do at Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral.

Now the harvest begins, literally. All these creative ideas, concerns, and causes for joy are being put into lists that will be displayed in Founders' Hall the first Sunday in October. And then for the following three Sundays, October 14, 21 and 28 those celebrations, challenges, and dreams will be put into ministry categories such as worship, outreach, Christian formation, hospitality, and pastoral care. You will be able to "Shop the Walls" and mark those things that are a priority for you.

All this gathering of ideas and harvesting of priorities will then be used to help make plans for the future. This will be "seed" for generating revitalization and conceiving of new ministries at the Cathedral.

What about the harvest of all these cards in fall colors loaded with thoughts and passions put into words? As one person asked early on as we considered doing Ripe for Harvest, "When you get all this information from these cards will you use it?" Good question. Strategic plans and surveys often end up in bureaucratic compost heaps! The short answer is, "Of course we will use it." The longer answer which encompasses the shorter is, "We will with God's help."

Ripe for Harvest draws on an abundance of metaphor around seedtime and harvest. It is more than a professional planning process. I like to think of what we are doing in *Ripe* for Harvest as hope's harvest. This is about being church. A common theme and reality is that seeds of hope are continually being sown among us. Those seeds grow up, as Jesus teaches in the gospel parable, in favorable and unfavorable conditions. Some seeds are lost, some spring up quickly and wither. Others fall on good soil and produce. Some yield abundant harvests.

Our challenges, celebrations and dreams have been gathered. Let's hope for a yield of rich grain from which to make Christ, the Bread of Life, known in our place and time. With this alone in mind amazing things can happen. It's even better when we have a plan conceived of and harvested in hope.

New Benedict group begins The Rule of Benedict is a spiritual guide, rare by

virtue of its ancient origins, valued for its continuing meaningfulness in every century since.

The basic contentions for our study together are two: first, that Benedictine spirituality deals with the issues facing us now-stewardship, relationships, authority, community, balance, work, simplicity, prayer and spiritual and psychological development. Its strength, therefore, is that it is fresh and ancient, current and tried at the same time. Second, its currency lies in the fact that Benedictine spirituality offers more a way of life and an attitude of mind than it does a set of religious prescriptions.

Treasurer's Report

During the month of August 2012, income was above budget by approximately \$9,700. The primary differences were in the area of pledges being about \$9,300 above budget, while plate was \$1,400 under and endowment was about \$1,000 over budget

for the month. Total expenses during the month were about \$14,000 above budget. Administration, Utilities and Property were above budget by about \$15,400 during the month of August

For the year-to-date August 2012, income was above budget by about \$19,500 which was directly related to pledges being \$20,000 above budget. For the same period, expenses were about \$26,000 above budget. The areas of significant variance were Administra-

> tion (about \$4,400 higher due in part to higher supply costs); Property \$15,000 above budget due in part to salaries, grounds, and cleaning costs; Utilities were about \$8,000 higher (which were in all categories of gas, electric, and water); Music was under budget by about \$4,000; and Parish Life was over budget by approximately \$6,000 (due in part to higher hospitality and salary expenses). As a result, the Net Operating Income of \$61,847 was

reported year-to-date which is under budget by approximately \$7,700. This amount does compare favorably to 2011 year-to-date of \$49,528.

Adult Formation begins Michaelmas term Editor's note: The academic term which begins in late September and runs through Christmas is known in many English speaking countries, and especially

in Great Britain, as Michaelmas (pronounced Mickle-muss) Term. The Feast of St. Michael and All Angels is Sept. 29

Adult Formation resumes for the 2012-2013 program year September 30 at 9:15 a.m. in the Common Room. This year's offerings reflect the overarching theme: Explorations in Faith through the Lens of our Baptismal Covenant. A range of offerings is planned, each of which touch on one of the five covenantal promises which — along with the Creed — constitute our Baptismal Covenant.

September 30: Baptismal Covenant in Review. We set the stage for our curriculum this year with this initial class in which we examine the five covenantal baptismal questions we find on pp. 304-305 of the BCP, and which we reaffirm in every celebration of Holy Baptism. Join us for

conversation as we explore together: With what aspects of the Covenant do

> we resonate the most? With what aspects do we struggle

> What questions does the Covenant raise for you?

> What blesses you about the Covenant?

October 7, 14, 21: Proclaiming the Good News when the News is Bad. How does one speak of the goodness of God in the face of suffering? This question has plagued us Children of Abraham for millennia. Using Al Truesdale's book, "If God is God ... Why? Letters from Oklahoma City" (available in the GHTC Bookstore) as a starting point, we will explore through Scripture and contemporary examples how we can (and cannot!) speak of a loving God in the midst of baffling tragedy.

October 28: Timeless Journey. Cathedral members Tom and MaryLou Brous will share insights they gleaned of the timeless spirituality of T.S. Eliot — arguably, one of the most influential poets (and Anglicans!) in the 20th century — as they journeyed to each of the four sites from which Eliot took his inspiration for the Four Quartets: Burnt Norton, East Coker, the Dry Salvages and Little Gidding.

November 4, 11, 18, 25: Respecting the Dignity. Cathedral member and interfaith expert Vern Barnet will place representatives from the KC interfaith community "in dialogue" with the Episcopal Church on topics such as core spiritual values, how does one worship, attributes of God, sacred texts and so on. Each week we will welcome a representative from Islam, Judaism, Sikh and Natural Religion (Wicca). Watch the Sunday bulletin and the November issue of The Angelus for specifics about each of the weeks' offerings.

December 2, 9, 16: Continuing in the Breaking of Bread and in Prayer. We are a people shaped by prayer, and most all of us engage in it in one form or another daily. What do WE think we're doing? Join us for this provocative exploration of prayer — how we come to know God through it even as the mystery of God deepens, how it blesses us and challenges us, the dry times when we cannot engage it, what prayer is (and is not) and much more. Watch the Sunday bulletin and the December issue of The Angelus for more information.

December 23, 30: There will be no adult formation offering. Adult Formation will resume for Epiphany Term on (yes) the Feast of the Epiphany, Jan. 6, 2013.

Evensong: October 14

Again in October, the Trinity Choir will sing Evensong on the second Sunday of the month, at 5 p.m. The Evensong offerings consist primarily of the repertoire to be sung in England. Evensong brings together canticles from Vespers and Compline, and is essentially sung by the choir.

At the October Evensong, the choir will sing responses by David Cooper; Herbert Howells's setting of the Evening Canticles for Worcester Cathedral; and the anthem "Laudate Dominum omnes gentes" by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. There will be some hymns for the congregation to sing; Holy Communion will be offered at the conclusion of the Office.

We hope those who worship in the morning on a Sunday will return for Choral Evensong; and we hope that those who are accustomed to the Order for Evening and Holy Eucharist will embrace the Choir's offering.

Moravian Love Feast

December 23, 5 p.m.

On the Fourth Sunday of Advent we will celebrate a Moravian Love Feast, a very moving service of carols, lessons, candle lighting and sharing over a "feast" of special buns and coffee. This custom dates back to the early seventeen hundreds when exiled Moravian Christians shared a meal provided by a German count on whose lands they had taken refuge. Transformed

By now the Icons in Transformation exhibit has been shipped to its next location, leaving many holes in both worship and gathering spaces. What a great experience it was. Many volunteers and Cathedral staff worked hard, both physically and creatively, to make the exhibit happen. We want to thank all who helped in various and wonderful ways:

rector of Grace Church, Carthage, Mo. They beautifully shared their knowledge and expertise in art and icons.

Though much was done once the art arrived in Kansas City, much was also done in the weeks preceding the first week of July. Dean Peter DeVeau arrived in Kansas City in early 2012 and was very soon thereafter presented with the possibility of hosting the exhibition. The Cathedral had been approached months earlier, but the project stayed on the back burner pending the Dean's arrival. He saw this as a great opportunity for the Cathedral and we have benefited from his vision and leadership.

However, all the hard work and leadership would have been unrealized without the generous gift from the Tom and Sally Wood Family Foundation that funded this exhibit. The exhibit was dedicated to the memory of Tom and Sally Wood in thanksgiving for their delight in the arts and this cathedral church. We are additionally blessed to receive from the Wood family the gift of the icon behind the pulpit "Door to Paradise."

Kenneth Pargament, professor of psychology at Bowling Green State University, says that "at its heart, spiritual transformation refers to a fundamental change in the place of the sacred or the character of the sacred in the life of the individual."

Ludmila Pawlowska's art is intended to reveal the sacred and transform the viewer. The sacred became clearer for some viewers, changing the meaning and the placement of sacredness in their life. Some might have viewed icons that contained mirrors and, perhaps for the first time, saw the sacred and holy in themselves. Some re-

> marked on how transformed the Cathedral spaces were while some talked about weekly conversations with the art. We were transformed collectively and individually.


