FROM THE DEAN On the Go

The past several years churches have been taking Ash Wednesday to the streets. At street corners, in shopping malls, on train and subway platforms and in other places where pedestrians are bound to pass church people are going out on the first day of Lent to offer what many call "Ashes to Go."

We ventured out from the Cathedral again this year on Ash Wednesday. Following the noonday liturgy Christy Dorn and I walked through the Power and Light District to offer ashes to pedestrians. Sue Sommer joined John Spicer, rector of St. Andrew's, at the Kansas City Community Kitchen, where they offered ashes, but mostly warm, damp washcloths to the guests. (See Sue's article below.)

A parishioner who expressed interest in our downtown Ash Wednesday ventures suggested that we call what we were doing, "Ashes on the Go." Her thought was that "on the go" fit better. We speak of faith and of Lent as journeys. "To go" sounds more like fast food. "On the Go" has a better sound to it. To me, it points up a sound theology.

That theological thought came to me as Christy and I made our way across 13th Street on Ash Wednesday afternoon. Many of the people we encountered smiled and declined our invitation to be marked with ashes. A few made a wide berth when they saw us coming. Some were grateful for the opportunity since they could not make it to a church. The majority of those who accepted the offer to be signed with ashes tended to be in their mid-thirties or younger. Many of them first responded to our offer of ashes with "What is that?"

Right then and there "On the Go" began to make sense to me. To "What it that?" I replied "Ashes are a sign of our mortality. We mark ourselves with them to remember that we all will die, and to remind ourselves that what we do

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between now and then makes a difference!" Not a few times I heard back, "That sounds like a good idea, Give me some,"

It was clear to me on the street that lots of folks don't know about the earthy symbol of ashes signed on a forehead, but that they do know about death. They do want their lives to have meaning. Forty minutes earlier we had confessed in the Ash Wednesday, Litany of Penitence, "our failure to commend the faith that is in us." Now it was time to tell the story. Fast. This street-side "crash course" on ashes, mortality and meaning prompted by the questions of a generation not as familiar with church practices was a lesson in being church.

What we do and what we say as we move about the business of our lives embodies best the reconciliation and renewal we have in Christ. This annual journey of Lent to Easter, from ashes of mortality to the risen life of Christ prepares us for this very thing. Wherever we find ourselves on the go, we can be sure that occasions will arise to commend that faith that is in us. Such encounters can make a day for someone, and, they can change the world. In a word and on the go, that's gospel.

So I asked God with as much humility as I could muster to help me see clearly and to use me as a vehicle of his grace. And I awoke the next morning with the idea of warm moist washcloths. Ran the idea past Fr. John Spicer of St. Andrew's who was

Health News

Training in Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR), AED (assisted electronic device), choking and current updates in first aid are scheduled for March 9 from 9 a.m.-1 p.m. A light lunch will be provided. We will have an additional class in the spring to accommodate more parishioners. We should all learn to provide CPR to another person. God wants us to care for our fellow man. This is not a hard class and there is no test for completion.

Our Lenten Academy classes on Health and Wellness are being conducted Wednesday evenings during Lent. We will offer a fourth session April 24 as part of Café Grazia. Dr. Jesse Roberts will give an informational talk for the women of the congregation, including a discussion of breast and ovarian cancer. Dr. Roberts is an oncologist and a palliative physician and is an excellent speaker.

Health News & Recommendations: Grandchild Visits

Everyone looks forward to visits with their grandchildren, nieces and nephews. Please minimize your chance of catching an illness from them, especially during the late fall and winter months.

- 1. Postpone the visit when a child has a contagious or severe illness, especially the flu or pneumonia. If the little one has a fever or has recently started coughing, the illness is probably contagious.
- 2. Avoid sharing kisses and face-to-face hugs. Save these things until he or she is feeling better. Mutual reciprocity is needed.
- 3. Remind the child about good hygiene by using a tissue and covering their cough or sneeze. Children should be taught to cough into the crook of their arm.
- 4. Make sure their vaccinations are current, and yours are as well.
- 5. Don't share drinking cups, straws, pop cans or eating utensils.
- 6. Try to not touch your eyes, nose or mouth until you and the little one have washed your hands. It is also a good idea to remind them to wash their face, as well as their hands, before eating.

As we age, we lose our immunity to the transmittable diseases of childhood. In fact, this applies to all transmittal diseases, not just the childhood ones. We need to protect each other.

Stay warm and keep well this winter.

Treasurer's Report


For the month of January 2013, income was on track with budget although pledges were approximately \$15,500 below January 2012. Expenses were below

He was something of a thorn in the side of the Jewish-Christian leadership in Jerusalem. He was almost assuredly a mystic, an argumentative theologian, and a prolific letter writer.

MN foundation has new name

The Maison de Naissance Foundation has a new name: Global Birthing Home Foundation. Why a new name? Jim Grant, executive director, tells us: "Over the years we have received many questions about the foundation name, and comments that it is too hard to remember, incomprehensible, difficult to pronounce, or impossible to spell, if you don't speak French, that is."

Global Birthing Home Foundation was chosen as the new name because it expresses their desire to one day replicate the success in Haiti in other developing countries. In Haiti, the facility will keep

the Maison de Naissance name — only the Foundation name is changing.

Note that the US headquarters address remains the same: 5000 W 134th St, Leawood, KS 66209.

Their mission statement is "to significantly reduce maternal and neonatal mortality rates in impoverished communities. The services of a modern maternity center and community health program are offered from the hospitality of a safe, culturally appropriate, and welcoming home: a home of birth — Maison de Naissance."

The joyful arrival shifts to a drama of darkness and shadow as we read the story of Christ's passion and death as told in Luke's gospel. We enter into that story through singing hymns, offering prayer and sharing Eucharist.

Weekdays of Holy Week: March 25-27

12:05 p.m. & 5:30 p.m. Eucharist in the nave

The gospel lessons for each day center on Jesus' movement toward his suffering, death and resurrection.

The Three Days *Triduum* MAUNDY THURSDAY, MARCH 28

12:05 p.m., A simple Eucharist in the nave

6 p.m., Maundy Thursday Liturgy, Founders' Hall and Cathedral Nave We remember Jesus' last meal with his disciples by listening to the gospel, washing feet as a sign of servant ministry, share the bread and wine of Eucharist, eat an agape meal together, process to the Cathedral to sing, pray and witness the stripping of the altar. Following the liturgy there is opportunity for prayer, spiritual direction and reconciliation (confession).

GOOD FRIDAY, MARCH 29

12:05 p.m. & 7 p.m. Good Friday Liturgy

The service includes the singing of the Passion according to John, choral and instrumental music, familiar hymns, customary prayers for the day and veneration of cross of Christ.

2:30 p.m. Way of the Cross

This simple liturgy that has its roots in the early practices of the church in Jerusalem follows Jesus on his journey to the cross. Participants in the service are invited to share in the readings, prayers and in carrying the cross from station to station.

HOLY SATURDAY, MARCH 30

12:05 p.m. Liturgy

This brief and simplest of all liturgies recalls the mournful desolation of the lifeless Christ in the tomb. This experience of in-between-time prepares the community for the joy that comes in the morning.

EASTER EVE, MARCH 30

7:30 p.m. The Great Vigil of Easter

The Service of Light, the Service of Lessons, Christian Initiation and Eucharist is the principal service of the Church Year and our first Easter celebration. The Bishop presides. The congregation gathers in Founders' Hall prior to the lighting of the new fire in the Memorial Courtyard. All then move to the darkened Cathedral nave for the singing of the Exsultet; to listen to the story of salvation in the Scripture; witness the confirmation, reception and reaffirmation of persons in the Cathedral congregation; to proclaim with joy "Alleluia. Christ is risen" and to celebrate the first Eucharist of Easter.

EASTER DAY, MARCH 31

8 a.m. and 10:15 a.m. Festival Holy Eucharist

Hymns, choral music, brass and a Cathedral resplendent with flowers accompany our Easter morning celebrations. At each service our children uncover the "Alleluia" buried away at the end of Epiphany as a prelude to the entire assembly acclaiming, "Alleluia. Christ is risen." The Bishop preaches and presides. Flowers are distributed to all who worship this day as a sign of the risen life we share in Christ.

Easter Parking: In order to make room for Easter guests, is you are able, please use on-street parking or park in the parking garage on the north side of 13th Street (enter by either entrance — from 13th Street or Washington).

Easter Offering: One half of the offering received on Easter Day is designated by the Vestry for local and global outreach ministries. Special envelopes will be included in the Easter bulletins. Your prayers and generosity are encouraged for this offering for Christ's mission in the world.

Note: The Cathedral Offices are closed, Easter Monday, April 1.

Gift for Easter Flowers and Music: The decoration of the nave and sanctuary by Trapp and Company proclaims the Risen Lord's victory over the grave, and the Cathedral choirs and instrumentalists lead our praises and shouts of "Alleluia" and stir our hearts to embrace new and transformed life. Your generous gifts will help provide flowers and music for our celebrations of The Resurrection. Offering envelopes are available at the back of the nave. Use the envelope and check the box for Music or Flowers, or both. If you check both, the gift will be divided for both music and flowers. Return the envelope to the office by Sunday, March 24, for your name to be included in the Easter bulletins.

LABYRINTH AVAILABLE HOLY WEEK

Labyrinth walk for private meditation is available in Founders' Hall Palm Sunday afternoon through Wednesday evening and also Good Friday until 7 p.m. (The labyrinth is not available Maundy Thursday to allow for setup for the evening liturgy.) A printed guide will be available in Founders' Hall to assist you as you walk the labyrinth. The labyrinth is an ancient pattern that has been found in many cultures around the world. Labyrinths have only one path to the center. You walk in by a winding path and exit the same way.

planning to partner with me in the Kitchen on Ash Wednesday. He loved the idea and, together, we each decided to bring about 50 warm, moist washcloths packed in coolers (which of course always double as warmers).

In less than two hours, we burned through all but about five of the cloths. When asked why we were doing this, I'd respond, "Because you are a beloved child of God." What I heard back was, "Thank you." "God bless you." "This feels so good." "What a blessing," and "Can I keep this?" Several asked if we were ministers (both John and I were in our collars with stoles on over our street clothes) and if so, what churches we were from. One woman said, "Oh yeah, Grace and Holy. All y'all used to run this kitchen. I ate there for years." Then she frowned and said, "Till the city decided they didn't want no homeless people downtown no more."

I swallowed and said, "We miss having the Kitchen. But there were other reasons. We were running out of room to feed everyone. And didn't you get tired of walking all the way over to Broadway and back in all kinds of weather?"

She shrugged and said, "Yeah, but you know. Who you think gets hassled 'bout curfews? People like you or people like me? Who you think gets told to move along? People like you or people like me?" Busted.

So I said, "I hear you. But we both do have something in common. A warm washcloth feels good to both of us on a chilly day."

She cracked a huge smile. "You got that right. You have a blessed day, now."

A blessed day. Yup. Already in progress.

The alternate Old Testament reading for Ash Wednesday comes from Isaiah 58. God asks, "Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin?"

If the idea is to take the church to places where people need to hear good news, then taking ashes, or for that matter, warm wash cloths, out to the streets is a great start. But we know that it cannot end there.
