FROM THE DEAN Placards of Peace

"No more hurting people. Peace." These words, hand lettered on a blue placard decorated with a peace symbol and two hearts, speak. This "peace sign" was crafted by 8-year-old Martin Richard. Martin was one of the three persons killed in the bomb blasts at the Boston Marathon finish line. He was there with his family to cheer on the runners in that annual event of endurance and national and international goodwill. His mother and sister, who stood watching with him, were seriously injured.

President Obama brought attention to Martin and his sign when he spoke at an interfaith memorial service at Boston's Holy Cross Roman Catholic Cathedral. The picture of Martin holding his sign is circulating out there in cyberspace. It is a simple plea in a world of hurting. Yet more than the sign itself, Martin's short life speaks. Of Martin, a friend of his named Colin gave this testimony: "If somebody was left out, he would come say, 'Want to join my group?'"

As I write this, parts of Boston and its suburbs are in lock-down as the second of two brothers identified as the Marathon bombers is being pursued by law enforcement teams. The older of the two was killed earlier today in a shoot out with police. At this time we know that these brothers, aged 26 and 19, are ethnic Chechen natives of Russia, in the area bordering Chechnya, an area wracked by violence stemming from an ongoing struggle for independence. In time the story of these two young men and their motives will unfold. The troubling thing is that there are too many acts of senseless harm in the world. Too many people hurting people.

What a tragedy that, in Boston this week, an affable and compassionate eight year old, a bright young woman and a Chinese student would die at an event where the world's people gather in celebration. That so many were injured and maimed. That two young men entering their most productive years would heartlessly kill and destroy. As news came out of Boston and saddened our hearts I could not but think of the world and all its troubles, and of our own Kansas City community where lives are lost in senseless killings year round.

Last week "Alleluia" was taped up in the Founders' Hall windows facing the Cathedral's main driveway. These are the hand-decorated placards of hope that were raised up by our children Easter morning when they helped begin our worship by uncovering the "Alleluia" that had been buried under the rug back before Lent began. These letters spell out the word that serves as a bookend for our Easter

proclamation of faith, "Alleluia. Christ is risen. The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia." Or put another way, "Praise God. Christ has overcome death! Really! Praise God"

When the letters were first put up in the windows, they were taped on the glass so that they could be read from the inside. But, as one person wisely pointed out, we inside already know what it says! The letters were re-hung at once. Alleluia is visible to persons driving or walking down Broadway or across 13th Street. It is the word of hope we share with the neighborhood and the world. That word includes the message of eight-year-old Martin, now spread world-wide, "No more hurting people. Peace." In, and through, and from our place in the heart of Kansas City this is what makes us who we are. God help us to live this at times like these.

Their youth network includes emergency shelter for 10 homeless and runaway youth ages 12-18 for up to 21 days and transitional housing for four youth ages 18-21 for up to 21 months. The street outreach program helps runaway and throw-away youth access services—they fielded 1,740 hotline calls and provided 2,263 youth with outreach services in 2011.

Treasurer's Report

For the month of March 2013, income exceeded budget due to pledge income exceeding budget by nearly \$18,000. Additionally, user fees surpassed budget by about \$3,500. Expenses also exceeded budget by about \$4,500. For the first quarter

ended March 31, 2013, income surpassed budget by about \$11,000 and expenses were about \$4,000 below budget. As a result, the net loss for the first quarter was \$4,855 as compared to a budgeted loss of \$19,998.

Learning the Way: Understanding that in the 21st century, Christians are formed, not born Saturday, June 1, 9 a.m.–4 p.m., Founders' Hall

The Reverend Paul Hoffmann and Donna Linn of Seattle, Wash., are presenting a workshop on establishing a Catechumenate in a local congregation. This is a response to a growing desire to have an intentional and ongoing process for the formation of Christians.

Learning the Way is open to congregations in the Dioceses of West Missouri and Kansas, and the Central States Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

Paul Hoffman co-founded and directs Faith and Font, a national training event for seminary

students and congregational leaders in preparing adults for Holy Baptism. Phinney Ridge Lutheran Church, Seattle, where Paul has served since 1996, has a flourishing catechumenal program.

Paul will preach at morning services, June 2, the Second Sunday after Pentecost.

The "Cathechumenate" refers to an engaging process for gathering people to share and learn about what it means to follow Christ. It is rooted in the earliest practices of the Church, the word meaning to be taught orally.

About Pastor Paul E. Hoffman

Paul has been an ELCA Pastor since 1982, and Lead Pastor at Phinney Ridge Lutheran Church in Seattle for the past 17 years. There he has led The WAY, a twenty-first century adaptation of the ancient practice of bringing new Christians to faith through a year-long mentoring process in discipleship.

Paul will retire from parish ministry in May 2013 in order to

devote his full-time energies to a new ministry of writing and teaching about this outreach for the larger Church. His work at the Cathedral in June will be the first of his seminars in this new adventure.

Known across the Lutheran Church for his teaching, workshops, and mentoring, Paul brings a wealth of experience from leading The WAY at his congregation in Seattle for the past 17 years. His story is captured in the recent *Faith Forming Faith* (Cascade Books, 2012) and in the forthcoming *Faith Shaping Ministry*.

Paul has worked ecumenically and led workshops and training events in the US and Europe, having spoken and taught at Oxford, Paris, St. Petersburg and in local North American congregations just like ours.



He is married to Donna Seuren Hoffman, a reading specialist in Shoreline Schools. She shares his joy of music, reading, gardening, and travel. The couple lives in Seattle just across Lake Union from their two adult children, Jacob and Lauren.

Giving Thanks for the Reverend Dr. Richard Ira Preis Memorial Concert & Reception: Monday, May 13, 2 p.m.

We give thanks for the life and ministry of Pastor Richard Preis who died April 9 from complications due to ALS, Lou Gehrig's disease. In recent years Pastor Preis, a retired pastor of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America assisted at Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral with pastoral care, home visitations and in celebrating weekday Eucharist. His ministry among us was a visible sign of Called to Common Mission, the agreement that established full communion between the Episcopal Church and the ELCA Lutheran Church. Through his ministry among us he touched numerous lives and hearts at the Cathedral and in the greater community.

Born in Chicago, Illinois, May 10, 1930, Pastor Preis earned degrees from Carthage College, the University of Kansas, and Hamma School of Divinity. He was senior pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church in Ann Arbor, Michigan, for 27 years and Normandale Lutheran Church in Edina, MN for 8 years. He then came to Kansas City to be interim pastor at Atonement Lutheran, Overland Park, and subsequently at All Saints' Lutheran, KCK, Faith Lutheran, Prairie Village, and Prince of Peace Lutheran, KCK.

While in Kansas City, Pastor Preis began a career as a singer and actor. He appeared in 15 shows for such companies as American Heartland Theater and Unicorn Theater, and sang at Californos restaurant (available on YouTube!). He created one-man shows including "The Gospel According to Broadway" which he presented 150 times in 18 states and Canada. Just this past year Richard delighted us with this lively gospel revue here at the Cathedral. He was one of the first actors in the standardized patient program at KCUMB. He served on local



boards of Summerfest, KC Chamber Orchestra, Friends of the Heart of America Shakespeare Festival and the Lyric Opera Guild. He served on education and religious boards on local, state and national levels and was a regent of Carthage and Luther Colleges.

Pastor Preis is preceded in death by his wife, Constance Fry; parents Vera and Arthur Preis and brother, Arthur; foster parents, Sarah and Richard Albert and brother, Phillip; his foster grandson, Kyle Balke. He is survived by his companion Alvin Schneider; sons Andrew, Charles and David and son-in-law, Keith Vargo; his foster family Nancy and Bryan Balke and children; his foster brother Richard Albert and sister-in-law, Caroline; and various nieces and nephews. He donated his remains to KCUMB.



Second Sunday of Easter: Jazz & Diana Butler Bass






