FROM THE DEAN Cathedral Windows

The windows tell a story. Each of the windows in the Cathedral, like their medieval predecessors, is more than an “illuminated wall decoration,” as stained glass windows are sometimes described. The windows depict scenes from the Bible and the life of Christ, various symbols of church and the world, and the names of donors and persons in whose memory the windows have been given.

At the Cathedral we do windows. Yes, we all do! Not only do we find inspiration from those decorative works of beauty that admit light and serve as glazing for window openings in nave and chancel, but in the Christ light that shines through each of us wherever we happen to be. On Sunday, September 8, our fall homecoming and ministry fair day “Cathedral Windows” is our theme. This is the day to tell our story by gathering all of the pieces that together create our common witness and ministry at Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral. It is important to add here, that it is literally the corporate work of our ministry leaders and staff. You will be impressed by the creativity!

As with the many pieces of glass held together by strips of lead to depict stories and abstract symbols, a ministry fair does the same. And, as with stained glass windows, it can

do more. While we have our many activities, groups, ministries, and in-reach and outreach efforts, these illuminate and point to everyday faith and practice. Our common life of worship and ministry

has its primary and best expression in our homes, workplaces, schools, neighborhoods and communities.

“Cathedral Windows” tell our story. That story is greater than a mosaic of differing shapes and colors. Our “ministry fair” is both invitation and reminder for us haloed saints (small “s”) that each has a story and a life to share. Come see how Christ is shining among us.

Exploring and Experiencing the Naked Now: Learning to See as the Mystics See

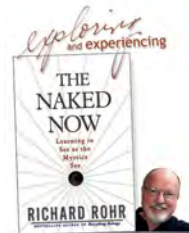
Mondays: Sept. 16, 23, 30,

Treasurer's Report

For the month of July 2013, actual results compared to budget were lower due to significantly lower pledge and plate income that was \$16,000 below budget. Additionally, expenses were slightly higher than budget, which was impacted mostly by increased outdoor property maintenance.

As a result, the net loss was \$58,712 as compared to a budgeted loss of \$39,830. For the year-to-date through July 31, 2013, operating income was about \$10,000 less than budget while total expenses were nearly \$3,000 below budget.

Additionally, pledges can be made through the website. We remain below our budget of 200 pledging units with 175 at this time. We appreciate your ongoing support!

Education for Ministry begins; room for you to join

Education for Ministry (EfM) program began with a vision of enrolling a few hundred students. Within a few years, it developed into a program reaching several thousand students with groups around the globe.

GHTC EfM meets Tuesday nights 6:15 to 9 p.m. in the Common Room. At 6:30 we begin with worship and sharing followed by discussion of the reading material. The cost for this year is \$350. Small group inquiry seminar is the nucleus of the EfM program. Through study, prayer and reflection, EfM groups move toward a new understanding of the fullness of God's kingdom.

This process can be illustrated by a two-rail fence. One rail is the Christian tradition. The other is the collective experience of the group's members. The rails are linked by fence posts that represent the seminar sessions where life and study meet. The fence is grounded in the soil of regular worship, which is vital to the life of the group.

Participants are given weekly assignments to study with the help of resource guides. Students are responsible for setting their own learning goals. They spend between two and four hours in study and preparation each week. In the seminars, members have an opportunity to share their

insights and discoveries as well as to discuss questions that the study materials raise for them.

By examining their own beliefs and their relationship to our culture and the tradition of our Christian faith, participants can learn what it means to be effective ministers in the world.

In coming to terms with the notion that everything we do has potential for manifesting the love of Christ, we discover that our ministry is at hand wherever we turn.

Abundant giving for back-to-school drives

Donations from the school uniform drive yielded 417 pieces of school uniform resulting in 187 complete uniforms for boys and girls sizes 4T-adult sizes. School principal Dr. Jo Nemeth said, "This is like Christmas, you just don't know how much my students will appreciate this generous gift!" The success of this drive was greatly increased by the donation of gently used uniforms from Border Star Elementary School as well as the generosity of several congregational members who purchased uniforms after gaps in certain sizes were identified.

While the drive is now complete, Social Outreach will continue to collect uniform pieces for

children who outgrow their uniforms or need additional warmer clothing this winter.

The School Supply Drive resulted in enough supplies for children in residence at Crittenton as well as for the foster children who are served through Crittenton. Especially noteworthy was the donation that Sandra Hornbeck secured from one of her business contacts who provided six cases of spiral notebooks and pocket folders for the children in foster care.

Both agencies were grateful for the Cathedral's overwhelming generosity. Thank you to all who donated during these back-to-school drives.

Upcoming Musical Events

In September, there are three events of musical interest:

On **Sunday, September 8** at 2 p.m., Susan Nataly, British coloratura soprano, will give her only North American recital of 2013, in the Cathedral nave. She has a vast repertoire of opera arias, art song, and selections from major oratorios. Her recital, with pianist Richard Williams, is a free admission event; donations will be most welcomed.



On **Sunday, September 15** at 5 p.m., the Trinity Choir offers the first of the 2013-2014 Choral Evensongs. Composers represented are David Ashley White, Herbert Murrill, and Leo Sowerby. Dr. Kenneth Walker of St. Michael and All Angels Church will be the guest organist.

Lastly, **Sunday, September 29** at 2 p.m., William Baker will conduct a Hymn Festival, which will include a massed choir, brasses, organ and readings. Admission is \$20 general, \$15 for students and seniors, 12 and under admitted without charge. The Festival is likely to be most grand.

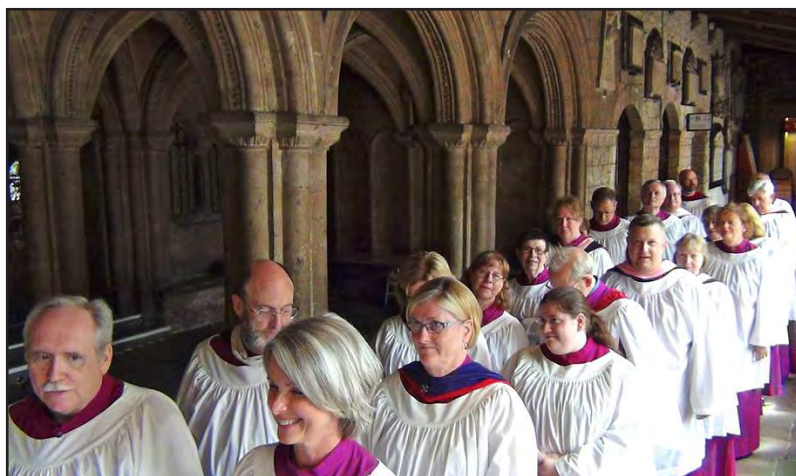
Thanks to Amy and Stewart for their fine leadership. Indeed, thanks to all the singers of all the choirs.

Cathedral hosts bishops' open forum on inclusivity: Sept. 12

Kansas Bishop Dean Wolfe and West Missouri Bishop Martin Field will be featured during a "Bishops Open Forum" Sept. 12 from 7-9 p.m. in Founders' Hall, sponsored by the Greater Kansas City Chapter of Integrity.

The event is designed to help clergy, lay leaders, as well as anyone who is interested, look at where dioceses and parishes stand following the decision by the 2012 General Convention to authorize use of a rite to bless same-sex unions.

According to Larry Bingham, one of the event's organizers, participants will have the chance to discuss a variety of questions:

- Has there been any change in your parish as a result of this resolution?
- Has your parish been asked to bless any same-sex unions?
- If your church has done so, what has been the reaction?
- If your church hasn't been asked, has your vestry and congregation discussed the issue in anticipation of such a request?

Bingham said the gathering also will discuss ways churches can reach out to the gay and lesbian community so they know what the Episcopal Church has to offer them as members.

"Like all evangelism efforts," he said, "we cannot sit back and wait for potential members to walk through our doors."

Bingham said that since Christian churches over the centuries have been a primary institution passing negative judgment on gay and lesbian people, "it is

going to take a special effort and a lot of radical hospitality to convince them that we really mean it this time."

Noting that the Episcopal Church has been discussing the role of gay and lesbian people since 1976, Bingham said that simply passing a resolution doesn't guarantee an inclusive church. "That can only happen with actions by our bishops, congregational leaders and individual members."

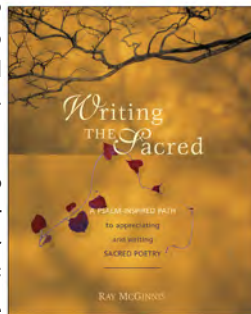

Grief is a natural response to the loss of someone or something meaningful ~ a person, a relationship, a job, health, independence, the loss of a deeply held belief or anything else that is emotionally valued.

Small losses dot our everyday lives:

- The runner who pulls a ligament and cannot run
- The promotion that went to a less experienced, more aggressive co-worker
- Putting the family pet to sleep
- The inability to conceive a child
- Thinning hair or a thickening waistline
- An auto accident that leaves a permanent decrease in range of motion
- Breaking up with a girlfriend or boyfriend, as well as separation or divorce.
- The longtime friend who won't speak to you.
- A persistent lack of energy where you once counted on feeling full of vitality
- Parents adjusting to adult children who have left home

In this confidential and supportive setting you'll be given a map for understanding how writing in a journal can be a helpful companion as you reflect on your own losses. While a range of people sign up for a workshop, some who keep a journal, no previous writing experience is necessary. For some it is helpful to think of this as a workshop to learn how to jot things down about grief and loss. In addition to our own losses, this is a workshop of use to anyone who is a caregiver or a friend or family member, as well as for anyone who gives pastoral care. No previous writing experience necessary.
