From the Dean Lively Music, Lively Word

On a Monday evening back in September well over twenty folks from the Cathedral went Rockhurst University to see the seven volumes of the St. John's Bible. Two of our own members with ties to Rockhurst, Catherine Green and Ellen Spake were our docents. Ellen actually was a driving force behind this special exhibit.

The seven volumes of the St. John's Bible are works of breathtaking beauty. They dazzle and dance with color and gold leaf. The artistry contained in them call up a lively word that breaks forth into the moment. The St. John's Bible, and the very accurate reproduction of it that we viewed at

Rockhurst, is the first fully illuminated and hand copied Bible to be produced by a Benedictine abbey since before the invention of the printing press. Completed in 2011, it was commissioned in 1998 by the Benedictine community at St. John's Abbey in Minnesota to mark the beginning of a new millennium. It was produced in Wales by master calligrapher, Donald Jackson, assisted by a team of seven



calligraphers. The text of the New Revised Standard Version of the Bible was used.

Two of the seven heritage reproduction volumes of the Bible will be on display at the Cathedral, Sunday, November 17: the Pentateuch (Genesis – Deuteronomy, The Torah) and the Gospels. It's also Kirkin' o' the Tartan that Sunday.

In addition to the colorful illuminated texts of the Bible, our space will be filled with the multi-hued patterns of Tartans and the stirring music of bagpipes and drums.

It's also that next to last Sunday of the Church Year. On that day we pray: "Blessed Lord, who caused all holy Scriptures to be written for our learning: Grant us so to hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, that we may embrace and ever hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life, which you have given us in our Savior Jesus Christ ..."

On this day we pray that God guide us by the Scripture, we'll use the occasion to party. With bagpipes and drums, kilts and capes, and Episcopalians and Presbyterians aplenty in the house we're going to make a day of it. The two illuminated Bibles will



be used in worship that day. We'll carry them around the cathedral to bagpipes and singing. The Lesson and the Gospel will be read from them. We'll keep our own version of the Jewish festival of Simhat Torah, that is, "Rejoicing with the Torah." Simhat Torah marks the end and a new beginning of the

yearly Torah reading cycle. The Torah scrolls are carried around the synagogue with dancing and singing, all the while blessing God for the gift and guidance of Torah.

Come rejoice on a day when all are Scots and all, as always, are invited to encounter the lively word.

The Saint John's Bible will be on display between services and following the 10:15 a.m. service. And, don't forget, there is a shortbread reception following each service, too!


About the Book

In this book, Willimon offers "a fresh exposition of 'the Word made flesh,' reflecting on Jesus as the one who speaks for, acts as, and is God the gospels are full of folk who confidently knew what was what—until they met Jesus. Jesus provoked an intellectual crisis in just about everybody. Their response was not, 'Wow, I've just seen the Son of God,' but rather, 'Who is this?'" The book is part of the *Belief Matters* series, that is intended to engage people in thinking about faith in order to "love God more fully, live with confidence, and change the world."

About the Author

William Willimon is considered one of the most effective preachers in the United States. Ordained in the United Methodist Church, he is Professor of the Practice of Christian Ministry at Duke University Divinity School. He is retired Bishop of the North Alabama Conference of The United Methodist Church, and formerly was Dean of the Chapel at Duke University. He is widely sought after as a speaker on the university level and holds 13 honorary doctorates in addition to a doctoral degree from Emory University.

Book of Remembrance

We gather names and add them to a book started in 2007. It is a lasting memorial of "those we love but see no longer." The book is displayed in the Cathedral on All Saints' Sunday. The names are also be listed in the worship booklet. During the liturgy there is a time when lectors read aloud the names of those who have died in the past 12 months, followed by a time when <u>all present say aloud names</u> of those they would like remembered.

Forms for submitting names will be available at services beginning Oct. 13. You can place these in the offering plate or in the basket on the ushers' table. Names can also be e-mailed to jtoma@kccathedral.org. The deadline for submitting names is Tuesday, Oct. 29.

Flu and Fleece

The Cathedral joined with St. Michaels and All Angels, Mission, Kan., for the Flu and Fleece event at the Kansas City Community Kitchen Thursday, October 17. Flu shots were provided to about 100 adults and four children by two doctors and 12 nurses/nurse practitioners. (One of the nurses was on leave from Afghanistan and was happy to take the time to serve at this event.)

More than 150 people received fleece items as well as goody bags and soap packets. Earlier this month, Jackye Finnie organized a sewing group of 10 congregation members who made about 170 fleece hats. The Cathedral donated over 450 fleece jackets, hats, scarves, and gloves for this event.

Happy Bottoms The final diaper campaign for 2013

The final diaper campaign for 2013 ended October 9. Members of the Cathedral donated 1,183 diapers. This brings the yearly contribution to 7,604 diapers and cash donations totally \$5,150 to be used in the purchase of diapers for Happy Bottoms.

In 2014 Social Outreach is planning to have Saturday volunteer opportunities for members of the congregation to help at Happy Bottoms distribution center in Lenexa. Currently we are targeting March 15 and May 3 as volunteer days.
