Due to the violence in Haiti's capital city, the onesies that are usually collected in May cannot be shipped to MN. Therefore, this May Outreach Ministries Committee requests a money donation in the same amount that you would have spent on onesies. Money given is sent by wire transfer safely to MN's bank account in Les Cayes, near MN. This will enable MN to purchase needed medical and other supplies locally. MN opened in 2004, and to date 8,900 babies have been safely delivered. That's quite a record. We hope you will want to make a donation. Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination: "1 John 4:7-12 Text Treatment"

In addition to illuminations, visual elements, and calligraphy, St. John's Bible also features "special treatments" or ("text treatments"). These are portions of the biblical text written in a larger size and decorated with gold and color. They call attention to texts used regularly in worship or texts treating key biblical themes such as Christlike love. Today's focus highlights the text treatment of 1 John 4:7-12. This was a portion of last Sunday's Epistle Reading and is emphasized today because of its continuation of the Gospel Reading's theme of abiding in God's love. What does this treatment suggest to you about the nature of divine love? Compare this text treatment with the text treatment of 1 Corinthians 13? How do their emphases differ? How is that difference reflected in the two text treatments? You are invited to go forward and view the text up close, just don't touch the volume without assistance from a docent
