Second Lesson: 2 Corinthians 6:1-13

Lector As we work together with Christ, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. For he says,

"At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you."

See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, beatings, imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, hunger; by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; in honor and dishonor, in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see—we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

We have spoken frankly to you Corinthians; our heart is wide open to you. There is no restriction in our affections, but only in yours. In return—I speak as to children—open wide your hearts also.

Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination: "Out of the Whirlwind" (Job 38 - 42)

"Why do bad things happen, especially to people I know and care about"? "Why do people suffer, especially those who try to live in faithfulness to God and consideration of others"? "Why do horrible natural calamities occur, destroying lives, livelihoods, communities, and dwellings?" "What purpose could there possibly be for the unexpected tragedies suffered along the journey of life"? Those who claim to have neatly packaged answers to such questions don't (e.g., read the entire Book of Job). So, where might the suffering soul turn for comfort and guidance?

These are the kinds of questions with which the Book of Job wrestles. In its concluding chapters (38-42) Thomas Ingmire captures this struggle visually in a three-part illumination collectively titled "Out of the Whirlwind". In part one, "Out of the Whirlwind – Where are You", God responds to Job's pleas for explanation with probing questions rather than the anticipated words of clarification and consolation. God's words coming out of the whirlwind are rhetorical and challenging and seem unsympathetic. Yet, the outcome is a transformation of Job's thinking – God has reasons the human mind cannot fathom so, even should we receive the responses we think we want, they could not satisfy our questions.

In part two, "Out of the Whirlwind – Now My Eyes see You", Job still has not gotten the type of answers he anticipated with his queries, but he has gained a new and more satisfying relationship with God: "I had heard of you by the hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees you."

Finally, in part three, "Out of the Whirlwind – He will wipe away Every Tear", the experiences of pain, loss, and suffering (expressed through the descending words "the fire of God") are placed on the foundation of Revelation 21:4, pointing to that place beyond human suffering that we cannot now grasp but are assured awaits us. Ingmire hereby suggests that the answers we seek reside not even in this or any other particular book, but beyond. God's ways are beyond the human capacity to comprehend given the limitations inherent in our current state of existence.

What do you think Job means by the statement, "I had heard of you by the hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees you"? What is the deeper insight that Job has gained? How does that fit your understanding of the whirlwind response? How does today's Gospel reading connect with the insights portrayed here?
