THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Isaiah 43:16-21

Second Lesson: Philippians 3:4b-14

Lector

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.

Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.







Holy Saturday, April 19

9 a.m

A brief and simple liturgy recalls the mournful desolation of the lifeless Christ in the tomb.

Easter Vigil, April 19

7 p.m.

Together, we reflect anew on the loving actions of God as recounted in the Easter Vigil readings. Together, we will walk through the depths of salvation history into the fullness of redemption. The service begins by lighting the new fire. We will witness the confirmation, reception and reaffirmation of persons in the Cathedral congregation. We then proclaim with joy "Alleluia. Christ is risen" and celebrate the first Eucharist of Easter. We will continue the celebration at a reception following the service.

8 & 10:30 a.m.





Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

Fifth Sunday in Lent – Divine Extravagance

John 12:1-8 text (Utilizing the Luke, "Dinner at the Pharisee's House" Illumination)

God's abundant love and forgiveness tends to disrupt the orderly and predictable lifestyles that dominant social orders commonly prefer. Today's illumination provides a powerful portrayal of this reality. It depicts the extravagance of a woman who anoints Jesus with a perfume worth a year's wages, an event included in each of the four gospels with some variation. John locates the event prior to Jesus' Triumphal Entry. Mark places it on Wednesday of Holy Week. Matthew and Mark identify her simply as "a woman" and Luke labels her as "a sinful woman." John records her as Mary, sister of Martha and Lazarus. Whatever the details might be, this narrative of extravagance may seem disruptive to traditional views on Lenten self-denial (which is perhaps more in line with Jesus' disciples line of thinking about almsgiving on this occasion).

lesus often was criticized by the religious establishment of his day for fraternizing too freely with sinners. Today's illumination again highlights how this practice tended to introduce chaos into culturally familiar settings. Illuminator Donald Jackson depicts this by the messy, haphazard array placed within the meticulously neat household. A heavy black line dividing the scene suggests the chasm that exists between the world of this "sinful woman" and that of the Pharisees. Jesus' words in the middle of the illumination mediate between the chaos brought about by the woman and the task she has come to accomplish – express extravagant love in response to the extravagant forgiveness and acceptance she has experienced. Her actions remind us that extravagance is reciprocal – it moves both ways.

Near the top of the black dividing line is a circle inscribed with a cross. Poised over this scene, that feature invites the questions: "What is holiness?" and

"How does holiness relate to love?" The woman in this panel is unconventional, with green and pink hair and dressed eccentrically. The world she is disrupting is represented by the white scarf displaying Hebrew words indicative of temple worship and sacrifice. Thus, another border is revealed – that between conventional religious practice and faith that is infused with abundant love. Through this event Jesus seizes the opportunity to convey the message that divine love is chaotic. Such love disrupts the world of empty orderliness.

Today's focal illumination reminds us that when God breaks into history the world in its usual state is disrupted. What do you think distinguishes the left side of this panel from the right? What unites them? Do you prefer the tidy household or the disruptive intensity of extravagant love? Can you recall moments when your life was disrupted by this type of love? How does the message of God's extravagance fit into the larger framework of Lenten observance?
