THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Acts 9:36-43

Lector

Now in Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, "Please come to us without delay." So Peter got up and went with them; and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, "Tabitha, get up." Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. Meanwhile he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.

A Word from our Bishop

I look forward to my first celebrations of Pride with West Missouri this year! Last year, the tradition of celebrating the Eucharist before the Pride Parade began; and I am honored to continue that tradition both here in Kansas City on June 7 and in Springfield on June 14. I invite you to join these celebrations: these are the most public moments and opportunities to support our diverse communities.

Every person is a beloved child of God, no matter gender or sexual orientation. The reality is that our transgender and non-binary siblings, and their families, face enormous challenges. In response to rising harassment and discrimination, our vocation is to be a voice of Christ's love, especially as our culture seeks to erase their presence in our midst. My presence at the Pride events is just one way I seek to affirm and support all people. I hope you'll join me!

The Episcopal Church believes that God loves us all, no exceptions. We know that the primary ministers of the Gospel are all those baptized into the community. Every member has a vocation and ministry for the sake of the Gospel: proclaiming that the kingdom of God is near to us. For this reason, for the sake of Christ, we welcome all people in our churches with Christ's compassion, grace, and love. Our churches are places where we "seek Christ in all persons" and "respect the dignity of every human being" (BCP, p. 303-304). The seeds given today, Lilliput Zinnia, grows to be only 18-24" tall and is famous for an abundance of pom-pom blooms in bright, vivid colors. Blooming from mid summer until frost, this mixture can be cut all season long for spectacular summer bouquets and is extremely easy to grow. Like all Zinnia, this variety is deer resistant and attracts pollinators.

Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

Fourth Sunday of Easter – Jesus the Good Shepherd

"The Psalms Frontispiece" Illumination (Psalm 23)

This week's lectionary theme centers on Jesus as the good shepherd who leads and protects his flock. So, it may seem incongruous for the Saint John's Bible illumination to focus on the book of Psalms. The connecting link emerges out of the way Psalms has been employed for worship. Being a liturgical book, Psalms has been used by both Jewish and Christian faith communities for millennia in structuring public worship, often employing text and song (especially chants) to do this. However, while Christianity and Judaism share many liturgical texts, they do so from different theological perspectives. Psalm 23 provides a good example of this. For centuries Christians have layered this Psalm (which utilizes a familiar pastoral image from ancient Jewish life as an analogy for divine providence) with John 10:11 where Jesus declares, "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep."

Virtually all theological language is rooted in analogy. Experiences and objects from daily life are used to

communicate our spiritual relation with God. Historically, the image of the shepherd held especially rich possibilities for this purpose. The full range of relationships, including leadership, authority, protection, nurture, and deliverance, was applicable to the divine shepherd and his flock. Thus, Jesus' image as the good shepherd weds this significant Old Testament analogy of our relationship with God to

the New Testament analogy of Jesus' role as spiritual leader and protector of the Christian faith community.

The principal illumination in the Book of Psalms is the two-page frontispiece, located before Psalm 1. Here the five books that constitute Psalms are portrayed as five open scrolls arranged to form a menorah. Artistic director Donald Jackson's first illumination for the Saint John's Bible project was the menorah depicting Jesus' genealogy in Matthew's gospel. The menorah also was used in Genesis to depict the family tree of Abraham and Sarah. In the "Historical Books" volume of Saint John's Bible several menorahs were used to convey the developing faith heritage of Israel in contrast to those of Egypt, Canaan, and Babylon. In Psalms, the menorah illumination is used to emphasize the integrity and completeness of Israel's story.

Another important feature of today's focal illumination is the stamped gold archway of the Cathedral at Compostela, which recurs throughout the pages of Psalms. This image

conveys the tradition of believers gathering throughout the ages to sing or chant these texts. Compostela is used to symbolize the role that song plays for ushering us into the presence of God and has done so for millennia.

Think of the words you would use to describe what Jesus as the good shepherd means in your own spiritual life. How does the imagery of Psalms (especially Psalm 23) enrich that analogy of God's care and leadership for you? In what ways does singing (or chanting) the Psalms enhance your experience of worshiping God?
