

THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Acts 11:1-18

Lector

Now the apostles and the believers who were in Judea heard that the Gentiles had also accepted the word of God. So when Peter went up to Jerusalem, the circumcised believers criticized him, saying, "Why did you go to uncircumcised men and eat with them?" Then Peter began to explain it to them, step by step, saying, "I was in the city of Joppa praying, and in a trance I saw a vision. There was something like a large sheet coming down from heaven, being lowered by its four corners; and it came close to me. As I looked at it closely I saw four-footed animals, beasts of prey, reptiles, and birds of the air. I also heard a voice saying to me, 'Get up, Peter; kill and eat.' But I replied, 'By no means, Lord; for nothing profane or unclean has ever entered my mouth.' But a second time the voice answered from heaven, 'What God has made clean, you must not call profane.' This happened three times; then everything was pulled up again to heaven. At that very moment three men, sent to me from Caesarea, arrived at the house where we were. The Spirit told me to go with them and not to make a distinction between them and us. These six brothers also accompanied me, and we entered the man's house. He told us how he had seen the angel standing in his house and saying, 'Send to Joppa and bring Simon, who is called Peter; he will give you a message by which you and your entire household will be saved.' And as I began to speak, the Holy Spirit fell upon them just as it had upon us at the beginning. And I remembered the word of the Lord, how he had said, 'John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit.' If then God gave them the same gift that he gave us when we believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could hinder God?" When they heard this, they were silenced. And they praised God, saying, "Then God has given even to the Gentiles the repentance that leads to life."

Lector

"See, the home of God is among mortals.



Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

Fifth Sunday of Easter – Jesus' New Commandment

"Vision of the New Jerusalem" Illumination (Revelation 21:1-6)

In today's gospel reading, Jesus confronts us with the "new commandment" to "love one another as I have loved you." In this declaration we discover the glue that binds us together in community – God's love. In varied ways, each of today's liturgical texts speaks of community. Peter's experiences in Acts 11 address overcoming human barriers to God's intended community. The Revelation text tells of a new heaven and a new earth created not through human methods but through God's dwelling among us.

The artwork of Saint John's Bible points toward a reality visually captured in the "Vision of the New Jerusalem" illumination of Revelation 21. Beginning with Abraham and Sarah's departure from Haran, progressing through the Jacob and Joseph stories of being forced to leave their homes, continuing through Moses and the exodus, then through the exile, and finally to the gospel narratives of Jesus' call to

discipleship, God persistently leads humanity into new community where he longs to dwell among us. In Revelation 21 John catches a glimpse of what that new community is like. On the other side of the veil, we find not destruction, division, anxiety, and rivalry, but new life.

Today's illumination draws upon images associated with the rebuilding of Jerusalem after the exile. Elements are present reminiscent of Old Testament instructions for

building and rebuilding the temple. The gold grid pattern derived from the layout of the temple recounted in Ezekiel's vision completes the partial image portrayed in Daniel's "Vision of the Son of Man" illumination. In this scene, however, the Lord God and the Lamb are the new temple, there is no building. The Son of Man seen on the throne inhabits this city.

Through the exodus, God delivered the Hebrews from Egyptian slavery to a land of promise where he would dwell among them as the shekinah. As long as the Hebrews would accept his lordship then they would live in community bound together by God's love and righteousness. In the gospels, Jesus came to dwell among humanity to inaugurate God's new community made visible ideally through the church. In Revelation John declares that at the end God will again be the shekinah and because of this we will finally live as a complete

human community.

How does Peter's experience in Acts 11 challenge us to embrace John's apocalyptic vision as not being exclusively future? What does the tree of life image in the lower right corner suggest about God's intent for creation? In what other Saint John's Bible illumination were squares (like those at the bottom of this illumination) used to symbolize the formation of community? What meaning do these squares have in this depiction?

May 18, 2025 – Easter 5 (C) Traveling the Way of Love: Worship

"Traveling the Way of Love" Season 2 offers video stories of the ways people across The Episcopal Church participate in the seven Way of Love practices. Produced by the Office of Communication in partnership with Evangelism colleagues, it includes study guides to help congregations or small groups engage the stories and strengthen one another's discipleship. Each week, we'll share information about an episode, along with study questions suitable for congregational, small group, or personal reflection. Episode 1: Worship

"When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him." - Luke 24:30-31

When we worship, we gather with others before God. We hear the Good News of



Jesus Christ, give thanks, confess, and offer the brokenness of the world to God. As we break bread, our eyes are opened to the presence of Christ. By the power of the Holy Spirit, we are made one body, the body of Christ sent forth to live the Way of Love.

- 1. In this episode, host Chris Sikkema visits Palmer Memorial Episcopal Church in Houston, Texas, and chats with the Rev. Ryan Hawthorne about what worship means to her. Hawthorne emphasizes that worship is not just a communal practice, but a deeply personal one. She invites individuals to find the worship practices that resonate with their soul, which might include worshipping within a church community. What worship practices deeply touch your soul?
- 2. The call to gather and worship within the Christian tradition, as understood through the Episcopal lens, is a call to "the collective." It is a call to come together across generations and all sorts of messy human experiences to pray, offer praise and thanksgiving, proclaim the Gospel, and promote justice, peace, and love. What voices are missing from your worship experience? How could it be a more "collective" experience?
- 3. Palmer's former senior warden, Dr. Danna Kurtin, spoke about the importance of curiosity when it comes to practicing worship on the Way of Love. Being curious about our neighbors, other traditions, and the ways God is moving in the world through changing culture are just some of the things that can influence our worship experience. Where might the Holy Spirit be asking you as an individual or as a faith community to be curious and to stretch in your practice of worship?
