





THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Acts 16:9-15

Lector

During the night Paul had a vision: there stood a man of Macedonia pleading with him and saying, "Come over to Macedonia and help us." When he had seen the vision, we immediately tried to cross over to Macedonia, being convinced that God had called us to proclaim the good news to them.

We set sail from Troas and took a straight course to Samothrace, the following day to Neapolis, and from there to Philippi, which is a leading city of the district of Macedonia and a Roman colony. We remained in this city for some days. On the sabbath day we went outside the gate by the river, where we supposed there was a place of prayer; and we sat down and spoke to the women who had gathered there. A certain woman named Lydia, a worshiper of God, was listening to us; she was from the city of Thyatira and a dealer in purple cloth. The Lord opened her heart to listen eagerly to what was said by Paul. When she and her household were baptized, she urged us, saying, "If you have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come and stay at my home." And she prevailed upon us.

Second Lesson: Revelation 21:10, 22-22:5

Lector

In the spirit the angel carried me away to a great, high mountain and showed me the holy city Jerusalem coming down out of heaven from God.

I saw no temple in the city, for its temple is the Lord God the Almighty and the Lamb. And the city has no need of sun or moon to shine on it, for the glory of God is its light, and its lamp is the Lamb. The nations will walk by its light, and the kings of the earth will bring their glory into it. Its gates will never be shut by day—and there will be no night there. People will bring into it the glory and the honor of the nations. But nothing unclean will enter it, nor anyone who practices abomination or falsehood, but only those who are written in the Lamb's book of life.

Then the angel showed me the river of the water of life, bright as crystal, flowing from the throne of God and of the Lamb through the middle of the street of the city. On either side of the river is the tree of life with its twelve kinds of fruit, producing its fruit each month; and the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations. Nothing accursed will be found there any more. But the throne of God and of the Lamb will be in it, and his servants will worship him; they will see his face, and his name will be on their foreheads. And there will be no more night; they need no light of lamp or sun, for the Lord God will be their light, and they will reign forever and ever.







Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

Sixth Sunday of Easter – Abiding in God's Love

"Vision of the New Jerusalem" Illumination (Revelation 21:10-22:5)

Today's lectionary texts challenge Christians to think of God's love more broadly than their individual nationalities or cultures. In Psalm 67, the psalmist envisions God's salvation and care extending to "all nations." The Revelation text portrays the heavenly Jerusalem as a place where every part of the earth brings its unique gifts ("the glory and honor of the nations will be brought into it" v. 26). In Acts 16, Paul's Macedonian vision inaugurates actions that extend the message of God's abundant love into the hearts of the Greek and Roman worlds, and from there to the farthest reaches of the globe. At the same time other apostles were spreading the gospel story to North Africa and eastward in Asia. In John 14, Jesus speaks of the power and peace that will be bestowed upon all persons who respond to him in faith.

The messages of these texts remind us that as Christ's disciples we are not distinguished by our country, language, or sets of customs. While we are earthly citizens of particular countries, we live there only as sojourners. Our true home is the "heavenly Jerusalem," where we are fellow citizens with all God's people.

Returning this week to the "Vision of the New Jerusalem" illumination, we focus on the contents from a slightly different perspective than we did last Sunday. An observer's

initial perspective might easily conclude that "the new heaven and the new earth" references a narrowly Jewish habitation. In fact, John's heavenly Jerusalem includes citizens from "every nation, tribe, people, and language" (Rev. 5:9). This is symbolized through the multi-colored and varied shapes of the boxes at the bottom of the illumination. Borrowed from Hazel Dolby's illumination "Square before the Watergate" in the book of Nehemiah, illuminator Donald Jackson arranged these boxes to portray the formation of God's new community inhabiting the heavenly Jerusalem.

The prominent tree of life image in the lower right corner of the illumination connects to the heavenly city, although it stands apart from the main panel. The image is reminiscent of the "tree of life and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil" found in the garden of Eden, but its gold leaves are for the healing of the nations — in a sense undoing the impact of the fall.

A number of years ago historian Jaroslav Pelikan wrote of the historical paradox revealed by Christianity's "collision with politics, geography, ethnicity, and culture." The artwork of Saint John's Bible supports the reality that each Christian reflects their own unique times and places. The "Vision of the New Jerusalem" illumination affirms that amid earthly particularities our ultimate citizenship is in God's heavenly city where we are all bound together in Christ's "politics" of self-sacrificing love.

Do you ever experience tensions between your earthly loyalties (such as culture, nation, economics, and ethnicity) and ultimate loyalties to God's kingdom? What are some of the ways you attempt to manage that tension? Does today's focal illumination help you gain a better perspective of your value in God's ultimate plan?
