

The Lessons

First Lesson: Acts 16:16-34

Lector With Paul and Silas, we came to Philippi in Macedonia, a Roman colony, and, as we were going to the place of prayer, we met a slave girl who had a spirit of divination and brought her owners a great deal of money by fortune-telling. While she followed Paul and us, she would cry out, "These men are slaves of the Most High God, who proclaim to you a way of salvation." She kept doing this for many days. But Paul, very much annoyed, turned and said to the spirit, "I order you in the name of Jesus Christ to come out of her." And it came out that very hour.

But when her owners saw that their hope of making money was gone, they seized Paul and Silas and dragged them into the marketplace before the authorities. When they had brought them before the magistrates, they said, "These men are disturbing our city; they are Jews and are advocating customs that are not lawful for us as Romans to adopt or observe." The crowd joined in attacking them, and the magistrates had them stripped of their clothing and ordered them to be beaten with rods. After they had given them a severe flogging, they threw them into prison and ordered the jailer to keep them securely. Following these instructions, he put them in the innermost cell and fastened their feet in the stocks.

About midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the prisoners were listening to them. Suddenly there was an earthquake, so violent that the foundations of the prison were shaken; and immediately all the doors were opened and everyone's chains were unfastened. When the jailer woke up and saw the prison doors wide open, he drew his sword and was about to kill himself, since he supposed that the prisoners had escaped. But Paul shouted in a loud voice, "Do not harm yourself, for we are all here." The jailer called for lights, and rushing in, he fell down trembling before Paul and Silas. Then he brought them outside and said, "Sirs, what must I do to be saved?" They answered, "Believe on the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved, you and your household." They spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all who were in his house. At the same hour of the night he took them and washed their wounds; then he and his entire family were baptized without delay. He brought them up into the house and set food before them; and he and his entire household rejoiced that he had become a believer in God.



Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

Seventh Sunday of Easter – Christian Unity and Faithfulness "The Great Amen" Illumination (Revelation 22:20-21)

Today we celebrate the last Sunday of the 2025 Easter season through lectionary texts that emphasize the importance of Christian unity and faithfulness to God. The Paul and Silas narrative in Acts 16 reminds us of the power of faith and the transformative nature of the Gospel. Psalm 97 celebrates the joy that comes when we abide as faithful servants of God's reign. In the John 17 text, Jesus' prayer for the unity of his disciples conveys the importance for all his followers throughout the ages to be one in faith and purpose. These teachings reach an integrative culmination in Revelation 22 with its hope and anticipation for the end of time when this vision fully becomes reality.

The themes of these texts are given visual expression through "The Great Amen" illumination of Revelation 22:20-21. This illumination dramatically draws together the entire message of Revelation and also emphasizes the book's liturgical nature. Note how the colors in this depiction connect us back to Revelation's initial book title and the incipit. The thematic banner with the text of Revelation 22:20-21 floats above a background taken from the "Vision of the New Jerusalem" illumination of chapter 21:1-22:5. Also notice the cross with a circle of angels in the right-hand panel. This symbol affirms God's ultimate fulfillment of his work of salvation.

An easily overlooked but significant feature of this illumination is the voiceprint just above the base of the cross. Voiceprints occur frequently in the Psalms volume of Saint John's Bible. This visualization portrays the significant practice that chanting psalms holds in the daily prayer cycles of Benedictine liturgical life. The voiceprint in this illumination is a segment of "Adoro te Devote," and offers an additional focus to the importance that liturgy and prayer have for church life.

Revelation closes with a great Amen and the hope of Christians expressed through the affirmation "Come, Lord Jesus" contained in the highlighted text.

In what ways does liturgy help you embrace the hope expressed in Revelation 22? Does this vision of God's ultimate work help strengthen your commitment to our life together as Christians? How does this expression help you transition your devotional focus from the theological themes of the Easter season to those of Pentecost and Ordinary Time?


