Second Lesson: Colossians 1:15-28

Lector Christ Jesus is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers—all things have been created through him and for him. He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross.

And you who were once estranged and hostile in mind, doing evil deeds, he has now reconciled in his fleshly body through death, so as to present you holy and blameless and irreproachable before him—provided that you continue securely established and steadfast in the faith, without shifting from the hope promised by the gospel that you heard, which has been proclaimed to every creature under heaven. I, Paul, became a servant of this gospel.

I am now rejoicing in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I am completing what is lacking in Christ's afflictions for the sake of his body, that is, the church. I became its servant according to God's commission that was given to me for you, to make the word of God fully known, the mystery that has been hidden throughout the ages and generations but has now been revealed to his saints. To them God chose to make known how great among the Gentiles are the riches of the glory of this mystery, which is Christ in you, the hope of glory. It is he whom we proclaim, warning everyone and teaching everyone in all wisdom, so that we may present everyone mature in Christ.

GRACE CHURCH

On July 20, 1870, a new Episcopal parish for the west side of Kansas City, Missouri, was founded in the basement of Coates Opera House, located on the southeast corner of the intersection of Tenth Street and Broadway Boulevard. Those present at the formation meeting chose the name “Saint Paul’s Church” for the new parish. The parish name was changed to “Grace Church” on April 14, 1873.

Plans for a building were unanimously approved on May 12, 1874, and the congregation began preparations for construction of a small brick building. However, in July of that year, the foundation had just been laid when the Kansas City area was devastated by a huge swarm of locusts that swept into the state from the west. The resulting economic conditions caused the plans for the church to be modified. The new building was constructed of wood. The Grace Church building was finished by Christmas Day 1874.

In 1887, the Vestry of Grace Church purchased land at Thirteenth Street near Broadway Boulevard on which to build the first structures in stone, the buildings that stand today at that location. Construction began first on Guild Hall, called “Guild House” in its early years and “Parish House” today, in May 1888 and was completed in March 1890. Guild Hall served as the venue for the primary, or organizations, convention of the Diocese of West Missouri in June 1890.

The foundations for the new Nave of Grace Church was also poured in 1888. Construction began in June 1893 and the interior was completed in 1894 and the exterior was completed in late fall 1895. The first service in the current Nave was December 16, 1894, and the Nave was consecrated on May 15, 1898.

An Episcopal parish, known as “Trinity Church,” was established in 1883 on the east side of downtown Kansas City. Trinity Church flourished until about 1900 when its membership declined with the population migration to the suburbs south of downtown and the church’s considerable mortgage debt. In early May 1917, the rector of Trinity Church, Robert Nelson Horatio Spencer, met with the bishop, Sidney Catlin Partridge, about merging Trinity Church and Grace Church. The Vestries of both churches agreed to the merger and the new parish of Grace and Holy Trinity Church was completed on November 2, 1917.





Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

Sixth Sunday After Pentecost – The Power of God's Word

Jesus' Visit to Mary and Martha Portion of "Luke Anthology" Illumination (Luke 10:38-42)

Today's lectionary readings address the theme of the power of God's word to dwell within us, shape us, and produce fruit. Our visio divina application comes from a section of the "Luke Anthology" illumination highlighting Luke 9:38-42 – Jesus' visit to the home of Martha and Mary.

On the right side of this illumination in the lower portion Martha and Mary are found listening to Jesus. Martha stands in her apron with her hands on her hips looking exasperated. Mary is seated beside her listening intently to Jesus (who is the gold figure in the upper right corner). Jesus' words to Martha appear in gold lettering between them: "There is need of only one thing" (v. 42).

It is important for us to note that Jesus does not admonish Martha for her hospitality. Rather, in verse 41 he articulates the actual problem as "you are worried and distracted by many things." At its root, to be distracted means to fragment something that should be whole. This suggests a state of heart and mind that makes us divided, conflicted, and "un-whole." Jesus encounters Martha in a condition of fragmentation that is robbing her of joy and genuine purpose. It is leaving her unable to receive the peace and undiminished life he wishes to offer her.

In this narrative Mary and Martha reflect two sides of love and care – listening (Mary) and doing (Martha). However, if busyness or worry creates barriers of resentment, anger, onerous self-sacrifice, and exasperation, then our hospitality (whether that of listening or doing) can become an affront to those we intend to serve. Under such conditions our packed schedules serve to thwart intimacy with God and others. In this case one thing is needed – to find ways to surrender our heavy burdens of worry and distraction and listen to Jesus' words of God's love and acceptance.

If we are able to comprehend Jesus' diagnosis of the actual problem in this story, then we might perceive Jesus' admonition to Martha (and ourselves) not as a criticism, but as an invitation. Jesus knows our need for wholeness of mind, body and spirit. He also knows how we tend to place devastating expectations on ourselves and consequently on others. God's word has the power to indwell us bringing peace and wholeness that shapes us in ways which produce the fruit of genuine hospitality, love, and caring. There is need of only one thing. If we choose it, then the power of God's word becomes a transforming force within us.


According to Feeding America's Map the Meal Gap 2024 report:


