THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Isaiah 58:9b-14

Lector If you remove the yoke from among you,

Second Lesson: Hebrews 12:18-29

Lector You have not come to something that can be touched, a blazing fire, and darkness, and gloom, and a tempest, and the sound of a trumpet, and a voice whose words made the hearers beg that not another word be spoken to them. (For they could not endure the order that was given, "If even an animal touches the mountain, it shall be stoned to death." Indeed, so terrifying was the sight that Moses said, "I tremble with fear.") But you have come to Mount Zion and to the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to innumerable angels in festal gathering, and to the assembly of the firstborn who are enrolled in heaven, and to God the judge of all, and to the spirits of the righteous made perfect, and to Jesus, the mediator of a new covenant, and to the sprinkled blood that speaks a better word than the blood of Abel.

See that you do not refuse the one who is speaking; for if they did not escape when they refused the one who warned them on earth, how much less will we escape if we reject the one who warns from heaven! At that time his voice shook the earth; but now he has promised, "Yet once more I will shake not only the earth but also the heaven." This phrase, "Yet once more," indicates the removal of what is shaken—that is, created things—so that what cannot be shaken may remain. Therefore, since we are receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, let us give thanks, by which we offer to God an acceptable worship with reverence and awe; for indeed our God is a consuming fire.

When he laid his hands on her, immediately she stood up straight and began praising God. But the leader of the synagogue, indignant because Jesus had cured on the sabbath, kept saying to the crowd, "There are six days on which work ought to be done; come on those days and be cured, and not on the sabbath day." But the Lord answered him and said, "You hypocrites! Does not each of you on the sabbath untie his ox or his donkey from the manger, and lead it away to give it water? And ought not this woman, a daughter of Abraham whom Satan bound for eighteen long years, be set free from this bondage on the sabbath day?" When he said this, all his opponents were put to shame; and the entire crowd was rejoicing at all the wonderful things that he was doing.



Outreach Volunteer Opportunities

The Emergency Food Assistance Program

In partnership with St. Paul's on Main, we have been invited to help organize and distribute food as part of TEFAP (The Emergency Food Assistance Program). We meet from about 9:30 a.m. to noon on the third Saturday of each month.

St. Paul's receives delivery of several pallets of shelf-stable and frozen food from Harvesters each month. Friendly volunteers are needed to break down the pallets and repackage the food into family-sized boxes and bags. Then we open the doors to those in need and start handing out the food.

Pete's Garden

Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

Eleventh Sunday After Pentecost – Justice, Gratitude, & God's Presence "Jeremiah Frontispiece" Illumination (Jeremiah 1:4-10)


Today's lectionary readings address the themes of justice, gratitude, divine presence, and actions that foster freedom. The *visio divina* focus comes from the "Jeremiah Frontispiece," an illumination associated with the Old Testament track 1 lectionary text, Jeremiah 1:4-10. This reading narrates his call to the prophetic vocation and offers an interesting parallel as well as contrast to Isaiah's call. Isaiah's encounter with God was intense and threatening. Jeremiah's is closer to that of a nurturing relationship between a parent and child. This contrast is emphasized by the colors employed for the two illuminations. The "Vision of Isaiah" uses bold, evocative colors to depict Isaiah's call. The "Jeremiah Frontispiece" utilizes muted and earth-tone colors to convey his call experience.

Jeremiah's call begins with a declaration of love and creation: "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you," words portrayed in the second block of a descending chain of texts highlighted in the frontispiece illumination. Jeremiah is thereby reminded that he has been lovingly created and chosen by God. He is now being commissioned into the vocation for which he has been formed.

Like Isaiah, Jeremiah feels unworthy of this vocation. He objects that he is too young and untrained for such a mission. Note the words highlighted in the third block of text in the illumination. In a parental fashion, God comforts Jeremiah, encouraging him and offering assurance of his divine presence for the work to which he is being called. God touches Jeremiah and teaches him how to prophesy (e.g., "Jeremiah, what do you see?").

In the book which bears his name and in Lamentations, Jeremiah voices Israel's complaints before God. The people pour out their grief and frustration expressing anguish over their suffering and feelings of abandonment. The root of Jeremiah's name, "jeremiad", denotes a doomsday prediction. It also conveys the action of pouring out one's grief and lament. Jeremiah's message will be one of fiery destruction. Yet, his warnings of punishment also will be accompanied with divine promises of forgiveness and covenant renewal if the people will repent and follow God. Unfortunately, Jeremiah will communicate what he has been commissioned to say, but in the end no one will listen. The people's actions will result in enslavement rather than the freedom God desires for them.

How does the sequence of communications portrayed in the "Jeremiah Frontispiece" illumination speak to you? Have you ever experienced divine comfort, strength, and courage through worship or prayer even during times when you were confronting difficulties in your life?






Summer Book Study: *The Great Divorce* by C.S. Lewis •


