Second Lesson: 2 Timothy 1:1-14

Lector Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, for the sake of the promise of life that is in Christ Jesus,

To Timothy, my beloved child:

Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord.

I am grateful to God— whom I worship with a clear conscience, as my ancestors did— when I remember you constantly in my prayers night and day. Recalling your tears, I long to see you so that I may be filled with joy. I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that lived first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, lives in you. For this reason I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of my hands; for God did not give us a spirit of cowardice, but rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline.

Do not be ashamed, then, of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner, but join with me in suffering for the gospel, relying on the power of God, who saved us and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works but according to his own purpose and grace. This grace was given to us in Christ Jesus before the ages began, but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Savior Christ Jesus, who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, and for this reason I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day what I have entrusted to him. Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. Guard the good treasure entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.

Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

Trusting God During Uncertain Times


"Fulfillment of Creation" Illumination (Romans 8)

The illuminations and visual treatments of Saint John's Bible seek to facilitate faith development through nonverbal instruments as a complement to the faith enrichment nurtured by means of the verbal media of the written word and liturgy. This week that effort was made difficult because none of the lectionary texts had accompanying artwork or treatments. Fortunately, the key themes from today's lectionary selections find some expression in the "Fulfillment of Creation" illumination from Romans chapter 8. For this reason, we are using this illumination as the *visio divina* focus for our reflections on today's lectionary themes.

Collectively, today's texts emphasize the power of faith, even when its magnitude may seem small or weak. The Bible encourages steadfast faith, humble service, and trust in God even when circumstances don't seem to support it. The prophet Habakkuk advises the reader to wait patiently on God's action regardless of apparent contradictions encountered during hard times. The Psalmist urges believers not to be discouraged by those who do evil but to trust in God's plan and promises. The Apostle Paul counsels Timothy to stand firm in the Gospel, relying on the "spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline" given by God. The Luke text enjoins the believer to practice the power of humble and faithful service. Embracing these themes, the Romans chapter 8 text speaks of waiting for the full revelation of God's activity in creation which is made certain through Christ's passion, death, and resurrection. While we wait, we are able to receive a foretaste of this new life that anticipates the fullness of life that we will experience beyond death.

Romans chapter 8, understands time differently from the way we generally think of it in daily life. It is a sense of time that quantum mathematicians and scientists have postulated in their calculations and models of reality. Illuminator Thomas Ingmire references these perceptions in this depiction. He was especially intrigued by the way quantum physics reduced everything to pure energy. Starting with an image from the Hubble telescope that shows a star in the shape of a cross, Ingmire adds graphics, equations, and points of intersection that relate to the way cosmologists address vast cosmic entities and distances. At the bottom of the illumination are images referencing the "Creation" illumination from the book of Genesis. The creation narrative tells us that God's good creation is incomplete and has become tainted by sin. However, through the work of Christ, new life and a new creation have become the norm. While the creation currently waits for fulfillment by this divine cosmic action, its completion has been assured.

How does the life, passion, death, and resurrection of Christ reinforce your commitment to wait patiently and trust God's redemptive purpose? What features of the "Fulfillment of Creation" illumination together with today's lectionary texts inspire you to serve humbly and faithfully as you await God's ultimate fulfillment of creation?


