THE LESSONS

First Lesson: 2 Kings 5:1-3, 7-15c

Lector Naaman, commander of the army of the king of Aram, was a great man and in high favor with his master, because by him the Lord had given victory to Aram. The man, though a mighty warrior, suffered from leprosy. Now the Arameans on one of their raids had taken a young girl captive from the land of Israel, and she served Naaman's wife. She said to her mistress, "If only my lord were with the prophet who is in Samaria! He would cure him of his leprosy."

When the king of Israel read the letter, he tore his clothes and said, "Am I God, to give death or life, that this man sends word to me to cure a man of his leprosy? Just look and see how he is trying to pick a quarrel with me."

But when Elisha the man of God heard that the king of Israel had torn his clothes, he sent a message to the king, "Why have you torn your clothes? Let him come to me, that he may learn that there is a prophet in Israel." So Naaman came with his horses and chariots, and halted at the entrance of Elisha's house. Elisha sent a messenger to him, saying, "Go, wash in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh shall be restored and you shall be clean." But Naaman became angry and went away, saying, "I thought that for me he would surely come out, and stand and call on the name of the Lord his God, and would wave his hand over the spot, and cure the leprosy! Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than all the waters of Israel? Could I not wash in them, and be clean?" He turned and went away in a rage. But his servants approached and said to him, "Father, if the prophet had commanded you to do something difficult, would you not have done it? How much more, when all he said to you was, 'Wash, and be clean'?" So he went down and immersed himself seven times in the Jordan, according to the word of the man of God; his flesh was restored like the flesh of a young boy, and he was clean.

Then he returned to the man of God, he and all his company; he came and stood before him and said, "Now I know that there is no God in all the earth except in Israel."

Second Lesson: 2 Timothy 2:8-15

Lector Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David— that is my gospel, for which I suffer hardship, even to the point of being chained like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, so that they may also obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. The saying is sure:

If we have died with him, we will also live with him;
if we endure, we will also reign with him;
if we deny him, he will also deny us;
if we are faithless, he remains faithful—
for he cannot deny himself.

Remind them of this, and warn them before God that they are to avoid wrangling over words, which does no good but only ruins those who are listening. Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly explaining the word of truth.

Dear Cathedral Family,

The Season of Pentecost is a season of growth. During this time, we have readings that are meant to teach us about being better people as we grow in faith and in doing all that Christ calls us to do. We hear from prophets and apostles about loving God and our neighbor, and we hear from Jesus about how to be better stewards of all that God has given us.

Growth is vital to us as individuals and as a family of faith. We are showing love in action by gathering to help others through our monthly outreach collections, volunteering at food pantries, or helping package and label meals through Pete's Garden. We are showing love in action when we respect the dignity of every human being.

Though the season of Pentecost will once again come to an end, love never ends. Growth never ends. Our faith remains strong as long as we are actively loving one another. The writer of Hebrews told us a few weeks ago to "let mutual love continue. Do not neglect to do good and to share what you have..." Paul writes to Timothy and says that the people "are to do good, to be rich in good works, generous, and ready to share..." In keeping with these teachings, we ask that we all continue our commitment to the work and ministry of our Cathedral in 2026.

In the coming weeks, we are offering ways to come together as a community, as a family, to learn more about actively loving and growing together. We will have a stewardship lunch on October 19, following the 10:30 service. While there, you will have the opportunity to sign up to come to someone's home in your part of Kansas City to continue in fellowship and conversation, to continue in love and growth.

Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

God's Abundance and Our Response

"Elisha and the Six Miracles" Illumination (2 Kings 5:1-15)

Today's lectionary themes emphasize God's abundant provision and our need to respond with faith and action. The focal illumination comes from today's Old Testament, track 1, text – 2 Kings 5:1-15. The *visio divina* lesson is drawn from one of the six panels of this illumination treating the story of the healing of Naaman from leprosy.

The Naaman narrative recounts an incident in the life of a successful military general from Aram who contracts a disease that was incurable in that day. After all available medical treatments fail to cure the disease, in desperation he follows the advice of a Jewish slave girl in his employ who tells him to seek help from the prophet Elisha. Naaman goes to Elisha but feels insulted when the prophet tells him to bathe seven times in the muddy Jordan River as a treatment. The general almost misses his opportunity for healing when he prepares to depart compelled by indignation without doing what Elisha has instructed. The servant's question: "If the prophet had commanded something difficult, would you not have done it?" redeems the situation. Naaman goes to the Jordan, bathes seven times as Elisha had told him, and the general is immediately cured.

Sometimes the easy thing might be the most difficult thing for us. Doing something difficult enhances our own courage, fortitude, ability, and intelligence. It allows us to feel strong and in control. The easy thing offends our sensibilities and leaves us feeling silly, unsophisticated, and vulnerable. The easy thing requires us to trust people and power beyond our control.

The "Elisha and the Six Miracles" illumination conveys an important message about God's provision and our need to respond in faith and action. In this

depiction, illuminator Aidan Hart shows Elisha wearing Elijah's mantle. He is dressed in green, the color of the prophets, and is embedded in the panels suggesting that he is part of the events portrayed. The illumination is divided into six panels, each conveying an incident in Elisha's ministry when God's love is poured out: providing bread for the hungry, jugs of oil for a widow in need, a barren Shunammite woman conceiving a son then later the boy's resuscitation after his untimely death, Naaman's healing, and a floating ax head. These miracles address the needs of a wide range of people: for food, for money to pay bills, for the health of children, for curing leprosy, and for tools to provide needed shelter.

Panel five, the focus of today's narrative, contains the surprising image of the

AIDS virus as seen under a microscope, not Naaman's healing as might be expected. It represents the many "underworld" forces that threaten our lives today; forces against which we often feel helpless and vulnerable. From this story we learn important lessons about God's healing presence. We learn the need to live simply and vulnerably and to rely on the grace and hospitality of God and others.

In what ways do the experiences portrayed in today's illumination upend your expectations? How does that reversal challenge you to live differently?
