THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Jeremiah 23:1-6

Lector Woe to the shepherds who destroy and scatter the sheep of my pasture! says the Lord. Therefore thus says the Lord, the God of Israel, concerning the shepherds who shepherd my people: It is you who have scattered my flock, and have driven them away, and you have not attended to them. So I will attend to you for your evil doings, says the Lord. Then I myself will gather the remnant of my flock out of all the lands where I have driven them, and I will bring them back to their fold, and they shall be fruitful and multiply. I will raise up shepherds over them who will shepherd them, and they shall not fear any longer, or be dismayed, nor shall any be missing, says the Lord.

He has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers-- all things have been created through him and for him. He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross.

Gospeller The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

Gospeller When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. Then Jesus said, “Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing.” And they cast lots to divide his clothing. The people stood by, watching Jesus on the cross; but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, “He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!” The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, and saying, “If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!” There was also an inscription over him, “This is the King of the Jews.”

One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, “Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!” But the other rebuked him, saying, “Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong.” Then he said, “Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom.” He replied, “Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise.”



Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

God's Righteousness, Promise of Salvation, & the Enduring Covenant "The Crucifixion" Illumination (Luke 21)

The church's liturgical year ends with a celebration of the feast of Christ the King. The Sunday afterward marks the beginning of the new liturgical year – the first Sunday of Advent, when the story of God's redemptive activity in the world begins and unfolds anew. As we conclude this liturgical year, it is appropriate that we reflect on God's work in Christ (an operation that subverts the power structures and political systems of the world) and commemorate Jesus as the king of all creation.

Today's readings emphasize the challenge of our ultimate allegiance – whether to the "King of kings and Lord of lords" or to the visible but temporal powers of this age. For God's kingship is not one of worldly power, but of suffering love, sacrifice, and redemption. Jesus is a king who gathers and unites rather than divides and scatters (Jeremiah 23). Instead of waging war, Christ "makes wars cease to the ends of the earth ..." (Psalm 46:9). He welcomes even the worst of offenders (Luke 23:43).

Paul writes that the mission of Jesus is to "reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or things in heaven, by making peace through his blood" (Colossians 1:20). Thus, the indicators of Christ's reign are the peace and reconciliation of all creation.

Today's focal illumination features an image of the crucifixion based on the Gero Cross housed in Germany's Cologne Cathedral. This cross is distinguished by its elliptical gold panel with rays that radiate outward like the face of a sunflower. It conveys the message that amid all the pain of the crucifixion, this does not diminish God's glory.

The left-hand side of this depiction portrays the three


hours of darkness accompanying Christ's crucifixion together with multiple moons. This suggests the crucifixion's ultimate termination of time. Night and death are destroyed in this act. The multitude of moons conveys a sense of the Bible's prophetic literature. The purple color suggests the rending of the temple veil – the end of darkness and of separation from God. Purple was a sign of royalty and power in the ancient world. Here it indicates the overthrow of worldly kingship and the establishment of Christ's eternal kingdom. In this kingdom possessions and status are unimportant. Truly significant value rests in attentiveness to God's presence.

The cross at the lower left of Christ's crucifixion represents the thief who was crucified at the same time as Jesus and in his final hours of life found redemption.

Across from this on the lower right is the image of a procession, symbolizing the multitudes of people who, like the thief, have found redemption through

the death and resurrection of Christ. The expansion of the images beyond the limits of the frame expresses how the Crucifixion has broken through the limits of human perception and power and even liberated the prison of time itself.

A prayer we pray each Sunday in worship known as "The Lord's Prayer" is a regular expression of subversion against ultimate allegiance to earthly power structures: "Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven." On this feast of Christ the King, we are invited to consider where we are placing our true allegiance – to Christ's kingdom or some other? What difference does it make?


