THE LESSONS

First Lesson: Acts 2:14a,22-32

Lector Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed the crowd, "You that are Israelites, listen to what I have to say: Jesus of Nazareth, a man attested to you by God with deeds of power, wonders, and signs that God did through him among you, as you yourselves know— this man, handed over to you according to the definite plan and foreknowledge of God, you crucified and killed by the hands of those outside the law. But God raised him up, having freed him from death, because it was impossible for him to be held in its power. For David says concerning him,

'I saw the Lord always before me,
 for he is at my right hand so that I will not be shaken;
 therefore my heart was glad, and my tongue rejoiced;
 moreover my flesh will live in hope.
 For you will not abandon my soul to Hades,
 or let your Holy One experience corruption.
 You have made known to me the ways of life;
 you will make me full of gladness with your presence.'

“Fellow Israelites, I may say to you confidently of our ancestor David that he both died and was buried, and his tomb is with us to this day. Since he was a prophet, he knew that God had sworn with an oath to him that he would put one of his descendants on his throne. Foreseeing this, David spoke of the resurrection of the Messiah, saying,

‘He was not abandoned to Hades,

Second Lesson: 1 Peter 1:3-9

Lector

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! By his great mercy he has given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and into an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you, who are being protected by the power of God through faith for a salvation ready to be revealed in the last time. In this you rejoice, even if now for a little while you have had to suffer various trials, so that the genuineness of your faith—being more precious than gold that, though perishable, is tested by fire—may be found to result in praise and glory and honor when Jesus Christ is revealed. Although you have not seen him, you love him; and even though you do not see him now, you believe in him and rejoice with an indescribable and glorious joy, for you are receiving the outcome of your faith, the salvation of your souls.

Gospeller When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

Presider Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.



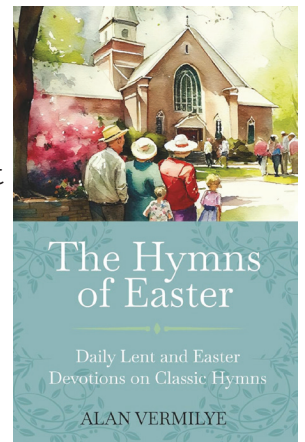

Today's Focal St. John's Bible Illumination

Transforming Doubt into Faith

"The Resurrection" Illumination (John 20:19-31)

Today's lectionary readings focus on some of the initial responses of Jesus' followers to the shock of the Resurrection as they transitioned from his physical presence to lives of communal faith. This transition was enabled by Christ's actions to transform their fear into peace and their doubt into faith, and to commission the church for continuing God's mission of reconciliation and recreation. But this transition required time and initiated a process that continues today.

In the John 20 text, Jesus enters a locked room to bring peace to his fear filled disciples. Later, he makes a focused appearance to the Apostle Thomas, who had been absent from the prior encounter, and offers him an invitation to a deeper, personal confession of faith that overcame his doubts. To these disciples Jesus gave the Holy Spirit, empowering them to forgive sins. The Acts 2 text describes the early church's life as characterized by sharing possessions, apostolic teachings, and breaking bread – a product of the Resurrection's impact. The 1 Peter 1 text focuses on a "living hope" through the resurrection which sustains believers who have not physically seen Jesus yet love and believe in him. Collectively, these texts call for disciples to "show forth in their lives what they profess by their faith...."

These lectionary texts for the week after Resurrection Sunday acknowledge that post-Easter life can be complicated, confusing, and full of struggles. In contrast to the worry-free life we might have imagined at the end of our Lenten journeys, the Apostle Thomas reminds us that resurrection is hard. It can be hard to accept, hard to internalize, and hard to incorporate into the real situations of life – especially in the face of pain, loss, uncertainty, and death. But today's accounts of the struggles experienced by Jesus' followers during the days and weeks after his resurrection reveal that stalwart belief often is not instantaneous, it is a process. Those who commit themselves to believe "that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing would have life in his name" (John 20:31), consent to a process of transformation that lasts a lifetime.

Today we return to consider again "The Resurrection" illumination from last week's focus with a reminder that the Resurrection does not magically end all doubts, fears, disappointments, and hurts. Many features of this illumination visually connect the Resurrection (last week) to the beginnings of the Christian community (this week) [see last week's article]. But that community's history

has included many struggles, among them persecutions, doctrinal divisions, unresolved questions, and depravations. Mary's posture in relation to Jesus provides the illumination's focal feature conveying both an end and a beginning. Her extended hand reaching to touch Jesus' face is translucent. She wishes to hold on to the Jesus she had known on earth, but he instructs her to embrace the fullness of his resurrected life instead. In this she is representative of the larger Christian community which seeks a more comprehensible Jesus who acts in predictable ways and fits into familiar expectations. The book of Acts narrates the early church's struggles to adjust to a new understanding of who Jesus is and to an unforeseen view of what following Christ entails.

The story that follows Easter celebrations is one that includes confusion and doubts. Jesus helped fearful and doubting disciples find their way to faith and wholeness. Does the fact that belief and courage took some time for these followers of Jesus help you allow yourself the necessary time and experience to find your way into a lifestyle characterized by trust and wholeness?

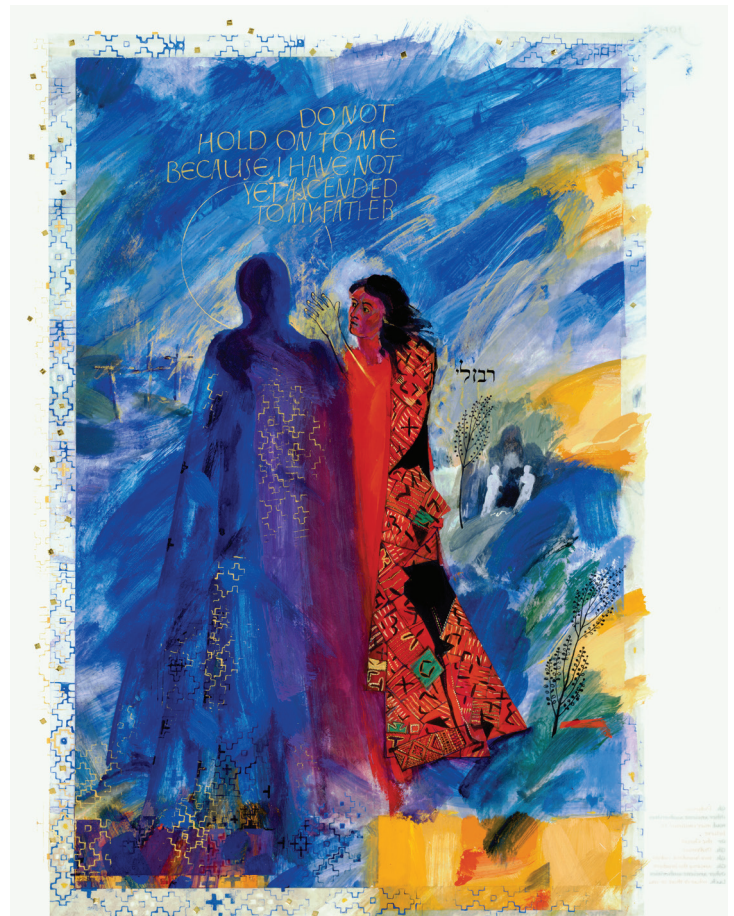
